The impervious barberry

These top-selling shrubs are durable, beautiful and deer resistant

REGON IS THE number one producer of barberry, selling \$7.7 million worth in 2019, according to the USDA Census of Horticultural Specialties. That's 39% of a nearly \$20 million national market, mostly attributed to Japanese barberry (*Berberis thunbergii*), a plant that has taken a hit with some negative attention in the past 20 years.

B. thunbergii, introduced to the United States in the 1800s to replace the native fungus-prone *B. canadensis* (American barberry), started creeping onto state plant invasive lists nearly 100 years later as it was discovered naturalizing in (mostly) forests of the Northeast and Midwest. And then came research from the University of Connecticut linking barberry to the increased harboring of ticks.

As a pest-resistant, deer-resistant, hardy plant, barberry remains a noteworthy landscape plant. Intensive research has been underway to discover and promote sterile or near-sterile varieties. As a result, some of those bans have been reversed. As a significant crop for Oregon growers — barberry is the second highest selling deciduous shrub after hydrangeas — we explore here the varieties that make this plant a huge draw and the trends that support its continued popularity.

"Demand for the plants has increased heavily," said Madison Hall of **Youngblood Nursery** (Salem, Oregon), which sells more than 15 kinds of barberry, specializing in finding unique selections, and is always looking

for more. "When we release

a new variety, people enjoy it. They are drawn because of the variety of colors and the blooms, the variety of habit and shape. And barberry Berberis thunbergii 'Concorde' is noninvasive and offers visual interest all year — yellow flowers in spring, plus burgundy leaves that fade to crimson in fall, and then red berries in winter.

is pretty much impervious." Of all the cultivars, by far, B. *thunbergii* 'Concorde' was consistently named the best-seller by wholesale nurseries. It's one of two top sellers, by a large margin, at **Blue Heron Nursery** (Corvallis, Oregon), along with B. *thunbergii* 'Admiration', followed by a steep drop to third going to B. *thunbergii* 'Golden Rocket', said owner Ben Dinsdale.

"All three have a lot of the traits that make barberry popular," he said. "They are not fussy — they are low maintenance — and versatile in the landscape." Blue Heron's customer base includes wholesale growers, re-wholesales, landscapers, retail garden centers and municipalities.

Compact choices

'Concorde' (18–24 inches high by 18–24 inches wide; Zones 4–8) has a wide window of visual interest, with yellow flowers in spring, rich burgundy-purple leaves that fade to crimson in fall, and bright red berries in winter.

"The berries have nonviable seeds, which is a feature of the newer cultivars to try to limit any invasiveness," Dinsdale said.

'Concorde' is a number-one choice for Bruce Hegna of Nature/Nurture Landscape Design as an edging plant. "They are good plants to repeat, to unify the landscape, and they are something the client doesn't have to worry about pruning every year," he said. "It's always going to perform, and they don't have to fuss with it."

Hegna always has clients looking



for deer-resistant plants, and it's a bonus when they are reliable and sturdy like barberry. The burgundy-colored varieties can be used to break up swaths of green, or bring calm and steadiness to a sea of color and perennials, he said.

Like the compact *B. thunbergii* 'Bagatelle' (12–18 inches high by 12–18 inches wide; Zones 4–8), which is Hegna's second most used edging plant after 'Concorde' and is a best-seller at

Youngblood. The copperyred leaves mix with tiny yellowish flowers that turn into bright red berries in fall and last through winter.

"Small-space gardens marry well with barberries," Hall said. "A lot are dwarfs or upright so they are good for that pop of color, and are really attractive for people who are trying to fill a small space, attract birds, keep deer out, or use them as a small hedge, even if you don't have that much space in your yard."

Another best-selling dwarf, 'Admiration' (12–18 inches high by 18–26 inches wide; Zones 4–8), offers a different color palette in a still-small plant, Dinsdale said, with stunning red, glossy oval foliage and golden edges that turn brilliant orange in fall. It offers an eye-catching pop of color in the landscape. "The color is great and for such a long period of interest."

'Admiration' is one of the latest additions at **Alpha Nursery** (Salem, Oregon), said Josh Zielinski, because of high customer demand. Alpha's primary customers include retail garden centers, landscapers and rewholesalers throughout the United States. The smaller colorful plants of 'Admiration' are good for borders, mass plantings and parking strips, he said.

While landscapers tend to choose the old standbys, Zielinski thinks the brighter colors are on trend for shrubs for gardeners.

Zielinski points to 'Bonanza Gold' (*B. thunbergii* 'Bogozam,' 2 feet high by 3 feet wide; Zones 4–8) as an old standby; one of the older dwarf yellow-type barberries that is still a consistently good performer, sells well, and has a stunning display of bright leaves that turn orange and red in fall, with berries that persist into winter.

"People don't shy away from big, bold

plants; people gravitate toward them," he said. "For advanced gardeners with a more refined taste, they are fun, and new gardeners just see them and go, 'Wow."

And "wow" they will go when viewing the sterile Sunjoy Neo (*B. thunbergii* 'NCBT2' PPAF; 2½ feet high by 2½ feet wide; Zones 5–8), a semi-dwarf crack of orange lightning in the spring landscape from Proven Winners and developed by Tom Ranney, professor at the Department of Horticultural Science, North Carolina State University (Mills River, North Carolina). Alpha just added liners of Neo exactly because its brightest orange new growth with a shift to deep orange-red in fall.

"I don't think anyone is going to put a hedge of it in, but the color pop could be used instead of an annual," Zielinski said.

The most recent addition at Blue Heron is another Proven Winner plant, Sunjoy Mini Maroon[™] (*B. thunbergii* 'NCBT1' PP30330; 18 inches high by18 inches wide; Zones 4–8), with deeply purple-red foliage on a compact plant. Developed by Ranney over 10 years, Sunjoy Mini Maroon is a sterile update of 'Crimson Pygmy'. Dinsdale expects to reduce production of at the farm, where its numbers are already in decline. 'Crimson Pygmy' is still a heavily requested plant, but "it's on its way down," he said, as a plant being particularly tagged as invasive in some locations.

And although it's not a best-seller, Dinsdale thinks more attention should be paid to *B. thunbergii* 'Red Carpet' (12 inches high by 4 feet wide; Zones 4–8), a low-growing plant with bright orange new growth that ages to burgundy. That low, spreading habit creates a subtle distinction from other compact barberries, making it useful as a groundcover or for a mass planting.

Reaching up

For vertical habit and vibrant color, Zielinski said to look at the sterile *B*. *thunbergii* 'Orange Rocket' PP18411 (4 feet high by 1.5 feet wide; Zones 5–9) for its exciting bright spring flush that ages to a ruby red.


"It adds a nice kind of height element and that bright color," he said. "If that is sitting in the store, with the unique color, it won't stay there long."

'Golden Rocket' (*B. thunbergii* 'Golden Rocket' PP18626; 3–4 feet tall by 2–3 feet wide; Zones 4–8), a best-seller at Blue Heron and a recent addition to the Youngblood catalog, is another stunning, slow-growing smaller shrub producing little to no viable seed. With bright golden foliage that darkens to green, and it's very upright habit with a feathery tough, according to Hall. 'Golden Rocket' has a barberry-specific habit of being low maintenance and tough make it versatile in the landscape — and an upcoming plant.

Alpha Nursery almost stopped producing the upright grower because at first it didn't seem to catch on. Then suddenly, the requests came rolling in.

"So we said we'd better start taking more cuttings!" Zielinski said.

There's a place for the columnar-type barberries in the smaller landscapes of today, Dinsdale said. Like *B. thunbergii* 'Helmond Pillar' (3–4 feet high by 1–2 feet wide; Zones 4–8) with its deeplyrich purple foliage on a slow-growing multi-stemmed shrub. Or, *B. thunbergii* 'Rosy Rocket' (4 feet high by 16 inches wide; Zones 4–8) with the same delicate branching on a nice upright columnar form with showy two-tone pink-and-white young foliage that matures to a deep


> burgundy purple highlighted by a mass of small, crimson red berries. Dinsdale finds great visual appeal in the tough *B. thunbergii* 'Red Rocket' (5 feet high by 3–4 feet wide; Zones 4–8), with its arcing spray of new growth that comes in slightly variegated and grows bolder with color the more sun it gets. Small yellow flowers in spring are followed by red berries, and the leaf color lasts all summer.

"It gets a nice fade into a great classic fall spectrum," Dinsdale said. It's visually striking and versatile, accepting a hard pruning for a formal edge or a more arcing form with textured shoots,

That same arching habit appears on *B. thunbergii* 'Royal Cloak' (3–5 feet high by 3–5 feet wide; Zones 4–8), one of Hall's favorites and a top seller at Youngblood. It's fast-growing with large reddish-purple leaves that emerge red in spring.

Evergreen, semi-evergreen

Although shipping restrictions on certain varieties are in place for barberry, Hall believes it hasn't dampened interest in the genus, and not just *B. thunbergii*. Customers started asking for *Berberis linearifolia* 'Orange King' (36–48 inches high by 4–6 feet wide, Zones 4–8), an evergreen barberry with lance-like deep-green foliage and clusters of orange flowers in spring followed by blue-black berries. Youngblood had a few large ones in the display garden, and has set out to introduce it on a wider level.

Hall also thinks *Berberis frikartii* 'Amstelveen' (2–3 feet high by 3 feet wide, Zones 6–9) and *Berberis* × *gagnepainii* 'Chenault' (3–4 feet high by 3–5 feet wide, Zones 5–8), both evergreen to semi-evergreen are overlooked and worth wider recognition. Both bloom with beautiful bright yellow flowers, have berries and keep their leaves all winter. 'Chenault' has an added fall interest of bluish-black fruit and winter interest of bronzy foliage. When space needs to be filled with a truly large landscape plant, Hegna recommends the Great Plant Pick, Darwin's barberry (*B. darwinii*, 8 feet high by 6 feet wide) for its flowering of orange-colored blooms on a massive evergreen plant.


"When you see it, you immediately want to know what that plant is," Hegna said. "It's a great background plant. The leaves are really small, more like holly leaves, and real dense." It shows off other plants, and the fruits are edible for humans but also birds love them.

Similarly, because of the blooms, the broadleaf evergreen Dwarf Rosemary Barberry (*Berberis* × *stenophylla* 'Nana', 2–3 feet high by 2–3 feet wide; Zones 6–9), although much smaller, is a perfect accent plant. It's slow growing, requires no pruning, and the shiny leaves are and more needlelike.

"The flowers are a really pretty orange-red in the bud, and then open \$

up to a strong yellow color," Hegna said.

For a more traditional use of barberry as a hedge, Hegna uses the evergreen William Penn barberry (*Berberis* × *gladwynensis* 'William Penn', 4 feet high by 4–6 feet wide; Zones 6–9), which grows dense and full of spines that make it useful at the edges and borders properties. The bonus is the redtinged fall leaves.

"People are surprised to see evergreen barberries because we are so used to seeing the Japanese barberry," Hegna said.

Of course, many of these he mentioned are not widely grown by nurseries. Hegna hopes that will change, that they would become more available in the trade, because of the wide versatility of these plants and customers' openness to these plants.

Barberries have little or no pest problems and tolerate a variety of locations. They are adaptable and landscapers and gardeners can choose from a wide color palette and growth habits for various situations, choosing the right cultivar for the specific situation. Where there are deer problems, barberry comes out on top, and they are also low-maintenance plants, a quality increasingly popular among gardeners.

Because of these attributes, barberry maintains broad appeal. Considerations of invasiveness has generated hesitancy, but new introductions that minimize seed viability can address those concerns.

"I think barberry will continue to be a popular plant, have a place in the landscape, and align with modern values of ecological consideration," Dinsdale said. 🕑

In the heat of the garden

T IS DEFINITELY TIME for a reprieve from the events of the past year and a half. That's true for garden centers, customers, the plants they buy and grow, and the plants in our gardens.

We are living through a pandemic; we suffered devastating forest fires with smoke conditions that were hazardous to our health; we had a major ice storm with many mature trees crashing to the ground due to the weight of the ice that ripped through utility wires, causing power outages throughout the region; and most recently, we endured record-breaking high temperatures.

All of these events have emphasized, more than ever, the resilience of plants. There is no denying that many plants have suffered, and perhaps the extreme heat caused more damage than either the smoke or the ice. The impact of climate change and this extreme heat provide an opportunity to observe our gardens and make some decisions regarding altering the current plant palate. These are difficult decisions to make because we all have favorite plants that may sometimes even be a focal point in the garden.

A damage report

In observing my own garden and others, it is interesting to note which plants suffered the most damage, as well as those that had no apparent damage. With some mature trees and shrubs, it may be some months before we know the extent of possible damage.

I have heard from several arborists that we should not discount the stress that trees like Douglas fir, maple, oak, etc., can be under due to our very dry conditions. The symptoms might not be evident for some time in the future.

There were certainly many plants in my garden that came through the heatwave with scorched leaves. In spite of my watering them in the morning and spraying them sometimes twice a day, and then watering again in the evening, I could not prevent scorching. As I talk with other gardeners, we share many of the same plants that are showing damage.

Hydrangeas are one of the first plants that come to mind. Delving into the word itself, *Hydrangea* is from the Latin "*hydro*," meaning water, and "*angeion*," meaning barrel or pitcher. The plant got its name because it was thought the shape of the flower was like a pitcher. It does seem like a very appropriate name since hydrangeas do need lots of water.

In my garden, ferns suffered as well as

fuchsias and rhododendrons.

What does all this mean to garden centers and their customers? When gardeners get together, talking about plants, successes and failures, it can be an easy conversation.

Most seasoned gardeners can talk about their plant failures and either try again or move on. This may not be the case with the average garden center customer. A failure could lead them to withdraw from gardening because they may decide it is too difficult and not worth the trouble.

This is when garden center personnel can step in and engage the customer in conversation about plants, the conditions they need, some of the pitfalls of gardening and how rewarding it can be.

Actionable steps for garden centers

There are many lessons that we can learn from the recent heat spell. First, we can gain valuable information concerning which plants did well in the heat. The three olive trees (*Olea* 'Arbequina') in our garden are in an extremely hot, full-sun location and they came through with no trace of leaf burn.

However, this was not the case with my neighbor's street tree, *Stewartia pseudocamellia* (Japanese stewartia). Several days before the heatwave, I took some photos of the beautiful white flowers against a background of deep, dense green leaves. Several days later, this tree was badly scorched.

Another neighbor has a row of *Ceanothus* 'Victoria' planted in a location where they receive the hot afternoon sun. They came through the heat look-

ing just as good as ever. Another plant that will tolerate conditions similar to *Ceanothus*, is *Arctostaphylos* (manzanita). These plants make a beautiful statement in the garden with their copper-colored bark and often twisty growth habit. They also have many different cultivars with differing growth habits that vary from ground covers to medium and large shrubs. Some can even be like small trees. Both of these plants deserve increase recognition because if given the right conditions, they will perform very well and are not prone to leaf scorch.

Some garden centers already have special sections for heat-tolerant plants, but in most cases these sections should be expanded. Signage and tips on plant care are a necessity in sections like this because much of the information will be new to many gardeners. Armed with this type of information, gardeners will be better prepared for potential problems that may occur in the future.

Staying at the forefront

This summer has been stressful for both plants and people and we do not want the memory to linger because it might discourage the trend of young families getting back to the earth. Collectively, we can work together to encourage the continuing pursuit of our favorite hobby.

It is important that garden centers and gardeners emphasize the enthusiasm of working with the land to improve our environment. It is vital that we all work to keep gardening at the forefront of this new generation of gardeners. We must be eager to convey that gardening is an enjoyable hobby, not a burden and that the joys are very satisfying. \bigcirc

ANY BUSINESS OWNERS talk about delivering for their customers, but Lorne Blackman sometimes takes it literally.

The **Walla Walla Nursery Co.** owner will hop in a truck loaded with wholesale perennials, ornamental grasses, shrubs, annuals and other plants, and deliver to some of the garden centers that make up the bulk of his customers.

"It's fun to see their reaction when they realize it's the owner," Lorne said.

His wife and business partner, Auralea Blackman, sees the benefit of having Lorne in direct contact with the retailers.

"He gets to see the product on the other end," she said. "He gets to meet those customers and see what they have, and see what kind of quality they're looking for. And he's very good about making notations and paying attention."

Walla Walla Nursery Co. serves independent garden centers in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Northern Nevada and Northern California, delivering about twothirds of its production numbers to them on company trucks every week. The remaining plants are purchased by rewholesalers.

"It's all just listening to customers and trying to meet their requests," Lorne said. "Currently, we have more market than we have production capacity."

The nursery is situated on the Washington-Oregon border, with some acreage on each side of Stateline Road.

Being located east of the Cascade Range is somewhat of an anomaly for a Northwest wholesale nursery, but there are a few others with operations east of the mountains, including J. Frank Schmidt & Son Co. (a farm in Milton-Freewater, Oregon) and Bailey (a farm in Sunnyside, Washington).

The advantage for Walla Walla is that the plants are more acclimated for the Intermountain region (Boise, Salt Lake, Bend, etc.) and perform better in those markets.

According to General Manager Kevin Brunot, product diversity is Walla Walla's calling card. Retailers can get all of what they need without having to meet multiple minimum order requirements at different wholesale growers.

"We're kind of a one-stop shop," he said. "Between annuals, grasses, perennials, vegetables, and shrubs, we're pretty well all inclusive. The only piece we're missing at this point is trees."

Learning the business

Lorne grew up in Walla Walla, Washington and is a fourth-generation

resident there. His grandfather worked for the railroad company, which is echoed in the model railroads Lorne incorporates into his Farwest Show booth. His father was in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

After high school, Lorne attended Washington State University, graduating with a bachelor of science degree in forestry. The lack of work in that field led him to pursue an internship and eventually a full time job with **J. Frank Schmidt & Son Co.** in 1986.

Lorne worked at the company's Cottrell container farm, which is located at the company headquarters in Boring, Oregon, near Portland. This is where Lorne learned a great deal of his nursery craft.

"A lot of the principles of quality growing got cemented in my head at that time," Lorne said. "(Production manager Gerard Dosba) said, 'When you stand at the end of a



row of trees, you should only see one tree."

Initially, Lorne thought this was silly, but he soon realized it was a way to ensure attention was paid to consistent quality and form. "It didn't take long before it clicked with me, and it became a challenge to do that," he said.

With Schmidt, Lorne also learned to supervise others. "There were times when I was running most of the farm up to a hundred people," he said. "I learned how to separate supervisory responsibility from personal friendships and buddy-buddy type stuff. That was big."

The experience transformed his career. "It was my first real job that was more than just a summer internship in forestry," Lorne said. "I couldn't have done [Walla Walla Nursery] without having [Schmidt] as a stepping stone."

After five years at Schmidt, on the



west side of Oregon, Lorne moved back to Walla Walla and enrolled in the irrigation technology program at Walla Walla Community College.

"I hoped to find a place with Boise Cascade's fiber farms which they were putting in in the Wallula area," Lorne said. These farms raised fast-growing cottonwood trees for paper. "That [job] fell through, fortunately as it turned out, as the whole operation is now long gone."

Spectacular growth

Long intrigued by what he might accomplish by starting his own business, Lorne founded Walla Walla Nursery Co. in 1992. "I ended up taking a job at a local garden center while I began the nursery business on the side," he said.

The initial plan was to grow native plants. "I was looking for some big contracts," he said. "I've since found those aren't real sustainable, or not regular. Selling a diversity of products to garden centers is much more sustainable and predictable."

Although Lorne didn't have a farming background growing up, his wife, Auralea, did. Also a fourth-generation resident of the Walla Walla area, her parents were farmers with Italian and German roots. The couple married in 1994.

The Blackmans' nursery grew slowly in the early days, but took off around the year 2000. The nursery had just three employees then. It has 190 at peak season now.

"Transitioning from a small mom-andpop operation to a self-sustaining business was a much more challenging process than I would have imagined," Lorne said. "I didn't have a solid plan. I keep telling our people we've been making it up as we go for 28 years."

The move from native plants to more traditional retail nursery material was the first big step.

"When I was working at the garden center, I discovered the benefits of perennials — quick turns, easy sell," Lorne said. "So, we started adding a lot of perennials and then we created a special focus on ornamental grasses. We're still well known for that."

The company then added woody shrubs



to the lineup because customers were asking for them. The company did well with them until the Great Recession, which hit in 2007, "and there went the shrubs," Lorne said. "Since then, they've come back in on a much larger scale."

For a time, Walla Walla was growing containerized trees as well, but they were constantly tipping over in the wind, and were troublesome to ship, so the company dropped them. More recently, they added annuals three years ago and then houseplants last year, both of which are doing very well.

In recent years, Walla Walla has been simplifying its product line. For example, instead of carrying 150 hostas, they're selling 20 or 30 different ones. The company seeks feedback from 10–15 of its top customers every year by inviting them to an open house.

The company also started growing

Proven Winners (PW) Color Choice shrubs about eight years ago, and now grows PW perennials and annuals, too. The company became a PW Gold Key grower this year. "I think Proven Winners are more than 20% of our product line now, by volume, and rising," he said.

The company is a network grower for Bailey as well, offering First Editions shrubs, Endless Summer hydrangeas and Easy Elegance roses.

A key turning point for the business was establishing an annual operating line of credit with Northwest Farm Credit Services, which boosted the company's growth. Learning to batch crops was also huge. It enabled the company to time product readiness for weekly deliveries, thereby extending the selling season. The addition of the company's own trucks and drivers also enabled this.

To feed the growth, the company has

acquired various adjacent parcels over the years, basically anytime a neighbor was ready to sell.

For a division of labor, Lorne has focused on the growing and operations side of the business, while Auralea has made her mark in the areas of graphics, printing, information technology and marketing. "Pve tried to make us a little more IT-oriented than a lot of nurseries," she said.

The nursery's information services (IS) team led the creation of a virtual white board showing the status of every order, from picking to cleaning to loading. "It helps a lot," Auralea said. "We even have WiFi in the field, so we can do inventory on the fly. You can stand right out there and change inventory in real-time."

Assisting on the inventory process has been Kevin Brunot, who joined the company three years ago after several years run-

ning his own nursery. He has helped streamline a number of the company's processes, including sales, and was rewarded with a promotion to general manager this spring.

"It's been a real pleasure growing, and I hope to continue to do great things within the company," he said.

Also recently promoted was Alex Ramos, who joined the company as a facilities manager after working in the snack foods industry for several years and in a variety of roles. He was recently made operations manager and enjoys a different challenge almost every day.

"Who am I going to help out? Or how am I going to contribute to this?" he said. "And I see it as my own business. It's just no natural to be out in the field one day and then the [next] day working on paperwork. This would be more pleasant than the food production line. I'm enjoying every second of it."

A path to the future

As they navigate business and chart a path to the future, Lorne and Auralea draw upon their Christian worldview, along with a strong sense of personal responsibility.

"Things like loyalty and honesty are very, very important," Auralea said.

The Blackmans are proud of the product that they create, not as a matter of ego, but because their customers rely on that product, and their team relies on a healthy business.

"We're here to serve our customers," Lorne said. "I like the diagram that shows the three parts of a successful business — customer interests, profit interests and employee interests, and where those overlap. That's where we want to operate."

In that spirit, Lorne and Auralea are also looking at transitioning the nursery to employee ownership. "It doesn't seem right to start a business, to hire people that count on you, and then just retire and shut down the business," Lorne said.

"Or pass it off to some corporation that doesn't care. That's the last thing we want," Auralea added.

Moving to employee ownership enable the Blackmans to retire.

"We want to make sure that if something happens to us, that the employees are cared for, that the business continues, and it's not about us," Auralea said. "It's about everybody else as well."

"Humility is the key to the whole, to everything, to all of life," Lorne said. \bigcirc

Springing forward

COVID-19 has meant two banner years for nurseries, but the future's a little foggy

VER THE DECADES, Grace Dinsdale's **Blooming Nursery** has enjoyed a fairly steady path of gradual growth. The past few years, the Cornelius-based wholesale nursery has seen solid sales increases, often between 5% and 10% each year.

For Dinsdale, who founded Blooming Nursery nearly 40 years ago, 25% growth would be considered a huge year. That's why last year was such a shock. Sales at Blooming Nursery in 2020 were up 125% over 2019.

"It just takes your breath away," Dinsdale said.

As most nurseries can attest, 2020 sales, particularly in the spring, were off the charts. With the COVID-19 pandemic descending upon the country, people were forced to cancel trips, work and learn remotely, and otherwise stick close to home. That, in turn, sparked a new affinity for home improvements, landscaping and gardening.

This sent nursery sales through the roof and drained inventories. It also left nurseries scratching their heads over how much they should plant for 2021 and whether or not the pandemic boom would continue to echo.

For Dinsdale and others, it has done just that. "By early May of this year, we had already sold the same amount of plants that we had sold all of last year," she said. "The roof just came off."

Two banner years in a row have given the nursery industry a big

boost. But it hasn't all been a walk in the park. Initial closures in the spring of 2020 created uncertainty for nurseries; booming business emptied shelves and fields alike, making it hard for some nurseries to meet demand. And planning for the future has become even more of a crapshoot than ever, as nurseries try to predict just how many of these newbie, COVID-inspired gardening devotees stick with it.

"We all need to understand what's causing all this so we can be ready for next year and the year after that," Dinsdale said. "It's stronger than ever, and that's a wonderful development. If only we had some indication of how durable it is."

Same story

Not every nursery saw the jumps that Dinsdale did the past two years, but most have felt a boost.

"Our nurseries are reporting brisk sales," said Mickey Hatley, branch manager for **Northwest Farm Credit Services**, which offers financing and banking services to the agricultural sector. "Many of them have been selling out or they're facing a lack of availability."

According to Charlie Hall, professor and Ellison Chair in International Floriculture at Texas A&M University, sales have been fairly solid across the board this year.

"A lot depends on which sector the growers are selling into," he said, "but the majority of folks have had a really

good spring to date. It started early and sales were strong."

On average, Hall said growers who sell largely to big box stores saw sales rise between 10% and 15% this spring; those who sell to garden centers and the landscape trade enjoyed a similar increase. Growers who work in the green infrastructure space selling native plants and grasses have also done well.

"The story seems to be the same wherever I talk to people," said Mike Pezzillo, vice president and Chief Operating Officer at **Eason Horticultural Resources**, a Kentucky-based horticultural supply company. "Everyone is doing well."

The primary driver behind that upswell is the impact from COVID-19. According to Hall, more than 18 million new home gardeners and landscapers came into the market over the past year,

spending more time and money on plants for their homes since they were, well, at home. At least through the early part of spring this year, that phenomenon was still making a difference.

"COVID has impacted people's gardening and made them pay more attention to their yards," Pezzillo said. "That hasn't changed. The COVID boom is continuing."

Bust with the boom

With that boom, however, has come a little bit of a bust. For starters, it's been tricky for nurseries to keep their supplies up with demand. Dinsdale said Blooming Nursery had enough inventory to keep up last year. This year, she said spring inventory got depleted earlier than normal.

"Our nursery looks like it should have looked about a month from now," Dinsdale said in early May.


The increased demand for plants has also upped the need for related materials, including pots and fertilizers. Costs for hard goods have risen; along with freight and fuel costs.

"Pots are like gold right now," Pezzillo said. "The cause of that is twofold: There's strong demand and the pipeline of materials is lacking, too."

The big questions

With the busy spring season behind them for this year, growers are now looking ahead. They are having to make some difficult decisions about the future based off some unknown variables. The biggest one is whether or not the folks who jumped on the gardening bandwagon will stick with it as society begins to reopen and people can get out and about again.

Dinsdale is a little nervous. "If people got

their hands in the dirt and smelled the flowers enough for biophilia (humans' natural affinity toward nature and living things) to take hold so they now realize they enjoy gardening, will they be able to still find the time for it now that they have other options and limited time?" she said. "I'm already seeing a lot more boats and RVs and motorcycles out. How many of them are not going to find the time to garden anymore?"

Hall, too, said it remains to be seen if the COVID spike was a flash in the pan or an actual expansion of the customer pool.

"It's going to be a banner year," he said. "My point is, are we seeing the earliness and strong demand early in the season because of issues related to last year or is it a growth in the size of the pie? Those 18 million newbies — was it a one-off or are they going to stick with it? That's what we don't know, but we'll sure find out by the end of summer." Not knowing what the future will bring makes it difficult for nurseries to plan for the next season. Dinsdale said she's looking back at 18 years' worth of sales data at Blooming Nursery to help inform her planting plans for 2022 and beyond.

But data from this year and last is wildly different than her prior averages. For example, she said Blooming Nursery has sold an average of 50 flats of a certain plant per year over the past 15 years. This year, those 50 flats were gone in 12 weeks. Dinsdale said at that rate, she would have needed 175 flats to keep up.

On the flip side, she also said she wouldn't plant that many for next year based off this year's numbers.

"I'm feeling like we need to increase our numbers, but then dial it back a bit," Dinsdale said. "You have to consider how much risk you can tolerate." Hall said nurseries would be wise to not use 2020 as the basis for planning for future seasons. There will likely still be some of the new demand to consider, but he said a better overall approach would be to take the average of the past three years and maybe add 10% to 15% to that.

"That would be more prudent," Hall said. "It could turn out that maybe you were wrong, but I would rather be conservative in my planting. There's one thing I've seen over the years: Growers are very adept at turning a shortage into a surplus in a short amount of time. Everybody starts planning the back 40, and lo and behold, you've got a surplus to deal with." ©

A billion-dollar bounty

Several factors explain Oregon's robust plant sales figures, particularly in woody material

hen Rich Bailey of J. Frank Schmidt & Son Co. in Boring, Oregon, relocated to Oregon from Chicago several years back, he was struck by the wide diversity of plant materials produced by Oregon nurseries.

"This state grows so many different types of plant material," Bailey said. "You name it, we grow it, anything from trees to shrubs, perennials, annuals, to palm trees. That ginormous selection draws people to buy from Oregon."

Then there is the quality.

"Oregon is known for producing good nursery stock," said Barry Gregory of **Kraemer's Nursery** in Mount Angel, Oregon. "We have a lot of people, certainly from the northern half of the country come to Oregon and visit nurseries annually, if not more than once, and choose to buy their products here. It is that much better."

It is no secret that Oregon is a national

leader in growing and selling nursery stock. The state ranks third in total sales, according to 2019 figures, behind only California and Florida and well ahead of fourth-place North Carolina. It leads the nation in several categories, including deciduous shade trees, deciduous flowering trees and coniferous evergreens, and is second in fruit and nut plants.

Growers were posed recently with the question of why Oregon excels. Answers ranged from good climatic conditions, good soil, good growing practices, good infrastructure to good institutional support.

Let's start with climate.

"I think it goes without saying that the climate here is fantastic for growing nursery stock," Gregory said. "That is a big reason why Oregon is where it is."

> "We've got a heavier rain season in the valley, so plants get a lot more water opportunity," Bailey said.

> Another climate feature that helps Oregon tree production are its cool evenings.

> "We are lucky to have warmth through the day when the trees grow," Bailey said. "Then at night it gets cool so they shut down. That cycle produces a heavier branch

structure with tighter internode growth between branches.

"In many other nursery locations throughout the country, trees don't necessarily shut down at night because the evenings don't get real cool. Because of this, you'll see elongated growth and less density in branch structure. I think that makes a big difference."

Temperate climate

The temperate nature of Willamette Valley's climate also is ideal, growers said. "We don't deal with the real heavy freezes through the winter or extremely high temperatures in the summer," said Todd Nelson of **Bountiful Farms** in Woodburn, Oregon. "And, obviously, stress on plant material will cause it to slow down, and we historically haven't had to deal with a lot of that."

"That doesn't mean that we don't deal with ice storms and fire and other issues that definitely keeps us on our toes," Nelson said. "But, in general, Mother Nature is very good to us in this valley."

Seasonal differences in climate also are perfect for the trees and shrubs that Oregon excels in producing, said Mark VanHoef of **Oregon Pride Nurseries** in



McMinnville, Oregon.

"This is a perfect environment for evergreens, because we do have winter and the evergreens do go to sleep," VanHoef said. "And they just love our cool summers.

"I mean, you can't grow a lot of

the conifers that we grow here in the Southwest, like in Oklahoma or Texas, where there are some big nurseries. This is it: Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, where a lot of Christmas tree guys are and a lot of container and B&B conifer growers are."

In addition, said VanHoef, who came to Oregon from Minnesota, where he also operated a nursery, it costs more in the Midwest to grow the trees and shrubs that excel here.

"You go back to where I am originally from, and to get a container of evergreen or shrub or tree through the winter, you have to tip it over," VanHoef said. "You have to mulch it in. You have to put a thermal blanket over it. Then you have to put straw or hay over that and another poly blanket. And most of those growers just don't have the resources to spend that kind of labor, that kind of effort and that kind of money. And we don't have to do any of that. We just leave it standing straight up, and if we get a real cold snap, we will run out there and put a poly over it just to protect it if it is deciduous. But conifers, we just let them sit straight up right through the winter."

Rich, deep topsoil

The Willamette Valley's rich, deep topsoil and its water supply are other irreplaceable factors in separating Oregon nursery production from other high-profile areas, growers said.

"In the Willamette Valley, we have incredibly well-drained topsoils, and our water sources historically have been very high quality," Nelson said.

"We have extremely deep and rich topsoil in the valley, which came from the Montana glaciers," Bailey said. "That really fertile soil is great for planting trees."

Growers also talked about the benefits of a strong infrastructure and evolving production practices.

"Certainly, the production practices have improved over time," Gregory said. "There are a lot more containergrown plants today than there used to be, which allows you to ship plants really all year long. And I think the infrastructure at most Oregon nurseries has probably improved. There are more structures, whether it be greenhouses or shade structures, to allow us to

do things a little better. And there is more automation. Maybe you don't have to send a crew of ten people out there with hedge shears to trim a block of plants. You can do a lot of that with machines, pruning machines, mowers. So, all of those little things add up."

Oregon growers also have embraced technology. At Bountiful Farms, it helps minimize waste and maximize resources.

"We have monitors throughout our nursery that feed information back to our plant health," Nelson said. "We are able to monitor

moisture, temperature and EC so we get a snapshot every day of where we are at in a general balance of

the nursery. And so many of the Oregon growers use this technology."

The fact that growers are willing to share knowledge is another benefit afforded the Oregon nursery industry.

"In the Willamette Valley, there is a pretty strong historical collective of knowledge that a lot of us growers are willing to share with one another," Nelson said. "And I think there is a lot to be said for that.

"So much of this is an art and a science," Nelson added. "I have a degree in horticulture, but so much of what I've learned has either come from my father or my brother or my neighbors and we are all better because of that. We are stronger as an Oregon growing base because so much of our product is shipped out and so many times, we are sharing trucks. So, the higher the quality that we are known for, the greater the demand that people are going to have in coming to our state."

Institutional support

Oregon growers also benefit from a strong industry association, Gregory said.

"I think the strength of our association is certainly a factor," he said. "And the support of research

and training institutions, like Oregon State University and Chemeketa Community College, also helps growers."

"You need young people who want to make this a career," VanHoef said. "Without the programs at OSU and Chemeketa, it would be a lot more difficult to attract these managers."

The presence of well-trained crop consultants has also been vital over the years. According to Nelson, there is a consistent supply of high-quality soilless media, derived primarily from the fact that much of it — like the bark that comes from








sawmills — is produced in state.

The benefit that most frequently came up in interviewing growers seemed to be the wide diversity of plant materials. Bailey of J. Frank Schmidt, characterized the diversity as creating a sort of onestop-shopping experience for wholesalers.

"Oregon's plant palette is enormous," Bailey said. "You can find your tree, shrub and perennial needs all in one place. It is a one-stop shop. For buyers, that opportunity minimizes their cost and allows them to maximum the amount of variety and plant material they purchase. Buyers are looking to take advantage of this as much as they can. With freight these days, getting as much material on a truck as you can is extremely important."


State University. Jessica is also an Oregon State Master Gardener.

Legislature approves recycling overhaul

The Oregon Legislature has approved a statewide recycling overhaul in the form of Senate Bill 582. The House passed it 31-24 on June 25, the day before the session adjourned. The Senate had passed it earlier, 16-13. Gov. Kate Brown is expected to sign it into law.

The bill will mandate the creation of producer responsibility programs, placing new requirements on producers of plastics, paper, foodware and other covered materials, including nursery containers. They must develop and fund a plan to ensure these materials are collected, transported, processed and disposed of, while also paying for consumer outreach and education.

The OAN opposed the bill, as did other business groups, calling it costly and ineffective. However, the OAN did win some improvements to the bill. It no longer applies to on-farm use of containers, nor to businesses with less than \$5 million in revenue.

"The legislation was vastly improved, but it did not achieve all of our needs," OAN Executive Director Jeff Stone said. "While growers were removed from the bill, the retail and supply chain sides of our industry still must comply with the legislation. The good news is that the bill does not go into effect for four years, so there is time to adjust the content of the legislation." Visit **tinyurl.com/ yb62zdn8** to learn more.

NW FARM CREDIT SNAPSHOT FINDS STRONG NURSERY PROFITABILITY

According to a second-quarter market snapshot by **Northwest Farm Credit Services**, nursery and greenhouse businesses continue to maintain good profitability. However, increasing labor and transportation costs are cutting down profit margins.

A straw poll from the beginning of the calendar year to May 31 reports that shade tree sales increased a little more than 30% since 2020. Financial experts link the increase in demand for home and landscaping construction projects. In addition, low interest rates for homebuyers and a limited inventory will continue to increase the need for new home construction and support sales in the grower segment.

Container growers saw a 10.7% increase and greenhouses gained 7% in year-over-year sales. Both are strong markers of growth and high performance. The total of all three segments calculates to a 14.6% increase in sales overall.

Limited labor continues to be an issue for the industry. The pandemic's supply chain disruptions are also shifting the cost of shipping products and limiting trucking availability. Download a PDF of the report at **tinyurl.com/axwjz6wz**.

OREGON OSHA UNVEILS EMERGENCY HEAT RULE

The Oregon Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OR-OSHA) has adopted an emergency heat rule placing new requirements on employers to protect workers in the event of a heatwave, such as the one that hit Oregon the last weekend in June.

Temperatures reached 117 degrees in Salem, Oregon, exceeding the record not just there but in most American cities other than Phoenix. More than 100 people died, many of them in their homes. A worker at an Oregon nursery passed away after showing symptoms of heatstroke.

In response, Oregon Gov. Kate Brown quickly ordered OR-OSHA to issue an emergency rule as soon as possible, which it did on July 8. It will remain in effect for up to 180 days, as the agency continues work that was already underway to create a heat protection rule.

"This rule creates greater clarity for employers about the specific steps that need to be taken to protect workers from heat stress dangers at work," said Michael Wood, administrator for OR-OSHA "For employees, it further crystalizes their existing rights to protection from heat hazards where they work."

The rule requires that employers provide access to shade and cool water when the heat index hits 80 F or above. When it hits 90 or above, employers must allow 10-minute cool-down periods in the shade for every two hours of work. These breaks may be concurrent with any other meal or rest period already required.

Additionally, the rule requires effective communication between employees and supervisors for sharing of concerns, monitoring of employees for signs of heat illness, and development of an emergency medical plan, and practices to adapt employees to working in the heat.

And, by August 1, employers must ensure that all employees receive special training before they are required to work in a heat index of 80 F or higher. Such training must cover several of the issues associated with working in the heat and



complying with the heat rule.

OAN Executive Director **Jeff Stone** has been following the rulemaking process for its potential impact on nurseries.

"Nurseries are already meeting most of these requirements," he said. "They offer their employees water on hot days, and they take breaks at a normal rate, except when the temperature exceeds 90 — then they take more. When the recent heatwave happened, they were ready for it. They started and ended the workday earlier, so they could avoid the hottest parts of the day."

Stone expects to see further regulation in the future.

"Right now, OR-OSHA doesn't have the authority to order employers to stop work, but the legislature could put that in a bill, and I think it's possible they will do that in 2022," he said.

The best advice he can give is to take

the issue seriously. "Do the common-sense things to provide workers with shade, water and breaks, and monitor them for signs of heat stress," he said. "OSHA offers free consultation services if you're not sure what to do, and I would take advantage of those — the point is to make your workplace safer. No fault, no citations and no penalties are involved."

TREE NURSERIES AIMING TO MEET SEEDLING DEMAND

Tree seedling nurseries are adjusting to meet the demand for reforestation efforts, according to a report from *Capital Press* (Salem, Oregon). It requires finding the best space to grow, rotating acreage, and doing what they can to make every inch count to meet a short-term surge.

The hits kept coming as thick smoke from the 2020 wildfires prevented laborers from harvesting cones for seeds, and the February 2021 ice storm hurt many seedlings. Nurseries are limited in what they can achieve with long-cycle tree products that have seasonal production windows. The data says there just isn't the inventory needed by landowners to replenish their wildfire-stricken properties, but the Department of Forestry is providing extensions if they have documentation showing that they tried.

Kathy LeCompte, owner of Brooks Tree Farms, told the newspaper that nurseries could speed up the two-year sapling growing process up by erecting new greenhouse spaces, but the cost of the expensive equipment outweighs the benefits of a brief period of demand.

Jan Hupp, co-owner of Drake's Crossing Nursery, explained that they could put more fields into production to meet the demand. IFA Nurseries Regional Marketing Manager Steve Akehurst said that landowners need to be more reactive when a tree seedling services have overages they can sell. DATA INCONCLUSIVE FOR COVID-19 OUTBREAKS

Health officials in Washington haven't been able to say how effective emergency housing rules were at preventing the spread of COVID-19, according to a report from *Capital Press* (Salem, Oregon). The Washington Department of Health presented their findings on the pandemic at the Employment Security Department's Agricultural and Seasonal Workforce Services Advisory Committee. They documented 146 outbreaks last year in farms and packaging warehouses, but can't trace exactly where the infections originated.

Farm groups claim that the department was making presumptions that there was a higher level of infections in employer-provided housing without data. COVID response teams were facing incomplete and conflicting information and reported



that a large percentage of the outbreaks in March, April, and May of 2020 took place in agriculture. More details are on tinyurl.com/35trwhju.



A fine, low input turf

Researchers look into the helpful properties of fine fescue turgrasses

INE FESCUE IS A group of different cool-season turfgrasses in the *Festuca* genus with narrow or fine leaves (Image 1). These grasses are generally known for excellent shade and cold tolerance, as well as persistence when maintained with minimal fertilization.

Considering these attributes, fine fescue is growing in popularity as homeowners and turfgrass managers seek more sustainable genus and species (Image 2, next page).

Each of the five common fine fescues (strong creeping red fescue, slender creeping red fescue, Chewings fescue, sheep fescue and hard fescue) have a unique set of characteristics. For instance, strong creeping red fescue has a strong drought tolerance, germinates quickly and spreads quickly. This species is also the most common in seed mixtures.

Slender creeping red fescue tolerates lower mowing heights. Chewings fescue has the best shade tolerance. Sheep fescue can tolerate some of the lowest fertility conditions and persists with little or no irrigation. Finally, hard fescue has excellent resistance to turfgrass pathogens such as red thread and dollar spot.

Since 2012 the Oregon State University (OSU) Turfgrass Program has been part of a national and local fine fescue research initiative funded by the United States Department of Agriculture - Specialty Crops Research Initiative (USDA-SCRI), the National Turfgrass Evaluation Program (NTEP), the Northwest Turf Association, and the OSU Agricultural Research Foundation.

In this article we intend to share a few of the objectives and findings associated with this research initiative. These objectives

include improving cool-season turf disease tolerance with symbiotic endophytes from hard fescue, evaluating fine fescue cultivars in Oregon, and determining the optimum seeding date and mulching material for fine fescue establishment in Oregon.

Improving turf stress tolerance

The inherent disease resistance associated with fine fescues is partially the results of *Epichloë* endophytes. *Epichloë* endophytes are symbiotic fungi that live within the turfgrass and help protect the host plant from various environmental stresses and pathogens. Previous research has identified *Epichloë* endophyte strains in hard fescue that provide resistance to dollar spot and red thread diseases.

Research at OSU is currently exploring the transference of this symbiotic organism from hard fescue to other fine fescue species and subspecies, as well as other cool-season grasses like perennial ryegrass and tall fescue to improve the disease resistance and stress tolerance (Image 3, next page).

Evaluating fine fescue cultivars

From 2014 to 2019 the OSU Lewis-Brown Horticulture Farm in Corvallis was a fine fescue testing location for the National Turfgrass Evaluation Program (NTEP). For detailed data such as spring green up, percent green cover, monthly turfgrass quality, red thread tolerance and traffic tolerance of 42 cultivars of the five fine fescues in Oregon and other location visit the "NTEP 2014 National Fineleaf Fescue Test: 2015-19 Data" (https://tinyurl.com/cprmzxpc).

In 2020, a new 5-year fine fescue NTEP study with 43 entries was initiated at the the Lewis-Brown Horticulture Farm in Corvallis.

Optimum seed date

Part of the multi-state USDA-SCRI fine fescue initiative was to identify ways that people can incorporate these low-input

grasses into existing landscapes. We know that the fine fescue species persist in shade, with low water requirements, and low fertility requirements, but overcoming the social barrier for adopting more sites with these grasses was a primary focus of this initiative. In order to recommend this as a species for homeowners and turfgrass managers, it's important to identify the best time of year to plant and establish the grass.

OSU, along with three other universities across North America, initiated an optimal seeding date trial for fine fescues to identify which month of the year was best to seed fine fescues in different regions across the US. Nine monthly fine fescue seeding timings from March through November were investigated with a seed mixture of strong creeping red, Chewings, hard, and slender creeping red fescue (Image 5, page 96).

Prior to seeding, plots were sprayed

with glyphosate to eradicate any weeds. The fine fescue mixture was then seeded into these plots at one of the nine predetermined seeding dates, along with a starter fertilizer. Following seeding, plots were irrigated frequently to promote establishment. No additional fertilizers or pesticides were applied to plots following seeding.

Data collection consisted of monitor-

ing weather data, observing the number of days until emergence, visual turfgrass cover and quality, and grid intersect counts to assess the percentage of weeds and fine fescue in each plot.

Results from across all four locations showed that as temperatures increased during the growing season, the time required for fine fescue emergence decreased.

Seeding in August and September, however, produced the best establishment with the lowest weed pressure.

Oregon has much more of a Mediterranean climate compared to the other locations of this study, and as such that allowed for more flexibility in seeding timing. Overall, Oregon had a much wider seeding window of May through September. All those plots were successful at establishing, and many had low weed encroachment.

Spring seeding in Oregon with fine fescues can be successful, and is a good option for homeowners and turf managers. One consideration, however, is that due to the drier spring/summer climate in our region, irrigation is a critical requirement to get good establishment of fine fescue. Seeding timings in September may still require frequent irrigation for emergence, but more rain events from September through May will reduce the overall need for irrigation for fine fescues seeded in the fall.

Optimum mulching material

When we get into springtime, and the weather starts warming up, it's not uncommon for homeowners to begin using commercial "patch and repair" products on their lawns to seed bare or damaged areas from the previous seasons. These products contain about 85 to 90% inert matter (i.e. wood or paper based mulch) to help retain moisture, and the other 10 to 15% is fertilizer and grass seed.

Typically, these "patch and repair" products are comprised of other grass species (tall fescue and perennial ryegrass), and very few of them are fine fescues. The overall cost per pound (lb) of seed in these pre-made mixes is very high, so we decided to test materials available to homeowners or turf managers from nurseries or garden supply stores that they could use to make their own seed mixes. We included newspaper, top soil, compressed paper mulch,

compost, woodchips, potting soil, and no mulch material (Image 6, right).

All treatments included a 95% (by volume) mulch ingredient, 0 or 1% starter fertilizer, and 5% fine fescue seed mix (strong creeping red fescue, Chewings fescue, hard fescue, and slender creeping red fescue). The ingredients were mixed by hand in a 5-gallon bucket and hand seeded onto 2' x 2' plots in April 2019 (Image 7, bottom right). Once treatments had been seeded, the area received daily irrigation to promote establishment. Data collection included number of days required for seedling emergence, establishment rate, visual quality, and percent weed encroachment at the trial's conclusion.

Conclusion

Mulch ingredient had a significant impact on seed emergence and establishment. The woodchips, newspaper shreddings, and pressed paper mulch inhibited establishment early on. Although eventually they filled out with fine fescue, we don't recommend using those materials in a patch and repair mix.

Using potting soil or compost provided for the quickest emergence of fine fescues in this trial. This could be due to those materials holding moisture better, and providing warmth and cover to the seed which sped up germination. The compost in particular required the fewest number of days to reach 50, 75, and 90% establishment.

We found that if a site is adequately irrigated, mulch materials and fertilizer might

not be necessary to include for repairing areas, but to speed up the process, including compost or potting soil was beneficial. Overall, major cost savings can be made by making your own mulch mixes.

The average cost for pre-made "patch and repair" products is about \$2.79 per pound, but mixing your own can bring that cost down to about \$0.45 per pound (Braun et al., 2020). O


