## Excursion Report - October 2018. East Russell

It was a pleasure to see David Barrow, who ventured across the river from Mirriwinni to join us. We enjoyed a leisurely lunch as we discussed our Christmas breakup and the upcoming 2020 Cairns Yabba. Dessert was a delicious semolina and berry cake - not too sweet and marvelously moist. Thanks to the cook for that one!

We set off on our excursion an exploration along a recently recut path on the north-western side of the Graham Range. The Johnstone River hardwoods (Backhousia bancroftii) on the property were once harvested by the Kruckow family and processed at their Mirriwinni Mill. Near one of the property's houses, Patsy showed us an Alloxylon flammeum (or was it A. wickhamii?) planted by her sister 22 years ago.

The path took us past flowering Hornstedia and more Phaleria clerodendron (the delightfullynamed "scented daphne") than I've ever seen, all of it just a day or two from breaking into massed flower. The rare vine Piper mestonii was in fruit, showing off glossy red fruits. Here and there, a little herb. like a bonsai Melastoma showed off its pale mauve flowers. This plant, Tristemma mauritianum, was the first thing I learnt was edible in the rainforests of northern Queensland, and I still look for their hot pink appleflavoured fruits when out bush. Patsy called them "juicy apples".

But the highlight of the day came right at the end - eagleeyed Rob Jago spotted an unusual vine high in the canopy - it was Uncaria cordata, a species known from only two localities and less than ten collections. Rob's find was both a new locality for the species, and it's northernmost known occurrence in Australia. After half an hour of effort, we managed to bring down a good specimen of the stubborn vine, which will be pressed for future study.

We arrived back at the car to find everyone but Don had headed back for afternoon tea. That seemed like a good idea, so we jumped in the car and drove back to the clearing to join the crew.
