THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

The University of Minnesota, ranked among the nation's top public universities, reflects the commitment to education of a state that is only 20th in population. It is almost alone among universities in the United States in its combination of three characteristics; an international research university, a land-grant institution with a strong tradition of education and public service, and a metropolitan academic community.

The Twin Cities campus, the University's largest campus, is made up of 19 colleges and offers the full range of academic and professional degrees. A comprehensive campus in Duluth offers undergraduate and graduate programs. The Morris campus offers a four-year liberal arts program. Crookston offers associate and baccalaureate degrees in technical, career-oriented programs. Through the Minnesota Extension Service, the University is present in each of Minnesota's 87 counties.

The University is the primary center in Minnesota (and parts of the surrounding region) for instruction and research in the health sciences, law, engineering, agriculture, and forestry; it offers all of the graduate-level programs in these fields.

When the University was founded as a preparatory school in 1851, Minnesota had been a territory for just two years, and statehood was still seven years away. The school was built on not much more than the pioneers' faith in education. The University struggled financially in its early years and was forced to close during the Civil War. It reopened in 1867.

Two students received bachelor of arts degrees at the first commencement in June 1873. Since then, the University has granted a total of 494,523 degrees. Students earn undergraduate and graduate degrees in more than 250 fields of study. During the 1994-1995 academic year, the University of Minnesota conferred a total of 10,579 degrees on all its campuses.

The Duluth campus joined the University in 1947, the Morris campus opened in 1960, and the Crookston campus in 1966. Enrollment in fall 1995 was 48,091 on all four campuses. Enrollment was 36,955 on the Twin Cities campus, 7,415 at Duluth, 1,952 at Morris, and 1,729 at Crookston.

University alumni include four Nobel Prize winners, a former chief justice of the United States, two former vice presidents, the heads of Fortune 500 companies, pioneers in medicine, civil rights leaders, top journalists, and men and women who have achieved distinction in every field.

Alumni and their families and friends are always welcome at the University. Alumni are invited to continue their relationship with the University through the Minnesota Alumni Association and its college groups.

THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS

At the heart of every great university is a college encompassing the basic disciplines of knowledge. That college at the University of Minnesota is the College of Liberal Arts (CLA). The college was formally established in 1868, 17 years after the founding of the University.

The traditional branches of knowledge are housed here—the social sciences, the humanities and fine arts, and the natural sciences. In addition, the college offers professional programs with close ties to these fields. Study and research opportunities are available in more than 60 major areas, from the usual, such as English, economics, history, to the less usual, such as women's studies, theoretical statistics, and speech and hearing science. They include disciplines as old as philosophy and as new as computer science. A student may also choose to design an individualized major program.

About 13,400 undergraduate students and about 1,846 graduate students were enrolled in CLA programs in fall 1995. The college is staffed by nearly 485 permanent faculty members who can share the most current research in their fields.

Many students complete their education in CLA. Others take their basic liberal arts coursework in the college and then transfer to another unit of the University such as the Carlson School of Management or one of the health science schools.

The degree requirements established by the college are designed to provide an education solidly based in the liberal arts. Courses necessary to meet general education requirements introduce students to modes of inquiry and subject matter characteristics of the major branches of knowledge.

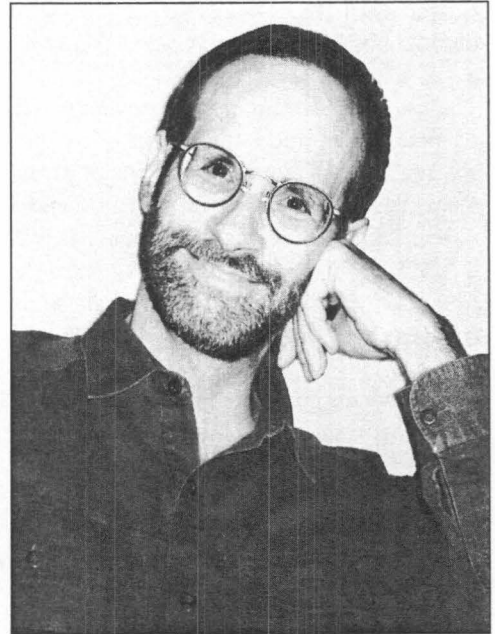
A liberal education means not only a breadth of knowledge, but depth and proficiency in a single field of knowledge. Students are required to select a major project, usually a written paper.

The College of Liberal Arts' faculty believes a liberal arts education gives students the analytical skills and flexibility needed for shaping their lives and for adapting to new careers.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER & ARTHUR H. "RED" MOTLEY OUTSTANDING TEACHING AWARD

This unique award honors Arthur H. "Red" Motley, an alumnus and industry leader whose high standards and talents inspired countless others. A generous gift from Red Motley's family to the University of Minnesota Foundation established the endowment fund from which an annual cash award is made to honor an outstanding faculty member; nominated by CLA students and recommended to the dean by a review committee of students, alumni board representatives, and faculty members.

In recommending **Professor Robert ("Robin") Brown** for the Arthur "Red" Motley Teaching Award, one of his students comments that "Robin has a profound intellectual curiosity about all aspects of teaching," a sense that we can understand it as something "shaped by our intellectual, social, institutional and personal histories." Robin Brown's career at Minnesota has been guided by his belief that teaching is important intellectual and spiritual work. Joining the faculty at Minnesota in 1972 to work with Freshman Composition courses, Robin has trained writing teachers—over 500 of them—for 24 years. In 1981, he founded Minnesota's Program in Composition and Communication. Two years ago, its teacher-training program was recognized as one of ten nationally "exemplary" programs.

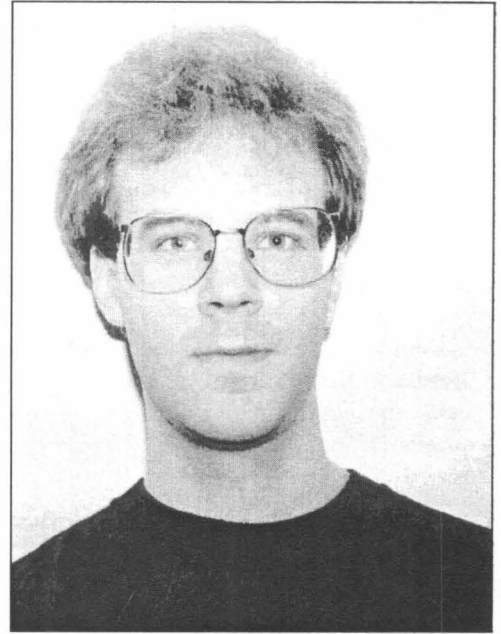


Professor Robin Brown earned his undergraduate degree in English and Chemistry from the University of Pittsburgh (1966), and an M.A. in English (1967) and Ph.D. in English Linguistics (1973) from The University of Michigan. He teaches and writes on linguistics, rhetoric, literacy and cultural studies, serving as Director of the graduate minor in Composition, Literacy and Rhetorical Studies, and Director of Lower-Division Composition. In 1981 he received the University's Morse-Amoco Alumni Award for Contributions to Undergraduate Education.

The clearest testimony comes in his students' words, eloquent in thanking Robin for humane, principled teaching. One alumna recalls working with him as a Teaching Assistant in a large linguistics course: "I walked into the Pizza Oven for lunch and found a group of our students talking animatedly about the course and their projects. Half jokingly, one of them said 'I want to be Robin when I grow up.' I've said the same thing myself." Dr. Jan Goodsitt, who says she found her career in Robin's undergraduate linguistics class is now a practicing psychologist, wrote: "When I think of Robin, I think of his gentle warmth and support, his respect for the talents of the invisible students like me, who are often dropped by other teachers because they require a little more time, a little more effort to reach. The brain-injured students, the older student returning to college, the single mother—maybe abused, often poor—Robin reaches out to them."

STUDENT SPEAKERS

Mark Carlson will graduate summa cum laude with a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics. While at the University he was a peer adviser for CLA Honors and was president of the CLA Student Board. Next year he will be attending graduate school at the University of California at Berkeley, and generally avoiding the real world a few more years. Marks speech is titled: "CLA, A Place to Find Home."



Student speaker **Chadwin Thomas** after five years of study is graduating cum laude with a Bachelor of Arts in Journalism, and minors in History and Political Science.

Chad grew up in the small town of Siren, Wisconsin. His high school class only had 30 students. His parents, Bruce and Janet, still live in the house in which he was raised. His sister Heather is a sophomore at the University of Wisconsin - Stout. Chad said it was a big adjustment for him to come to the University of Minnesota, but he has thoroughly enjoyed his time here.

Since arriving at the University, Chad has worked and interned at several media organizations including - The Minnesota Daily, The Saint Paul Pioneer Press, WCCO Television News and CNN Headline News in Atlanta, Georgia. His long-term goal is to work as a reporter covering public and international affairs.

Chad has also volunteered with the University YMCA and studied abroad in Tampere, Finland. It was during his time in Tampere, and also as a volunteer, that he said he learned the need for balance between career goals, service to one's community and spending time with family and friends.

Chad was recently chosen as Rotary Scholar to Germany for the autumn of 1997. He intends to work during the year prior to studying in Germany. Before he begins working, he will spend the first part of the summer with his family and friends in Siren and Minneapolis and the latter portion in Finland visiting friends.

He will speak today about serving one's community, pursuing dreams and finding balance in life. His speech is titled "Finding Your Ithaka."

HONORARY DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS

The honorary degree is the highest award conferred by the University of Minnesota. An honorary degree may be awarded to an individual who has achieved acknowledged eminence in cultural affairs, in public service, or in a field of knowledge and scholarship.

Joyce Chapman Lebra has a long and distinguished academic career and has made significant cultural contributions both nationally and internationally, especially in the Far East. She received a bachelors in Asian Studies at the University in 1947, earned an M.A. in Asian Studies under Harold Quigley in 1949, and a Ph.D. from Harvard/Radcliffe under the late Edwin O. Reischauer, before he became United States' ambassador to Japan during the Kennedy administration. She was the first woman in the U.S. to earn a Ph.D. in Japanese History.

She has been on the faculty of Rutgers University and has been a professor at the University of Colorado since 1962. She has held visiting professorships at the University of Hawaii; Macquarie University, Sydney, Australia; Northwestern University; University of Michigan; University of Texas and Seton Hall College.

Her professional life has been concentrated on teaching Japanese and Indian history and she has had ten books published on these subjects. She has also written on military history and on women's history and has lectured at universities throughout the world: Oxford, Hong Kong, Singapore, Canberra, Sydney, Waseda, and Calcutta. Her books have been published in seven countries and three have been translated into Japanese.

She has also been active on Boards of Rocky Mountain Japan Project and the Japan-American Society of Colorado and has been a member of many professional organizations. She is currently producing a play based on her latest book *Women's Voices in Hawaii*.

Dr. Lebra has received many fellowships and awards, including two Fulbrights and a National Endowment for the Humanities award. She was recently invited to deliver the 34th Annual Harmon Memorial Lecture at the U.S. Air Force Academy, the most prestigious lecture at the Academy. She is the only woman to have been so honored.



HORACE T. MORSE- MINNESOTA ALUMNI ASSOCIATION AWARDS

Each year since 1965, the University of Minnesota has recognized a select group of faculty members for outstanding contributions to undergraduate education. The Horace T. Morse-Minnesota Alumni Association Award recognized excellence in contributions to students' learning through teaching, research, and creative activities; advising; academic program development; and educational leadership. The award represents the highest recognition by the University community of its most distinguished scholar-teachers. Three of this year's ten awardees are from the College of Liberal Arts. They join 230 faculty members who have received the award in the past 31 years.

The awards are named for the late Horace T. Morse, first dean of the General College (1934-60) and a national leader in the field of undergraduate education. Funded by the Amoco Foundation for 22 years, the awards are administered by the Office of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and are now funded by the University of Minnesota Alumni Association (UMAA) and the University. Originally, the All-University Council on Liberal Education made awards to three faculty members identified as "making outstanding contributions to undergraduate education." Currently, under the leadership of the Senate Committee on Educational Policy (SCEP), the selection committee is composed of student and faculty members on SCEP, previous award recipients, and a UMAA representative.

In February 1992, 102 past awardees were honored at a presidential reception and were presented with a cast-bronze sculpture created by Katherine E. Nash (1910-82), professor of studio arts and a 1975 award recipient, to symbolize the striving for excellence that the award recognizes. The 1991-92 honorees received the last of the limited edition Nash sculptures. The 1993 ceremony marked the debut of a new crystal-like acrylic sculpture designed by Kristine A. Kirkely and individually etched by Frank R. Albrecht. Excellence is symbolized by the strength of a living tree as a source of enlightenment for students. In addition to the sculpture presented, awardees will receive a certificate of recognition and a cash gift. The recipients' departments will also receive a cash reward.



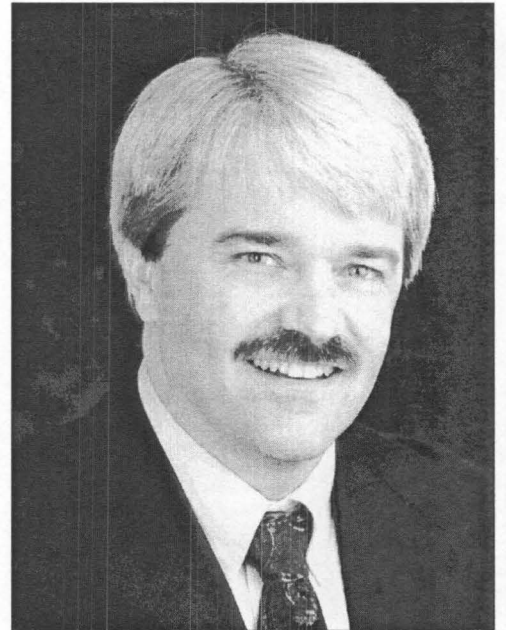
Judith A. Martin Associate Professor and Director of Urban Studies Program.

At a large research university, it is a special privilege to be closely connected to an interdisciplinary undergraduate program, such as Urban Studies. Owing to its liberal arts provenance, this program is, by definition, not “vocational”. I have chosen to think of it as an adventure in many kinds of learning, where the goal is for students to become informed, involved, and critical citizens of the metropolitan settings within which most of them will spend their lives. Students come to the University with different levels of urban experiences. For those few who have questions deriving from these experiences, and who want to explore beyond the accepted stereotypes, there is a place to go, and I get to share the adventure of learning with them a bit.

As a product of generations of Chicagoans, I realize that my biases in favor of cities are strong. Mine may not be a perspective initially shared by my students, but I try to communicate my sense that cities are immensely complex environments, with multiple paths toward learning. One of the most powerful is surely out in the field, actually observing and interacting. This is an approach I insist upon for all of my classes. As I understand it, my task is to engage students; to give them confidence enough to build on the urban

experiences they may already have, even as they search out new ones; and to move all of us toward more careful analysis and understanding. Here in our late 20th century metropolitan stew, it's hard for me to imagine a more interesting position to be in, or a more challenging thing to be doing.

Steven S. Smith Professor of Political Science, Prominent as one of America's top Congressional scholars, Smith successfully integrates research and teaching. In this age of cynicism about public life, motivating students to see value in politics while at the same time teaching critical thinking skills is Smith's most challenging goal — but one that he meets with energy and infectious enthusiasm. His goal in undergraduate teaching is to develop effective citizens. Effective citizens are engaged, understand the world around them, know the limits of their own knowledge, have skills for acquiring and interpreting information on their own, and ground their action in basic values. They understand the importance of institutions, rules, and practices, appreciate their rich intellectual and social inheritance, and yet remain critical of the received wisdom. My own field, the development of democratic political institutions, gives me a chance to address the responsibilities of citizenship explicitly and extensively in both teaching and research.



LIBERAL ARTS DEGREES

The College of Liberal Arts offers five bachelor's degrees—bachelor of arts (B.A.), bachelor of fine arts (B.F.A.), bachelor of science (B.S.), bachelor of individualized studies (B.I.S.), and bachelor of music (B.M.). The bachelor's degrees have many requirements in common.

DEGREE CANDIDATES

Subject to successful completion, degrees will be conferred on those students listed below and on others meeting all curriculum requirements for graduation. ASSOCIATE IN LIBERAL ARTS

The Associate of Liberal Arts is a two-year degree, now discontinued, that is comprised of a portion of the general education requirements for the baccalaureate degree. This degree is conferred only upon special permission of the college.

ACADEMIC COSTUME

Academic gowns date back to the 14th century, when they served two functions of nearly equal importance: to indicate the academic rank of the wearer and to keep the scholar warm in the drafty stone halls of academia.

The markings, cut, and colors of modern-day academic-costume—cap, gown, and sometimes hood— indicate the academic degree, the field of study, and the institution that granted the degree.

Master's gowns, black and untrimmed, have pointed sleeves. Doctor's gowns in the United States traditionally have been black with velvet front facings and crossbars on the sleeves, but in recent years a number of universities have adopted gowns of distinctive school colors.

A new University of Minnesota Ph.D. gown and matching tam made their appearance in 1988 to celebrate the centenary of the first Minnesota doctor of philosophy degree. The new Minnesota gown is maroon-trimmed with black velvet chevrons and gold metallic braid. The traditional gown may still be worn.

The Minnesota hood, which may be worn by anyone with a doctoral degree from the University of Minnesota, is black with maroon chevron on gold. Each institution has its own pattern of colors on the hood, worn around the neck and down the back of the gown. The length and shape of the hood identify the most advanced degree the wearer has earned, and the velvet edging shows the field: blue for doctor of philosophy, light blue for doctor of education, and pink for doctor of musical arts.

At commencement ceremonies hoods are worn by those who already have the doctoral degree. Degree candidates wear the gowns appropriate for the degrees they are about to receive, and new doctorates are hooded on stage.

THE MACE

The University of Minnesota mace was carried for the first time in 1961 by Regent's Professor of Physics Alfred O.C. Nier at the inauguration of President O. Meredith Wilson. Art professor Philip Morton designed the mace: a crystal sphere four inches in diameter surmounted by the North Star, symbol of the state of Minnesota, on a solid aluminum handle set with the University regent's seal.

THE NORTHROP ORGAN

Comprising 108 ranks of pipes, the Northrop Auditorium Organ is not only one of the largest organs in the Upper Midwest, but is one of the finest extant examples of a late-romantic concert-hall organ in the United States. Built in 1932, the organ is located in the ceiling of the auditorium, above the stage and behind the proscenium, and is placed from a console on an elevator platform in the orchestra pit. Unlike many large organs from its era, the Northrop Organ is completely unaltered and entirely intact in its original condition.
