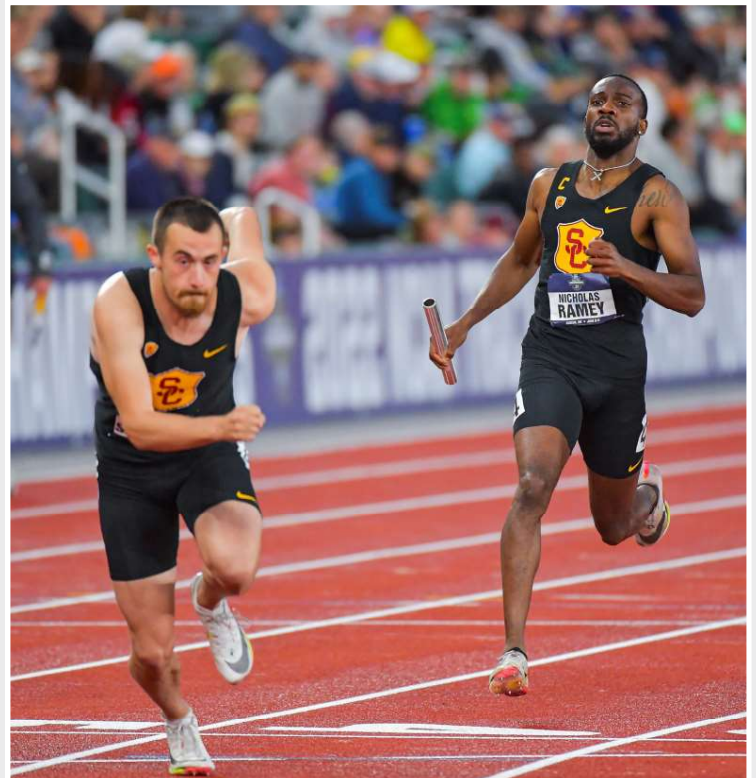

Men's Relays Shine At The NCAA Championships

2023 USC Season Outlook

USC RELOADED FOR NCAA RUN

The Trojans have re-vamped the track and field roster from last season by bringing in 34 new athletes, but it also will feature most of their NCAA scorers from a year ago. Second-year Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts took over the program last season after eight years as an assistant and the Trojans continued to roll. He since has demonstrated his recruiting prowess to load up the roster for a title run at both the conference and national level.

The men's team tied for 12th at the 2022 NCAA Championships and received a great boost when Davonte Burnett and Brendon Stewart decided to return for one more season. Burnett was the 2022 NCAA 60m champion and ran a time of 9.99 in the 100m dash last season to tie for second on USC's all-time list before injury at the Pac-12 Championships took him out of the rest of the postseason.



The sprint corps figures once again to be the key to the men's season. Stewart ran his best times at the end of the season, posting a PR of 10.16 and reaching the NCAA semifinals in the 100m dash. Stewart teamed with Ashton Allen, Johnnie Blockburger and the graduated Kasaun James to win the 2022 NCAA 4x100m relay title with a school-record time of 38.49. Blockburger won his second consecutive Pac-12 400m title last season and reached the NCAA semifinal in the event. Blockburger also ran on USC's 4x400m relay which took second at the NCAA Championships with a time of 2:59.98, second-fastest in school history. Allen grew tremendously as a runner last season and great things are surely in store for him this season.

The Trojans really loaded up in the sprints during the offseason. Graduate student Chris Borzor comes to USC from Cincinnati where he set three school records and has bests of 10.33 in the 100m, 20.55 in the 200m and 46.15 in the 400m. Freshman Justin Braun had a 400m PR of 45.65 which was the best among all high school runners in 2022. Freshman Bryce Brock was the CIF San Diego Section 100m champion, while freshman William Jones has a PR of 46.29 in the 400m, 7th among 2022 high school athletes and he won the New Balance Indoor Nationals 400m title. Freshman Jaalen Knox placed fifth in the 200m and eighth in the 100m at the 2022 CIF Championships. Graduate transfer Matthew Okonkwo owns two UC Davis school records and reached the 2022 NCAA West Preliminary Rounds in the 200m. Graduate transfer Michael Phillippy from Princeton owns a PR of 45.93 in the 400m and reached the 2022 NCAA semifinals in the event. Freshman Max Thomas has legal PRs of 10.40 in the 100m and 20.68 in the 200m, the latter which ranked seventh nationally among 2022 high schoolers.

Senior and two-time All-American hurdler Tade Ojora returns to anchor the hurdlers group. Ojora ranks fifth on USC's all-time 110m hurdles list with a time of 13.38 and this season he will have help. Sophomore Johnny Brackins Jr. transferred to USC just after the 2022 NCAA Championships. He has a legal best of 13.62 in the 110m hurdles and reached the 2022 NCAA semifinals in the event, then went on to take sixth at the USA U20 Championships. Those championships were won by fellow freshman Malix Mixon, who took the title with a wind-aided time of 13.28. Mixon has PRs of 13.27 in the 110m hurdles and 51.90 in the 400m hurdles, making him one of the greatest double hurdlers to ever come out of the high school ranks. Freshman Tamaal Myers also

is a key addition in the hurdles, as he has PRs of 13.93 in the 110m hurdles and 51.46 in the 400m hurdles. Myers was the top returning high school 400m hurdler in 2022, but was hampered by injuries most of the season, but closed with a time of 51.70. Senior Zion Gordon returns and if he returns to heath could provide USC with yet another top-notch hurdling threat. He has a best 110m hurdles time of 13.62.

The Trojans have also restocked the shelves with jumpers. Brackins Jr. won the 2022 Big 12 long jump title with a PR of 26-5.50 (8.06m). He already ranks fifth on USC's all-time list by jumping 26-4.25 (8.03m) to win at the USATF U20 Championships this past summer. He earned All-America honors during the 2022 indoor season by placing seventh in the long jump at the NCAA Indoor Championships, then took fifth at the 2023 Championships with the second-farthest jump in USC history of 26-9.25. Freshman JC Stevenson placed second in the triple jump and third in the long jump at the 2022 CIF state championships and has a best long jump of 24-9.50 and triple jump of 48-10.50. He also showed that big things are in store as he set the USC freshman indoor long jump record with a mark of 25-3.25.

Freshman Elias Gerald was named the 2022 Utah Boy's Track & Field Player of the Year, following winning the state high jump and long jump titles the past two years. He has a high jump best of 7-0.25 which is a Utah 6A state record and a long jump best of 23-3.50. Gerald also cleared 7-2 in the high jump indoors which ranked tops among all high schoolers. Junior Dallas Wise and senior Austin Allen return to complete the jumps group. Wise has PRs of 24.8.25 in the long jump, 50-3.25 in the triple jump and 6-10.75 in the high jump. Allen placed second in the long jump at the USC-UCLA Dual Meet and competed in the event at the 2022 Pac-12 Championships.

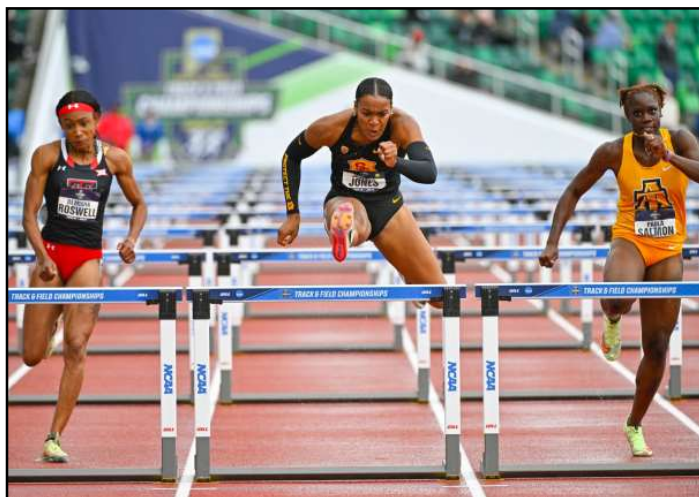
USC returns most of its distance group, headed by graduate student Bobby Poynter. Poynter enters the 2023 season ranked sixth on USC's all-time indoor 800m list and ninth on its one-mile list. He reached the second round of the 2022 NCAA West Preliminary Rounds after posting a PR of 1:48.03 in the first round. He also placed fourth in the 800m dash at the 2022 Pac-12 Championships. Junior Jack Carter is in his third season at USC and set both his indoor and outdoor 800m PRs last season and also set his outdoor 1500m best. Sophomore Morgan Fierro showed his versatility and heart to USC last season setting his 1500m PR then running in the 400m hurdles and the steeplechase trying to help the Trojans earn points. Junior Josh Ligas returns after a year off due to injury. He competed for USC at the 2021 Pac-12 Championships in the 800m. Kennie Arriola, Dylan Gatua and Alex Mainvielle begin their second seasons with USC, after battling injuries their first season. The Trojans have added to key distance runners in Darius Rainey and Charlie Jeffreson. Rainey led his high school team to back-to-back state titles by winning the 400m and 800m both seasons. He has a best 400m time of 45.92, fourth among 2022 high schoolers, which he ran to take fourth at the USATF U20 Championships. He also has an 800m PR of 1:50.63. Jeffreson was a late add to the roster. The Australian



The throws group for the first time in over 30 years will have a new voice instructing them, as Martin Maric took over the role as throws coach for the 2023 season, taking over for longtime decorated throws coach Dan Lange. Redshirt junior Christian Johnson improved throughout the 2022 season and placed eighth in the hammer throw at the Pac-12 Cham-

pionships. He owns a PR of 218-1 (66.48m). Sophomore Nikolaos Polychroniou ranks fourth on USC's indoor weight throw list. He was slowed by injuries outdoors, but did return to throw 217-11 (66.42m) to place sixth at the Pac-12 Championships. During the summer he placed fourth in the hammer throw at the 2022 World U20 Championships. Redshirt senior Dylan Lange returns at the Trojans top javelin thrower. He took second in the event with a PR of 164-6 (59.15m) at the USC-UCLA Dual Meet.

The women's team returns all of its scoring from a year ago, as only junior hurdler Jasmine Jones reached the podium, but there is plenty of returning fire-power. Jones took second in the 100m hurdles with a PR of 12.66 at the 2022 NCAA Championships which moved her into fourth on USC's all-time hurdles list. Sophomore Jalaysiya Smith gives the Trojans a strong 1-2 punch in the event as she had a PR of 13.05 to place 12th at the 2022 NCAA Championships. That time moved her to ninth on USC's all-time list. Freshman Kiara Strayhorn is a versatile talent and will be used in a variety of ways, but comes to USC with a PR of 13.78 in the 100m hurdles. Also, multi-event specialist graduate transfer Allie Jones has a 100m hurdles PR of 13.37. In the 400m hurdles, senior Breanna Bernard-Joseph has scored at the Pac-12 Championships in the 400m H the last two seasons and owns a PR of 57.44 which ranks ninth on USC's all-time list. Sophomore Maci Simmons had a strong first season as a Trojan, posting a PR of 59.67 and then placing sixth in the 400m hurdles at the Pac-12 Championships.



The strength of the women's team may be in the depth of talent in the sprint corps. The returning veterans are Jan'Taijah Jones, Bailey Lear, Kimberly Harris, Samirah Moody, Chioma Okonkwo, Rae-Anne Serville and Zion Corrales-Nelson. Jones won the 2022 Pac-12 400m title with a time of 51.22 which moved her to seventh on USC's all-time list in the event. Just ahead of her on the list is Bailey Lear who has a best of 51.02. She reached the NCAA semifinals in the event last season, after placing third in the 400m at the Pac-12 Championships. Harris is returning from an injury-plagued season, but she still was able to take third in the 400m at the USC-UCLA Dual Meet and place ninth at the Pac-12 Championships. Freshman Yemi John from London, England comes to USC as the reigning World U20 champion in the 400m and in her first indoor race with USC moved into the Trojans' all-time indoor 400m list. She also set the USC freshman record which had been set earlier in the indoor season by Christine M. Mallard. Junior Rae-Anne Serville returns from an injury-plagued season, but she has a sub-53 PR in the 400m. Another freshman Takiya Cenci also adds to the depth in the event.

The sophomore Moody was slowed by an injury early in her freshman campaign, but returned late to help the Trojans in the postseason and created excitement about what a healthy sophomore season could deliver. In her short season she was able to deliver PRs of 11.24 in the 100m and 23.25 in the 200m. During the 2023 indoor season, Moody set the USC 60m record of 7.07. Graduate transfer Caisja Chandler comes to USC from Cincinnati with PRs of 11.26 in the 100m and 22.79 in the 200m and was a 2022 NCAA semifinalist in both events. She placed seventh in the 200m at the 2023 NCC Indoor Championships. Senior Chioma Okonkwo established her 100m and 200m PRs last season as she has focused on the shorter sprints. Graduate student Zion Corrales-Nelson had not been able to compete much the past two seasons since her transfer from California, but has PRs of 11.41 in the 100m and 23.16 in the 200m. Freshman Jassani Carter joins the sprint mix with bests of 11:53 in the 100m and 23.43 in the 200m.

The women's jumps unit was basically junior Temi Ojora last season, who placed second in the triple jump and third in the long jump at the 2022 Pac-12 Championships. This year she has four talented newcomers joining her.

Junior transfer Dominique Ruotolo earned All-America honors in 2022 in the triple jump, placing seventh, after taking second in the long jump and third in the triple jump at the Pac-12 championships. Freshman Jada Foreman won the 2022 New Balance Indoor triple jump title, as well as the Virginia triple jump and long jump titles. Freshman Kiara Strayhorn set the Missouri high school state long jump record and won the state long jump title as a junior and senior. Freshman Lauren Reed placed seventh in the CIF triple jump and reached the long jump finals.

Junior Summer Mosley and grad student Karlee Freeman return to anchor the throws group. Mosley set her discus and hammer throw PRs last season and moved to eighth on USC's all-time discus throw list. She also advanced to the NCAA West Preliminary Rounds in both events. Freeman ranks fourth on USC's all-time discus throw list and ninth on its shot put list and has returned for her fifth season. The newcomer in the group is graduate transfer Kamryn Elgersma who comes to USC from Division III Calvin University. Also returning for the Trojans are junior javelin thrower Annabel Doherty and redshirt sophomore Abbey Knoll, who competes in the hammer throw and discus throw.

Coach Jebreh Harris has some nice additions to his young distance group. Sophomore Gigi Maccagnini had a strong indoor season and freshmen Lucy Westlake and Ashlee Gallergos were USC's leading runners during the cross country season, and not far behind them was newcomer sophomore Vienna Gao. Senior Janiah Brown is USC's top returning 800m runner from last season with a best of 2:06.04. Veteran leader senior Brooke Rodi heads the remainder of the distance group which includes senior Mihajla Milovanovic, junior Alyssa Blockburger, sophomores Isabelle Cairns, Maya Lacamp and Giovanna Pisano and redshirt freshman Jacqueline Duarte and freshman Liyat Kebede.

The multi-events are in good hands with Allie Jones. She placed second at the 2023 NCAA Indoor Championships in the pentathlon, after taking seventh in the heptathlon at the 2022 NCAA Outdoor Championships. Strayhorn will also be learning the trade and has a high upside in the event.

There are a lot of different pieces, but there is no denying the depth and the talent of the 2023 Trojans. As Quincy Watts demonstrated in his first season, he has no problem putting the pieces together which should make the 2023 outdoor season a special ride for the Trojans.

QUINCY WATTS

USC Director of Track & Field | First Season/9th With Program

Former Trojan Olympic great Quincy Watts is in his second season in charge of the Trojans' program as he was promoted to USC Director of Track and Field and Cross Country on June 17, 2021 after eight seasons on Caryl Smith Gilbert's staff as an assistant in charge of sprints, long hurdles and relays.

In his nine seasons working with USC athletes, he has guided Trojans to 91 indoor and outdoor All-America honors in the 400 meters, 400-meter hurdles and 4x400-meter relay. His Trojan athletes also claimed 20 NCAA titles and 29 Pac-12 crowns, and they set three collegiate records and 24 school records plus all four USC freshman 400-meter records and the women's 400-meter hurdles freshman record.

In his inaugural season as a head coach in 2022, Watts led USC to some pretty impressive accomplishments. His athletes posted 16 outdoor and 17 indoor all-time USC indoor marks, including setting five school records. Trojans setting USC records were Davonte Burnett in the 60m, Summer Mosley in the women's weight throw, Alyssa Brewer the women's indoor 800m, Janiah Brown, Gigi Maccagnini, Jemima Russell and Brewer in the women's 4x800m relay and Kasau James, Brendon Stewart, Ashton Allen and Johnnie Blockburger in the men's 4x100m relay, set in winning the NCAA title. The men's team placed 12th at the NCAA Championships, after taking third at the Pac-12 Championships, while the women were 30th at NAAs and fourth at Pac-12s.

Watts was named 2022 NCAA Indoor West Region Coach of the Year and had athletes earn 12 indoor All-America honors and earn 11 first-team outdoor All-America status. In addition, USC athletes combined to earn 23 All-Academic honor roll designations for the Winter and Spring semesters. The Trojans also swept the annual dual meet against UCLA. Watts also continues coaching USA Olympic medalists Michael Norman, Rai Benjamin and Kendall Ellis. Norman won gold medals in the 400m and with the USA 4x400m relay team and Benjamin a silver medal in the 400m hurdles at the 2022 World Athletics Championships.

He was the 2021 U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association National Outdoor Women's Assistant Coach of the Year as well as the West Region Indoor and Outdoor Women's Assistant Coach of the Year. At the 2021 NCAA Indoor meet, he helped Kaelin Roberts to her second 400-meter title and the women's 4x400-meter relay team to a second place finish, while at last week's NCAA Outdoor meet Anna Cockrell was the 400-meter hurdles champ, the women won the 4x100-meter relay and three women earned All-America honors in the 400 meters (the first time by any school in the event since 2014).

In his eight years (2014-21) as a USC assistant, the Women of Troy had four Top 3 finishes at the NCAA meet, including winning it in 2018 and 2021 and placing second in 2019, and they never finished below second place at the Pac-12 meet. The Trojan men had a quartet of Top 5 NCAA finishes and Pac-12 runner-up finishes.

Watts guided Trojans to 86 indoor and outdoor All-America honors in the 400 meters, 400-meter hurdles and 4x400-meter relay. His Trojan athletes also claimed 19 NCAA titles and 26 Pac-12 crowns, and they set three collegiate records and 24 school records plus all four USC freshman 400-meter records and the women's 400-meter hurdles freshman record.

Besides Cockrell and Roberts, among the other champion Trojan athletes that Watts has coached are Michael Norman, Rai Benjamin, Ricky Morgan Jr., Cameron Samuel, Kendall Ellis, Kyra Constantine, Bailey Lear, Jaide Stepter, Amalie Luel, Nicole Yeargin and Vanessa Jones.

The 2020 season did not finish due to COVID-19, but he guided Kyra

Constantine, Bailey Lear and Kaelin Roberts to indoor 400m All-America honors and those three and Anna Cockrell to All-America honors in the indoor 4x400m relay

In 2019, Watts guided Kaelin Roberts to the NCAA Indoor 400m title and Kyra Constantine to both indoor and outdoor All-America honors in the event. In addition, the women's 4x400m relay earned All-America honors both indoors and outdoors. Watts was named the 2019 West Region Indoor Assistant Coach of the Year.

In 2018 Watts helped guide his athletes to a banner year which earned him U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTF-CCCA) Men's Assistant Coach of the Year and NCAA West Region Assistant Coach of the Year honors. Watts guided Michael Norman in the 400m dash and the men's 4x400m relay team of Ricky Morgan Jr., Rai Benjamin, Zach Shinnick and Norman to NCAA titles and collegiate records at the 2018 NCAA T&F Championships. Norman won the 400m race with a collegiate, NCAA Championships and Hayward Field record time of 43.61. The 4x400m relay won its title with an all-time NCAA, NCAA Championships and school-record time of 2:59.00. Watts also coached Norman to a Pac-12 400m title with a time of 44.40. He also guided the 4x100m relay to a Pac-12 title and this season it posted two of the top five times ever by Trojans in the event. He also guided Rai Benjamin to a time of 44.74 in the 400m, sixth on USC's all-time list and fifth in the country during the regular season. Kendall Ellis set the USC indoor and outdoor 400m records and became the third NCAA woman athlete to run sub-50 in the 400m when she won the Pac-12 title with a time of 49.99. Ellis placed second in the 400m at the NCAA Championships and then ran an epic anchor leg for USC's women's 4x400m relay which won with a time of 3:27.06 to clinch the team title. Ellis' time of 50.34 to win the NCAA indoor title set the USC, collegiate and USA 400m records. Watts continues to train Olympians Norman and Benjamin who began their professional careers after combining to set three collegiate records at the NCAA Championships.

In 2017, Watts guided Ellis to then USC records in the women's indoor (51.52) and outdoor (50.00) 400m race, a second-place finish at the NCAA

- Watts attended USC from 1989-92 and won the 1992 NCAA 400m title with a meet-record time of 44.00. He still in the USC 400m record-holder with a time of 43.50 and was inducted into the USC Athletics Hall of Fame in 2012
- Won the 1992 Olympic gold medal in the 400m and the 4x400m relay

Indoor Championships and a third-place finish at the Outdoor Championships. Cameron Pettigrew also reached the women's final and Michael Norman also became a 400m All-American on the men's side. Norman also set the USC freshman record with a time of 44.60. Both Norman and Ellis also won Pac-12 400m titles. Watts again had great success with the relays with the women's 4x400m relay winning the indoor title and placing second outdoors, while setting the indoor collegiate record (3:27.03) and running the second-fastest time ever outdoors (3:23.35). The men's team set the school indoor record and ran its fastest outdoor time since 2012. Ellis also qualified during the summer to represent the USA in the 400m at the World Championships. Watts also worked with the 400m hurdlers Anna Cockrell and Amalie Luel, who placed second and third respectively at the NCAA Championships and Cockrell setting the Trojan freshman record with a time of 55.14 at the USA T&F Championships.

In 2016, Ricky Morgan garnered 400m All-America honors and Jaide Stepter set the then school indoor and outdoor 400m records. The USC women's relays both set school records. Stepter also was a 400m hurdles All-American, won her third consecutive conference hurdles title and tied the school record with a time of 54.95 at the USA T&F Championships. He also worked with Pac-12 heptathlon champion Amalie Luel, guiding her to a time of 2:06.34 in the 800m race which clinched the title and was the 10th-fastest time ever run by a Trojan woman.

In 2015 he coached Vanessa Jones to the Pac-12 women's 400m title and Ellis to the USC women's freshman outdoor 400m record and Morgan to the men's freshman indoor record. All three runners advanced to the NCAA semifinals in the event. At the time, Jones ran the second-fastest 400m time ever by a USC woman of 51.50 to win the conference title. Ellis' freshman record of 52.32 was set in winning the 400m at the USATF Juniors. He also guided the talented quartet of Stepter, Amalie Luel, Ellis and Jones which won the Pac-12 title, earned a second-place finish at the NCAA Championships and set both the USC indoor and outdoor 4x400m records. Luel and Stepter were All-Americans in the 400m hurdles and Stepter won the Pac-12 title in the event.

In his first season back home at USC, Watts helped guide the men's and women's sprinters post some impressive marks. His best works was with the 400m runners as Akawkaw Ndigagbor won the MPSF indoor 400m title and then earned indoor All-America honors and set the school indoor record. Three USC women and one male scored at the Pac-12 Championships in the 400m dash. Stepter won her first Pac-12 400m hurdles title.

Watts spent the 2012 and 2013 seasons as an assistant coach at CS Northridge, primarily working with the distance runners and cross country team. Prior to that, he was an assistant coach at Harvard-Westlake High in Los Angeles (Calif.), where he helped develop one of the strongest distance programs in the country. He began his coaching career as head coach at his prep alma mater, Taft High in Woodland Hills (Calif.).

Watts came to USC from Taft specializing in the 100- and 200-meter dashes, then turned into one of the best 400-meter runners in Trojan history. The four-year (1989-92) letterman won the 1992 NCAA 400-meter race in 44.00, a meet record that stood for 25 years. Watts also ran the anchor leg on the 4x400-meter relay team that set a school record of 3:00.58 while placing second at those NAAs. As a junior, he finished second in the 400 meters at the 1991 NCAA Championships.

Watts, who was inducted into the USC Athletic Hall of Fame in 2012, also was a wide receiver on the Trojan football team in 1990.

At the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, Watts twice broke Lee Evans' Olympic record in winning the 400 meters. He ran 43.71 in the semifinal before clocking 43.50 in the final (that still stands as the USC record) to become the first 400-meter athlete to run sub-44.0 in a championship meet. He then teamed with Andrew Valmon, Michael Johnson and Steve Lewis to win the gold in the 4x400-meter relay in a then-world record time of 2:55.74 (he ran the second leg in a blistering 43.10).

He also earned a gold medal in the 4x400-meter relay at the 1993 World Championships (in a still-standing world record time of 2:54.29), and a silver medal in that relay at the 1991 World Championships.

Watts was ranked in the world Top 10 in the 400 meters for four consecutive years (1991-94), including No. 1 in 1992.

A native of Detroit, Mich., he was born on June 19, 1970. He and his wife, Kelly, have three children, daughters Talize and Kylie and son Quincy Jr.

ASSISTANT COACHES

JEBREH HARRIS

Assoc. Head Coach Cross Country, Asst. Coach T&F | Third Season



Jebreh Harris is in his second season as USC's associate head coach of cross country and assistant track and field coach for distances, third overall, begin promoted to the current position by Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts in the summer of 2021. Harris was originally named the assistant coach for distances and cross country with the USC track and field program on Oct. 21, 2020.

In his second season at the helm of the distance program, Harris led USC athletes to a pair

of school records. The women's 4x800m relay team of Janiah Brown, Gigi Maccagnini, Jemima Russell and Alyssa Brewer placed third in the 4x800m relay at the Texas Relays with a time of 8:38.89. Also, Brewer set the women's indoor 800m record with a time of 2:04.81, while Maccagnini ran the fifth-fastest indoor 800m time of 2:06.40 and Brown the 10th-fastest time of 2:10.30. For the men's team, Bobby Poynter entered into the USC all-time indoor top 10 in the 800m, 1500m and 1-mile, as well as Jack Carter in the 800m and Dylan Gatua in the 3000m. During the outdoor season, all four Trojan male 800m runners set PRs. During the cross country season, USC hosted the Pac-12 Cross Country Championships and three Trojans set personal bests in the race. As a team, the Trojans placed third at the Mark Covert Invitational, tying for the best USC team finish since winning the 2016 Pepperdine Invitational.

In his first season at USC which didn't begin until late October, Harris guided Isaiah Jewett to a berth on the U.S. Olympic team and to the NCAA and Pac-12 men's 800m titles. Jewett set the school record with a time of 1:44.68 to earn the first NCAA 800m title by a Trojan on June 11, then broke it with a time of 1:43.85 on June 21 at the U.S. Team Trials to finish second and make the U.S. Olympic team for the Tokyo Olympics. Jewett improved over two seconds in his one season working with Harris and broke the school record by more than a second, a record which had stood for 33 years. George Gleason in his one season of working with Harris posted two USC all-time top 10 times, running the third-fastest 5000m time of 14:12.16 and the fifth-fastest 1500m time ever by a Trojan of 3:4 4.15. Alyssa Brewer and Jemima Russell both advanced to the NCAA West Preliminary Rounds in the women's 800m.

Harris came to USC from Illinois, where he served as an assistant coach for middle distances and long sprints the two previous seasons. Prior to his stint at Illinois Harris was the head cross country and assistant track and field coach at UNLV from 2012-18. He was also the recruiting coordinator at UNLV for both the track and cross country programs. In addition he served at the 2019 U20 Pan American women's distance coach, the 2018 IAAF U20 World Team men's distance coach and the 2016 U23 NACAC event manager.

In his short time at Illinois, Harris coached freshman Tracy Towns to one of the top 1000m times in program history (2:49.16), later that indoor season Towns scored in the 2020 Big 10 Indoor Championships while racing in

the 800m. Also at the 2020 Big 10 Indoor Championships, Harris' event group contributed to scoring points for the Fighting Illini in the men's and women's DMR. Unfortunately due to COVID-19, the outdoor season was cancelled. At the 2019 Big 10 Indoor Championships the Illini Women's DMR took third place with Felicia Phillips contributing on the 400m leg. Konrad Eiring placed first in the 1000m at the Larry Wiecezorek Invitational earning him a personal best time in the event (2:26.10).

In his time at UNLV, Harris coached Avi' Tal Wilson-Perteete to the second fastest NCAA 800m time of 2:01.14. Wilson-Perteete earned second-team All-America honors in the 800m for both the indoor and outdoor seasons and broke the Mountain West record in the 800m. Harris also coached Kaysee Pilgrim to a third-place finish in the high jump at NCAA Championships in 2017 and she posted a PR of 6-2.75 earlier that season. Pilgrim earned first-team All-American honors in the high jump and set the Conference record in the high jump.

In total, Harris coached five individual and five relay MWC Conference Champions and 20 All-Conference track and field performances at UNLV. He assisted in leading the UNLV track & field program to the Mountain West Conference Indoor Championship title in 2018. Harris coached UNLV school records in six events: the indoor and outdoor Distance Medley Relay (DMR), indoor 800m, indoor 600m, indoor 5k and outdoor high jump. The 2018 indoor DMR team clocked a time of 11:31.59A, breaking a previous school record that had stood for 20 years.

Before UNLV, Harris spent two years at South Carolina State as assistant head coach of cross country and track & field. He coached Seymour Walter when Walter broke the U.S. Virgin Islands national record in the 800m, posting a time of 1:49.19. Walter went on to compete at NACAC U23, CAC, and World University Games for the USVI. Harris also coached the women's cross-country team to runner-up in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. He coached Brittany Stewart to an outdoor 5K conference title, and to a second-place finish at cross country conference championships. 23 school records were broken in his tenure at SCSU.

Harris began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant coach for five years at the University of Tennessee. In 2005, he was on a staff under cross country coach, George Watts where the cross-country team made its first NCAA Championships appearance in three seasons. As a volunteer coach he assisted Tennessee in achieving a team title at the 2003 SEC Indoor Track & Field Championship.

A native of Decatur, Georgia, Harris ran collegiately at the University of Tennessee, where he earned his undergraduate degree in graphic design in 2002. He was a two-time NCAA All-American in the distance medley and the 4x400m relay. He helped lead the team to both NCAA and SEC Outdoor Championships team titles in 2001. Harris also competed at Alabama State prior to Tennessee where he earned all-conference awards in cross country and track & field.

Following college he had a strong professional career which included being ranked No. 2 in the U.S. in the 800m in 2007 and posting a PR of 1:45.56. He competed in two U.S. Olympic Trials finals in the 800m (2004 & 2008) and at seven USATF Championships in total. He ran the leadoff leg for USA's 4x800m relay team which set the U.S. record with a time of 7:02.82 at the Memorial Van Damme Meet in Brussels, Belgium on August 25, 2006, a record which still stands.

MARTIN MARIC

Assistant Coach, Throws | First Season

Two-time Olympian Martin Maric was named the USC assistant track and field coach for the throws, it was announced by Director of Track & Field and Cross Country Quincy Watts on Sept. 2, 2022.

Maric was the throws coach at Virginia from 2013-22, where he produced four NCAA champion throwers, 29 All-Americans and 18 ACC Champions. Two times he was named the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year.

He was named the 2022 Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year as he guided Claudio Romero to the NCAA discus throw title (217-1). He also led Ethan Dabbs to the USATF Outdoor Championships javelin throw title (266-8) and to a second-place finish in the event at the NCAA Championships (261-5).

In all, the Virginia throwers set four outdoor school records and two ACC records during the 2022 campaign. He guided Maria Deaviz to the Virginia indoor shot put record with a mark of 54-11.50 and to the school's outdoor record with a mark of 56-10. Maric guided the Virginia men and women to four ACC titles during the indoor and outdoor seasons. His throwers recorded eight All-ACC honors and five All-American honors in 2022.

In 2021, Ethan Dabbs repeated as the ACC javelin champion, and Claudio Romero captured his first conference discus crown. At the NCAA Championships, Romero finished first, and freshman Jacob Lemmon placed fifth to give UVA a pair of All-Americans in the event.

While the 2020 outdoor season did not take place due to the pandemic, Maric's athletes recorded three All-America honors during the 2019 season as Ethan Dabbs (javelin), Hilmar Jonsson (hammer) and Oghenakpobo Efekoro (shot put) competed at the 2019 NCAA Outdoor Championships. All three athlete also captured ACC titles in their respective events. Jonsson became the first male ACC competitor to capture four consecutive titles in the hammer throw. Jonsson also set the Icelandic national record in the event during the regular season.

During the 2018 season, Hilmar Jonsson captured his third ACC title in the hammer throw. He advanced to the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, earning second-team All-America honors in the event. Maric led the Cavaliers to a program-best third place finish at the 2017 NCAA Outdoor Championships. Virginia scored in five throwing events, tallying all 36 of the team's points, the most by a throwing unit since SMU in 2002. Filip Mihaljevic captured the NCAA title in the shot put and discus, earning him recognition as a Bowerman semifinalist. Mihaljevic was named the ACC Outdoor Field Athlete of the Year, ACC Championships Outdoor Field MVP, the 2017 USTFCCCA Southeast Regional Field Athlete of the Year and ACC Outdoor Scholar Athlete. At the ACC Championships, Mihaljevic placed first in the shot put and discus, while Hilmar Jonsson won the hammer title. Maric led five males and one female student-athletes to All-American honors. Jordan Young was named an All-American in the weight throw at the NCAA Indoor Championships, finishing third in the event. He also won the ACC title in the event, earning the Indoor ACC Field Performer of the Year. Mihaljevic finished first in the shot put at the conference meet.

Maric's group had a stellar 2015 season, which earned him USTFCCCA Southeast Region Men's Assistant Coach of the Year honors. He guided the throwers to six NCAA Championship entries during the outdoor season, as Jordan Young was the only male to compete in three individual events in Eugene. Young earned first-team All-America honors in both the discus and hammer throw, while Filip Mihaljevic finished third in the discus.

The Cavaliers broke four school records during the outdoor season, with Mihaljevic setting the marks in the shot put and discus, Young in the hammer throw and Christine Bohan in the shot put. During the indoor season, Young had a fourth-place finish in the weight throw at the NCAA Championships. Between the indoor and outdoor seasons, Mihaljevic and Young won a combined four ACC Championships.

Maric spent the 2015-16 school year as a member of the Virginia IM-Rec staff.

In 2014, Maric coached Mihaljevic, the ACC Outdoor Track & Field Freshman of the Year. Mihaljevic won the ACC Outdoor Championship in the discus and earned first-team All-America honors in both the shot put and discus.

Maric is the Croatian national record holder in the discus throw with a mark of 222-10 (67.92m) and he represented his home country in the discus at the 2008 Olympics in Beijing and the 2012 Games in London. He finished 29th in 2008 before placing 17th in 2012. He was named Croatian Athlete of the Year for this effort in London.

He also represented Croatia at the 2011 World Championships in Dague, South Korea, and at the 2007 and 2009 World University Games.

Maric competed collegiately at California and was the NCAA champion in the discus throw in 2009 (196-3), as well as an All-American in the discus in 2008 and the javelin throw in 2007.

Maric spent the springs of 2010 and 2011 as a volunteer assistant coach at the University of Florida and served as an assistant coach at the ASK Split Athletic Club in his native Split, Croatia.

Maric graduated from California with a bachelor's degree in political economy of industrial societies in 2009. He then completed a Master's degree program in Exercise Physiology at Virginia in 2015.

He and his wife, Danielle, have a six-month old son, Elijah.

TYREE PRICE

Assistant Coach, Jumps & Multi Events | Second Season

Veteran jumps coach and 2020 USTFCCCA South Region Women's Indoor Assistant Coach of the Year Tyree Price was named the Trojans' assistant coach for jumps and multi-events by Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts on July 22, 2021. He begins his second season as the leader of the USC jumps and multi-events programs.

In his first season with the Trojans he had a limited roster, but was still able to guide USC to some impressive results.

Earnest Sears III had the second-highest jump in school history of 7-6.50 to win the Mt. SAC title and then he won the Pac-12 title with a clearance of 7-1.50. He advanced to the NCAA Championships, but finished tied for 10th. Also scoring for USC at the Pac-12 Championships for the USC men's team were Jalyn Jackson taking fifth in the long jump and triple jump (he advanced to the West Prelims in both) and Dallas Wise, eighth in the triple jump. On the women's side, Temi Ojora won the USC-UCLA Dual Meet triple jump title with a jump of 43-0.25, then placed second at the Pac-12 Championships with a jump of 42-9.0 before having to shut it down due to injury. He was even able to get hurdler Jasmine Jones to place second in the long jump with a leap of 20-0.25 at the USC-UCLA Dual Meet to earn the Trojans 3 key points in a 1-point team victory.

Price spent the 2021 season at Columbia as an assistant focused primarily on jumps. Columbia and the Ivy League did not compete in track and field during the 2021 season due to COVID-19.

Price spent the previous seven seasons at Bethune-Cookman where he served as the jumps coach. During his time at Bethune-Cookman his men's jumpers posted the top six high jump marks in school history, the top seven long jumps and top seven triple jumps. Also, during that time, the women jumpers had the five top high jumps in school history, seven of the top eight long jumps and the top five triple jump marks in program history.

During the 2019-20 school year, Price was named USTFCCCA Women's South Region Assistant Coach of the Year, the first non-ACC or SEC coach to earn the honor. He guided Monae' Nichols to PRs in the long jump at 21-1.50 (6.44m) and triple jump at 42-0.50 (12.81m), earning second-team All-America honors. He also guided his athletes to score 42 of the team's 82 points at the MEAC Championships. Nichols won conference titles in the long and triple jumps and was named Co-Field Athlete of the Meet. He also led Thea Shaw to a MEAC title in the pentathlon.

The 2018-19 seasons saw Quamecha Morrison finish second in the high jump at the NCAA Indoor National Championships and Nichols qualify for the NCAA Outdoor Championships. In 2017-18, Price took the reins of the short sprint/relay group to go along with his duties of jump coach. Under his guidance the sprint group showed improvement across the board, while the men's 4x100m just missed going to the final round of the NCAA Outdoor Championships with a time of 39.64 was just .03 away from moving forward and the women's 4x100m advanced to the to the NCAA Semifinals where it posted a time of 44.49.

In the 2016-17 season triple jumper Michael Tiller had the top jump at the NCAA East Preliminary Rounds and placed 12th in the event at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. Tiller became the first Wildcat since Ronnie Ash, a 2016 Olympian, to qualify for indoor and outdoor national meets and finished his career with his fourth and fifth Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference titles in the event.

In 2015-16, his athletes swept the MEAC Indoor men's high jump at the Conference Championship. Also, Tiller and Kelton Williams went onto represent Bethune-Cookman at the USATF Indoor Championships in the high jump and triple jump. Summer Brown came on strong with an MEAC Outdoor Championship in the long jump and a fourth place finish in the triple jump.

In 2013-14, Wildcats horizontal jumpers made a significant impact under Price's tutelage. Freshman Kenneth Fisher collected both MEAC Indoor and Outdoor long jump titles and at the Outdoor Championships, Fisher teamed up with Demetrius Rooks and Nicholas Williams to make a B-CU long jump sweep on the podium.

Four of Price's jumpers qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Preliminary Rounds, with Fisher moving on to the NCAA Outdoor Championships. In addition, Fisher set a school record and earned second place at the USA Track & Field (USATF) Junior Championships, garnering him a place on Team USA for the IAAF World Junior Championships.

Prior to Bethune-Cookman, Price spent six seasons as the head track and field and cross country coach at South Carolina State. At SCSU he coached 51 NCAA Regional qualifiers, 2 NCAA Indoor qualifiers, 5 NCAA All-Americans, 8 NCAA Outdoor Qualifiers, 4 USA Junior National qualifiers, over 125 MEAC All-Conference athletes, over 70 MEAC Commissioner's All-Academic Team honorees, 30 MEAC Champions, two MEAC record holders, 41 SCSU school record holders, 11 B-CU school record holders, and one IAAF World Juniors (Team USA) performer.

Price joined the SCSU staff after serving four seasons as the head men's cross country/track & field coach, and three seasons as the head women's cross country/track & field coach at Fort Valley State University. At FVSU, he produced 37 NCAA Division II National qualifiers (2004-07), 23 NCAA Division II All-Americans, 5 NCAA Division II Individual National Champions, 27 Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) Champions, 139 All-SIAC Conference athletes, the 2005 USTFCCCA South Region Track Athlete of the Year, the 2006 USTFCCCA South Region Track Athlete of the Year and the 2006 USTFCCCA South Region Field Athlete of the Year.

Prior to his stint at Fort Valley, Price served three seasons as the assistant head coach at Morris Brown College in Atlanta. He also served as an assistant with "In the Black Track Club", which produced the 14th ranked 4x400m relay in the world, as well as the sixth place finisher in the triple jump in the 2001 USA Indoor Championships.

Price was a member of the SC State University track & field team for four years (1995-98), and also was a member of the SC State University football team (1995). Price received his Bachelor's Degree in Biology/Pre-Med from South Carolina State in 1998. In addition to his degree from SC State, the Summerville, S.C. native has a Master's of Science Degree in Sport Management/Sport Administration from Southern New Hampshire University in 2015, he also received his Certification in Strength and Conditioning (NCACE) in 2018, and is a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.



JOANNA HAYES

Asst. Coach, Sprints & Hurdles | Second Season/7th With Program

2004 Olympic 100m hurdles gold medalist Joanna Hayes was named assistant coach, sprints and hurdles by Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts on July 12, 2021. She transitioned into a full-time coach for the 2020-21 season. This year will be Hayes' seventh season of working with the USC track and field program, the first two as an assistant coach, then three as a volunteer assistant coach before moving back into a full-time assistant coach for the 2021-22 season.

In addition to her work with the Trojans, Hayes has worked closely with the post-collegiate development of 400m hurdlers Rai Benjamin, No. 2 on the world men's all-time list and current American record-holder, as well as women's world record-holder Sydney McLaughlin.

During the 2022 season, Hayes' athletes were some of the most successful on the team. Sophomore Jasmine Jones ran the fourth-fastest women's 100m hurdles time by a Trojan of 12.66 to take second at the NCAA Championships. Freshman Jalaysiya Smith also moved to ninth on USC's all-time 100m hurdles list by finishing 12th in the NCAA semifinals with a PR of 13.05. Jones won the 2022 Pac-12 100m hurdles title, while Smith finished sixth. Freshman Maci Simmons placed sixth in the 400m hurdles at the Pac-12 Championships and senior Breanna Bernard-Joseph took seventh. Hayes also guided Smith to the University/College Open 100m hurdles title and Simmons to the University/College Open 400m hurdles title at the Texas Relays. Both Simmons and Bernard-Joseph advanced to the NCAA West Prelims. During the indoor season Jones advanced to the NCAA 60m hurdles final, but hit a hurdle in the final, while grad student Mecca McGlaston placed fifth. She also guided Tade Ojora to the USC-UCLA Dual Meet 110m hurdles title, a second-place finish at the Pac-12 Championships and an eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. During the summer, he went on to capture his second consecutive British Athletics Championships 110m hurdles title with a wind-aided time of 13.27.

During the 2021 season Hayes was instrumental in working with the USC 400m hurdlers on their workouts and race patterns. Anna Cockrell won both the NCAA 100m hurdles and 400m hurdles titles and Cameron Samuel earned All-America honors by placing third at the NCAA Championships. They both also won 2021 Pac-12 titles in their events.

Hayes was named the 2018 West Region Women's Track Assistant Coach of the Year by the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA). Hayes guided USC's short hurdlers to first, second, third, fifth and seventh at the Pac-12 Championships to score 30 points in the event and help lead the Trojans to the team title. Four of the hurdlers advanced to the NCAA Championships in the 100m hurdles, with all four ranking inside the USC all-time top seven in the event. She also guided Anna Cockrell to the Pac-12 title in the 400m hurdles, and Cockrell and Shante Robinson advanced to the NCAA Championships in the event. Cockrell earned 18.5 points at the Pac-12 meet and went on to place second in the 400m hurdles at the NCAA Championships. She also worked with the men's 400m hurdlers on technique and Rai Benjamin won the NCAA title with a time of 47.02, tying for the then second-fastest ever recorded, setting the USC and collegiate records. Cameron Samuel also rapidly improved and ran a PR of 50.29 to take second at the Pac-12 Championships, behind Benjamin. She also helped guide the Trojan sprinters, with the women's 4x100m relay team setting the school record with a time of 42.57 to win at the Mt. SAC Relays. Hayes also guided Cockrell to a second-place finish in the 60m hurdles with a time of 7.93 at the NCAA Indoor Championships. That time ranks third on USC's all-time indoor list.

2017 was her first season at USC and Hayes helped guide Trojan athletes to five All-America honors during the outdoor season and one during the indoor season. Her work with Cockrell helped lead her to indoor 60m hurdles and outdoor 100m hurdles and 400m hurdles All-America status. Cockrell also set the USC freshman records in the 60m hurdles and 400m hurdles. Cockrell and Amalie Iuel took second and third at the 2017 NCAA Championships in the 400m hurdles. At the 2017 Pac-12 Championships, USC

had four women in the 100m hurdles final and three in the 400m hurdles final. USC athletes also posted four school top 10 marks during her first season of working with the hurdlers.

She also works closely with the sprinters and relay teams which posted 10 USC all-time top 10 marks during the 2017 season.

Hayes served as an assistant coach in the sprints and hurdles at UCLA from 2014-16, helping the Bruins earn several All-America honors in the hurdles and 4x100m relays.

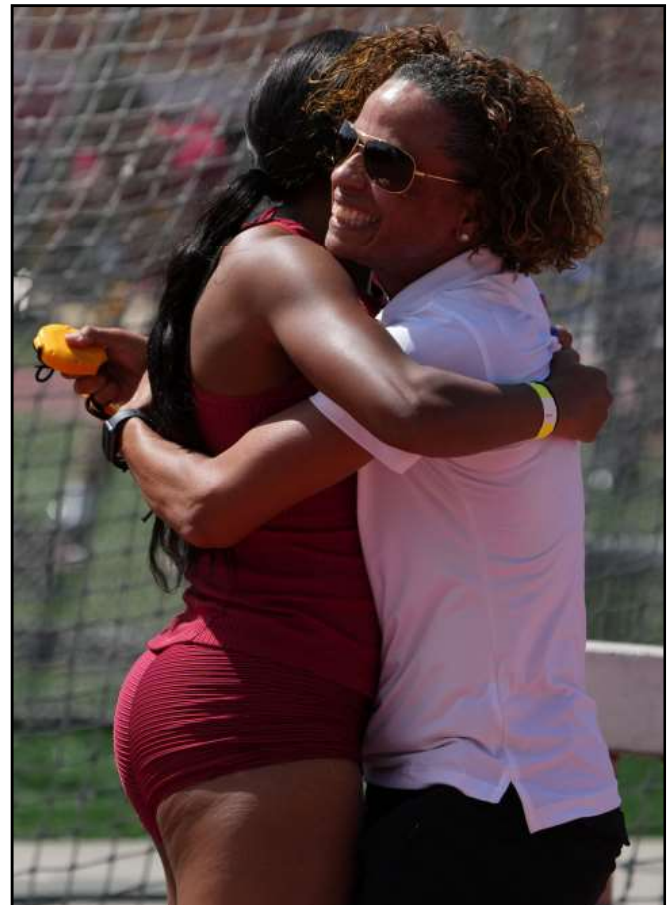
Hayes won a gold medal in the 100m hurdles at the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens, setting an Olympic record with a time of 12.37, which still ranks her as the eighth-fastest U.S. performer all-time in the event. She finished the 2004 season ranked No. 1 in the world and earned USA Track & Field's Jesse Owens Award that year. She was also a gold medalist in the 400m hurdles at the 2003 Pan American Games.

While a collegian at UCLA, Hayes captured the NCAA 400m hurdles title as a senior in 1999 and won a total of seven Pac-10 titles in the hurdles and relays. She was a six-time All-American and helped lead UCLA to three consecutive Pac-10 team titles from 1997-99 and two consecutive runner-up finishes at the NCAA Outdoor Championships from 1998-99.

Hayes, who graduated from UCLA in 2001 with a degree in Sociology, previously had been a track and field coach at Harvard-Westlake School in Los Angeles for six seasons and was a coach at the Brentwood Middle School in 2003.

She is active in the community and started the Joanna Hayes Foundation, which provides support for programs and services that work to develop the whole child with healthy minds, bodies and spirits.

Hayes and her husband Eric Thomas, have two daughters, Zoe and Aly.

CARMELITA JETER

Assistant Coach, Sprints | Second Season

2012 Olympic medalist Carmelita Jeter (JETT-er) is in her second season as an assistant working with the USC sprinters. She was named to her current position by USC Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts on Aug. 4, 2021. Jeter earned one of each Olympic medal at the 2012 London Games, earning a silver in the 100m, a bronze in the 200m and a gold in the 4x100m for USA. Jeter is also a 7-time medalist in the sprints and relays at the World Championships. "The Jet" is the third-fastest woman sprinter of all-time with a personal best of

anchored USA's winning 4x100m relay which set the world record of 40.82 which still stands today. Jeter was named the Los Angeles Sports Woman of the Year and the USA Track and Field Association's Jesse Owens Award, the highest accolade in the sport.

In 2013, Jeter competed at the World Championships in Moscow and earned a bronze medal in the 100m, despite having a torn right quadriceps. At the 2011 World Championships in Daegu she won a gold medal in the 100m and the 4x100m relay and earned silver in the 200m. At the 2010 World Indoor Championships in Doha, Jeter won the silver medal in the 60m dash with a time of 7.05. She earned a bronze medal in the 100m at the 2009 World Championships in Berlin. Later that summer in the final IAAF World Athletics Final in Greece she won the 100m dash with a time of 10.67, at the time the third-fastest time every by a woman and the fastest in 12 years. A week later at a Grand Prix race in Shanghai she won her 100m PR of 10.64.

10.64 set in 2009.

Jeter did not make the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team, finishing sixth in the 200m and reaching the semifinals in the 100m. Jeter is a three-time USA 100m dash champion, winning the titles in 2009, 2011 and 2012.

During the 2022 season, her first with the Trojans, Jeter's athletes posted some amazing times and results. The men's 4x100m relay team ran three of the top four all-time Trojan times and the team of Kasaur James, Brendon Stewart, Ashton Allen and Johnnie Blockburger set the school record with a time of 38.49 in winning the NCAA title. Celera Barnes ran 10.94 for the second-fastest 100m time ever by a USC woman and Davonte Burnett ran a 9.99 100m dash tied for the second-fastest all-time by a USC male. He also posted a 20.28 time in the 200m which ranks ninth on USC's all-time list. During the indoor season, Burnett set the USC 60m dash record with a time of 6.50 in winning the NCAA title, while James ran 6.55 to tie for second on USC's all-time list and Eric Allen Jr. ran 6.64 to tie for ninth on USC's all-time list. Burnett, Blockburger and James all also posted USC all-time indoor top 10 times in the 200m.

In her first World Championships in 2007 in Osaka, Jeter earned a bronze medal in the 100m and a gold medal with the 4x100m relay team. An injury in 2016 kept Jeter from competing for a spot on the U.S. Olympic Team and she retired from running in 2017.

Jeter came to USC following serving as the sprints coach at Alabama during the 2020-21 season. Prior to that, she had spent two seasons on the Missouri State track and field coaching staff. Jeter joined Missouri State in August of 2018 as an assistant coach and then was promoted to associate head coach in July of 2019.

Jeter is a 1998 graduate of Bishop Montgomery High in Torrance, Calif. She originally was interested in basketball, but then joined the track and field team during high school. Jeter went to Cal State University, Dominguez Hills and graduated in 2006 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. She earned six All-American honors, set five school records and became the university's first U.S. Olympic Trials qualifier.

From 2016 to 2017, she was sprints and hurdles coach at her alma mater, Cal State Dominguez Hills. She has been a certified Level 1 professional track coach since 2017, helping emerging athletes reach their potential with her own company, TeamJet, LLC.

In addition to her success on the track, Ms. Jeter is deeply involved in community and philanthropic efforts, particularly those focused on health and fitness. She has organized community track clinics for youth and served as the official ambassador for the Healthy Compton initiative, a citywide program designed to promote healthy lifestyle choices.

Jeter began her coaching career in 2004 as the track and field coach at Bishop Montgomery High School in California where she also served as assistant athletic director.

When her aunt was diagnosed with breast cancer, Ms. Jeter used her platform as a record-setting athlete to raise awareness, collaborating with Nike on hot pink spikes that she wore in competition. In 2015, she was named the official ambassador for Susan G. Komen's California Circle of Promise Initiative, designed to promote breast cancer awareness among African American women.

Jeter took second in the 100m dash at the 2012 Olympics with a time of 10.78, .03 seconds behind the winner Shelly-Anne Fraser-Pryce. Jeter's time was the fastest non-winning time in Olympic history and it was just the third race in history with two women running under 10.80. Jeter then took third in the women's 200m with a time of 22.14. Jeter

In recognition of her incredible athletic achievements, her continued contributions to the sport of track and field, her dedication to her community and her success as a speaker and businesswoman, CSUDH and the California State University Board of Trustees bestowed an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree on Jeter in May of 2019.

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACHES



RAI BENJAMIN

USA 400m hurdles record-holder and 2020 Olympic gold and silver medalist Rai Benjamin has joined the USC staff as a volunteer assistant coach beginning with the 2021-22 season.

Benjamin broke the American record which had stood for 29 years and earned a silver medal in an epic men's 400m hurdles final at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics with an amazing time of 46.17. Benjamin shaved 0.66 seconds off his previous

best of 46.83 which he set in winning his second American hurdles title at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials in June of 2021. Both Benjamin and Karsten Warholm of Norway, who won with a world-record time of 45.94, broke the previous world record in the event. Benjamin also earned a gold medal by anchoring USA's 4x400m relay which won with a time of 2:55.70. Benjamin then earned a silver medal in the event at the 2022 World Athletics Championships.

Benjamin won his first USA 400m hurdles title in 2019 and then went on to place second in the event at the 2019 World Championships, while also earning a gold medal as part of USA's 4x400m relay.

Since he turned pro in 2018 he has enjoyed success on the Diamond League circuit, winning Diamond League 400m hurdles titles in 2019 in Rome and Stanford and in 2021 in Doha. He also won the Boston World Indoor 300m title in 2019.

Benjamin only competed for USC for the 2018 season, but he made it a memorable one setting two NCAA and school records and leading the Trojans to a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. He won the 400m hurdles title with a collegiate record of 47.02 and ran on the school and NCAA record-setting relay which posted a time of 2:59.00, breaking the previous record which had stood for 13 years by nearly a full second. Benjamin's winning hurdles time of 47.02 tied Edwin Moses for the second-fastest men's 400m hurdles race ever recorded. During the 2018 indoor season, Benjamin took second in the 200m and ran on USC's winning 4x400m relay which set the collegiate record with a time of 2:00.77. Benjamin began his career at UCLA and in 2017 placed second in the 400m hurdles at the NCAA Championships. The three-time hurdles All-American also placed sixth in the 400m hurdles at the NCAA Championships as a freshman in 2016.

Benjamin went to Mount Vernon High School in New York and was the 2015 New Balance 400m National Champion and the 2015 New Balance Outdoor 400m hurdles National Champion. In 2015 at the CARIFA U20 Games he placed second in the 400m (representing Antigua) and in 2013 at the World Youth Championships, he placed 15th in the 400m hurdles (representing Antigua). Benjamin was able to apply for a transfer of allegiance in 2018 and began running for USA in October of 2018.

Benjamin, from Mount Vernon, N.Y., graduated from USC in 2019 with a Political Science degree. His parents are Winston Benjamin and Jeanette Mason. They are natives of Antigua. His father played cricket for the West Indies and he was part of their eight-year unbeaten streak.



GENTRY BRADLEY

Gentry Bradley joined the USC track and field program as a volunteer assistant coach prior to the 2021-22 season.

Bradley ran collegiately at UCLA where he finished second in the 200m at the 1996 NCAA Championships which qualified him for the World University Games. At the World University Games, he won the 1997 gold medal in the 200m and 4x100 relay. Following college he remained on the UCLA campus, working with the emerging HSI sprint team led by coach John Smith, running

with Quincy Watts, Maurice Greene, Ato Boldon and Jon Drummond. In 1998 Bradley became US National Champion in the 200m and went on to finish second in the 200m at the 1998 IAAF Intercontinental Cup held in Johannesburg, South Africa. Bradley also competed in the 1997 IAAF World Championships in Athens, Greece.

Bradley was assistant sprint coach at Long Beach City College in 2007 and 2008. In 2008-2011 he was the head sprint coach for the Saudi Arabia Track and Field team. During the 2010 Asian Games Bradley's team earned gold in the men's 4x400 relay and set a new Saudi Arabia national record and No. 8 ranking in the world. His athletes also earned a silver medal in the men's 100m and a bronze medal in the men's 400m.

In December 2012 Bradley was asked to coach the Qatar Track and Field sprint team. He trained Samuel Francis (former Asian 100m record holder) to running a season best 10.08 in the 100m in 2013, results Francis hadn't achieved since 2008 and giving him a world 100m listing of No. 39.

In January 2014 Bradley coached Tosin Ogunode to an Asian indoor 60m record of 6.50. In March 2014, Bradley trained Ogunode's older brother, Femi Ogunode, who earned a Bronze medal in the 60m at the 2014 IAAF World Indoor Championships in Sopot, Poland. This would be Qatar's first IAAF medal in a sprint event in 21 years.

In September 2014 Bradley would increase his success with Femi Ogunode at the 2014 Asian Games in Incheon, South Korea. He guided Ogunode to gold medals in the 100m and 200m. Femi also set a new Asian 100m record of 9.93, resulting in an IAAF world listing of No. 5. He would also be ranked No. 6 in the 200m by Track and Field News for 2014.

Bradley continues to act as sprint consultant for several international athletes. Most recently he has reconnected with Femi Ogunode of Qatar structuring his training program for the 2020 Olympic Games, achieving 2020 best times of 10.00 and 20.16. Ogunode managed to advance to the semifinals of both the 100m and 200m.

Bradley prepped at Pius X High School in Downey, California. He won the 200m at the 1992 CIF California State Meet. Earlier in the day, he had finished second to Riley Washington's state record in the 100m. He beat Washington in the 200m.

Bradley earned his Bachelors of Arts degree in History from UCLA, Masters in Business Administration from the University of Phoenix and is currently working on his PhD in Health and Human Movement from Concordia University-Chicago.

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACHES



SPENCER MOORE

Spencer Moore joined the USC staff as a volunteer assistant in the distances for the 2021-22 season, beginning with the cross country season in the Fall.

Moore graduated in 2018 from UNLV where she had personal bests of 2:11.17 in the 800m, 4:29.18 in the 1500m and 9:54.85 in the 3000m.

She competed in the 1500m and 5000m at the Mountain West Outdoor Championships as a freshman, then both the 800m and 1500m at the conference meet the next three seasons. She placed seventh in the 800m with a time of 2:11.68 and seventh in the 1500m with a time of 4:31.25 at the 2016 Mountain West Championships.

She also competed in cross country and reached the NCAA West Region Cross Country Championships all four seasons, finishing 84th in 2016 and 2017 with respective times of 21:23.25 and 21:19.6.

Moore posted 800m wins at the 2015 and 2017 UNLV Invitational and Sheila Tarr Multis, 1500m wins at the Mondo Challenge in 2016 and the UNLV Spring Invitational in 2015, as well as the 5000m at the 2016 UNLV Invitational and Sheila Tarr Multis.

Moore is a 2014 graduate from Saint Mary's College High School in Berkeley, Calif. She lettered all four years in both cross country and track and field. She finished in the top 10 at four straight CIF Cross Country Championships. In track and field she ran a leg for Saint Mary's 4x400m relay which set a school record and placed in the top five at the state championship in 2014. She claimed the league championships in the 800m, 1600m and 3200m all four years. She was also an honor roll student all four years.

Moore was born in Oakland, Calif. and is the daughter of Steven and Donna Moore.



MICHAEL NORMAN

Reigning USA 400m champion, 2020 Olympic gold medalist and 2022 World Championships gold medalist Michael Norman joined the USC staff as a volunteer assistant coach beginning with the 2021-22 season.

Norman joins the staff following winning a gold medal in the 4x400m relay for USA at the Tokyo Olympics in September of 2021, along with fellow Trojan and volunteer coach Rai Benjamin. Norman also placed fifth in the open 400m with a time of 44.31. Earlier in the summer Norman won the 2021 USA 400m title with a time of 44.07. Norman took second in the event at the 2019 USA Championships with a time of 43.79.

Norman's final season at USC (2018) was a spectacular one winning the 400m dash and 4x400m relay titles at both the NCAA Outdoor and NCAA Indoor Championships. Norman won the outdoor 400m title with a collegiate-record time of 43.61 in a stocked field which had all eight participants run sub-45.00 to qualify. His time also broke the NCAA finals record of 44.00 set in 1992 by his coach and current USC Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts. His time was also the fastest by an American runner since Jeremy Wariner ran 43.45 in 2017. Norman also won the NCAA Indoor 400m title with a world-record time of 44.52. Norman also won and set collegiate records for USC in the 4x400m relay at both the outdoor (2:59.00) and indoor (3:00.77) championships. He helped lead the Trojans to a fourth-place finish at the 2018 NCAA Outdoor Championship and to second at the 2018 NCAA Indoor Championships.

Norman was the 2018 Bowerman winner as the top collegiate track and field athlete, the 2018 USTFCCCA Men's Track Athlete of the Year, 2018 USTFCCCA Men's Indoor Scholar Athlete of the Year and the 2018 T&F News collegiate indoor Track Athlete of the Year. In 2017 he placed fourth in the 400m at the NCAA Championships with a time of 44.88. He also finished the season with a USC freshman-record time of 44.60 which he ran in the USATF Championship semifinals, before finishing seventh in the finals with a time of 44.80.

Norman turned professional shortly after the 2018 NCAA Championships and graduated from USC in 2019 with a Communication degree.

Norman won the 2018 Paris Diamond League 200m title, was the 2019 Diamond League overall 400m champion, winning in Brussels, Eugene, Stockholm in the 400m and in Rome in the 200m. He also won the 2021 Doha 400m title and the 2021 Boston World Indoor Tour Gold 400m championship. In 2020, Norman ran his 100m PR of 10.86 to become one of three sprinters to have every run a sub-10 100m, sub-20 200m and sub-44 400m along with Wayde van Niekerk and Fred Kerley.

Norman graduated in 2016 from Vista Murrieta in Murrieta, Calif. He broke the NFHS record in the 400m with a time of 45.19 at the 2015 CIF California State Meet. Norman was named the 2015 and 2016 California Gatorade Men's Track and Field Athlete of the Year. He became the first male sprinter to earn the honor before his senior season and was one of just 28 athletes all-time in all sports to earn the honor as a non-senior. He won the 200m with a meet-record time of 20.12 at the 2016 World U20 Championships.



USC's well-decorated dynamic duo of Michael Norman and Rai Benjamin are bringing their expertise, skill and drive to the Trojans this season as volunteer coaches. They continue to compete on the highest level, combining to win three gold medals at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and a silver and two gold medals at the 2022 World Athletics Championships.



NATE COLLINS

Director of Operations

Nate Collins is in his second season as the Director of Operations for the USC track and field program, joining Quincy Watts' staff in August of 2021. His primary duties include coordinating the day-to-day activities of the program, team management, team travel and home meets.

Collins spent the previous five-plus years at Cincinnati as the Director of Olympic Sport Operations, joining the Bearcats' staff in May of 2016. He worked directly with the coaching staffs by providing administrative and operations support to coordinate all aspects of team travel and acted as a liaison between coaching staffs and the department of athletics. Additionally, he handled travel authorization and expense reports for recruiting and official visits. He also managed the budget and accounting of multiple sports throughout the department.

Collins began his career enlisting in the United States Navy in 2008. He spent a year and a half assigned to U.S. Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba before being transferred to Marine Corps Base Hawaii in Kaneohe Bay for three years. Throughout his naval service he was awarded three Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals, the National Defense Service Medal and the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal.

A native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio, Collins earned a bachelor's degree in Business Administration (management) from Kentucky in 2014, and a Master's of Science in Physical Education (sport administration) from Eastern Kentucky in 2016. He married his wife Sara in December of 2020 and they have two dogs, Tucker and Chloe.



COURTNEY CORRIN

Recruiting Coordinator

Courtney Corrin was named the Recruiting Coordinator for the USC Track & Field Team during the summer of 2021 by USC Director of Track & Field Quincy Watts. Corrin had joined the staff in 2020 as a Volunteer Student Assistant Coach. In her current role, Corrin is in charge of maintaining the recruiting database and coordinating visits and activities for the team.

Corrin graduated from USC in 2021 with her BA in Law, History, and Culture. She was a four-time Marks Scholar recipient. Corrin came to USC in the Fall of 2016 as a dual sport athlete. She competed on the track & field team (2017-19), and the soccer team (2016), before deciding to focus solely on academics. As a freshman, Corrin was a member of USC's NCAA Champion Women's Soccer Team. As a Sophomore, Corrin won the 2018 Pac-12 long jump title with a leap of 21-4w (6.50m). She ranks fifth on USC's all-time long jump list with a wind-legal jump of 21-2.50 (6.46m).

The Los Angeles native graduated from Harvard-Westlake high school in 2016. She won the 2015 CIF State long jump title in 2013 and 2015, taking second in 2014. In 2013, as a 15-year-old, she became the first ever freshman to clear 21 feet in the long jump at the USA Track and Field World Youth Trials held in Edwardsville, Illinois. Corrin's new record was far enough for a national record for any leapers aged 15 or younger, not to mention a top-15 leap across all age groups all-time in USA Track & Field sanctioned competition, not to mention one that comes within just more than three feet of the all-time world record. Her record leap also earned her a spot on the U.S. national team for the forthcoming World Youth Championships in Ukraine. In 2015, she won the USATF Juniors long jump title with a leap of 21-06.25w (6.56m) where she then went on to earn silver at the Pan Am Juniors. Corrin was named the L.A. Daily News Girls Athlete of the Year three times.

Corrin resides in Los Angeles, California.

TROJANS SHINE ON THE WORLD STAGE

• Trojans Earn 11 Medals: 7 Gold, 1 Silver, 3 Bronze •

Trojan athletes won a total of 11 medals at the 2022 World Athletics Championships held at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore., which would have ranked second overall if USC had competed as a country. USC students earned seven gold, one silver and three bronze medals during the world competition. Over 1,900 athletes from 192 country delegations competed at the championships which were the first ever contested on U.S. soil.

Michael Norman and Allyson Felix both won 4x400m relay gold medals on the final day of competition, their second medals of the games. Norman (USC, 2019) ran the second leg for USA's winning men's 4x400m relay team which posted a world-leading time of 2:56.17. It was Norman's second gold medal of the games as he also won the open 400m with a time of 44.29. Felix (USC, 2008) did not run in the 4x400m relay final for USA, but by virtue of her running in the prelims, earned her second gold of these games and 20th of her career. She earned a bronze with the mixed 4x400m relay earlier in the games. Nicole Yeargin (USC, 2021) ran the second leg for Great Britain's 4x400m relay team which earned a bronze medal with a time of 3:22.64.

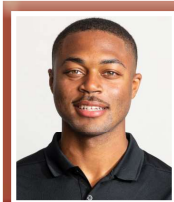

2022: Burnett was having a magical season before hurting his left hamstring at the Pac-12 Championships in the 100m dash, still taking third with a time of 10.22 on May 15. He ran the leadoff leg on the Pac-12 title-winning 4x100m relay which won with a then school record of 38.60. He ran a PR of 9.99 (+0.3) to win the 100m dash at the Mt. SAC Relays on April 16...that time tied him for second on USC's all-time list, trailing only Olympic 100m silver medalist Andre De Grasse. Won the 100m with a time of 10.07 (+0.9) and the 200m with a PR of 20.28 (-0.4) at the USC-UCLA Dual Meet on May 1...moved to ninth on USC's all-time 200m list. Set the USC 60m dash indoor record and won the NCAA title in the event with a time of 6.50 on March 12.

2021: Burnett had a stellar first year for the Trojans competing in both the 100m and 200m. Won all of his regular season 100m races, including the USC-UCLA Dual Meet, then won the Pac-12 100m title with a wind-legal PR of 10.05 (+1.4). That time tied him with Aaron Brown for fifth on USC's all-time list. He also won the 200m (20.55) and ran on the winning 4x100m relay (39.65) at the Pac-12 Championships. Ran a 200m PR of 20.29 (+0.3) to advance out of the NCAA West Prelims in fourth and move to ninth on USC's all-time list. At the NCAA Championships he finished just off the podium in the 100 (5th, 10.19) and in the 200m (6th, 20.55) to earn first-team All-America honors. Earned second team All-America honors in the 4x100m, taking 10th with a time of 39.23 at the NCAA Championships. Suffered a leg injury at the Jamaica Athletic Championships and could not compete in the finals...originally named to Jamaica's Olympic Team in the relay, but later did not travel to Japan.

BEFORE USC: Burnett attended Barton Community College in Great Bend, Kansas from 2019-2020. He was a 2020 NJCAA Indoor All-American in the 60m and 200m, winning the 60m title with a time of 6.63 and placing fourth in the 200m with a time of 21.05, helping lead the Cougars' team to a runner-up finish. He set his indoor 60m PR of 6.62 in winning the NJCAA Region VI indoor title on Feb. 22, 2020 and his indoor 200m best of 20.73 at the Red Raider Invitational on Jan. 24, 2020. He was named the USTFCCCA National Men's Track Athlete of the Week for January 27, 2019, as his time of 20.73 was the third-fastest all-time on the JUCO list. He has outdoor bests of 10.46 in the 100m and 20.71w in the 200m dashes.

HIGH SCHOOL: Burnett is a 2018 graduate of Needham HS in Needham, Mass. He won six state titles while at Needham HS. Was injured in the 200m finals at the 2018 MIAA Eastern Division Championships and finished eighth. He did not run in the 100m final, after having the top time in both the 100m and 200m entering the finals. In 2017 he won the 100m dash at the MIAA State Championships and at the New England Championships and placed seventh at the New Balance Nationals. He also won the 2017 Massachusetts state 200m title and took seventh in the 200m final at the New Balance Nationals. 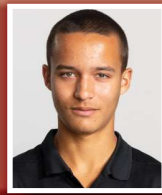

He also ranked seventh indoors in the 300m with a time of 33.86 which he ran in winning at the Virginia Showcase. He has outdoor PRs of 10.69 in the 100m and 21.42 in the 200m. 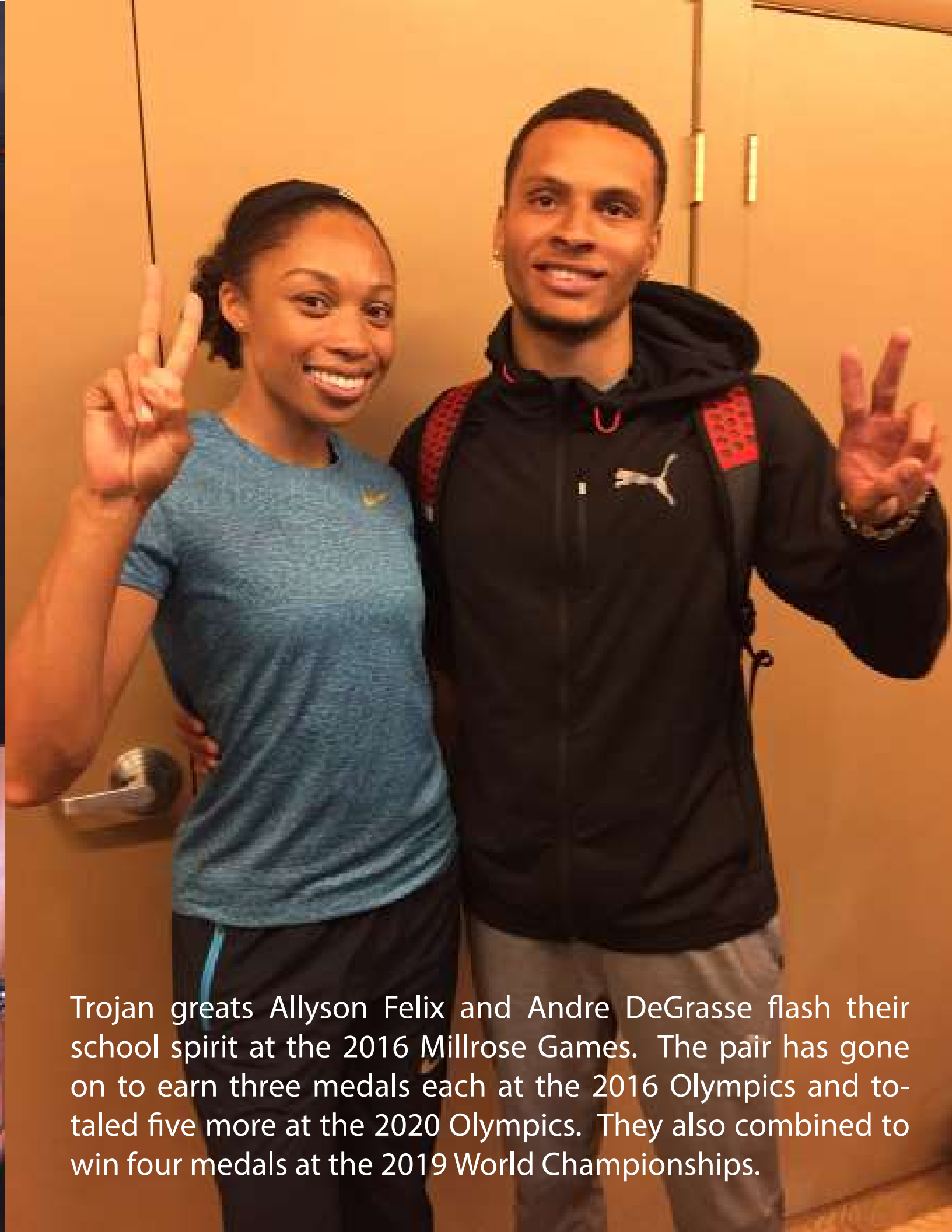

USC REMEMBERS KATHERINE B. LOKER

Katherine Bogdanovich Loker who passed away on June 26, 2008 at the age of 92 was associated with USC for more than 60 years. A member of the Class of 1940, she was an English major and a star runner on the track team. She married stage and screen actor Donald P. Loker, whose professional name was Don Terry and who later served as an executive in the StarKist Foods Company, the firm founded by Katherine's father in 1917.

Katherine and her husband gave more than \$30 million to the university, placing them among the top individual benefactors in USC history. Together they were the principal benefactors of what is now the USC Loker Hydrocarbon Research Institute, where their support was instrumental in enabling Distinguished Professor George A. Olah to complete the research that led to his winning the 1994 Nobel Prize in Chemistry. Katherine was also a strong supporter of USC athletics, particularly track and field, which named its new stadium in her honor, and of the USC School of Theatre, where she established the Donald P. Loker Action Fellowship in memory of her beloved husband.

Katherine was elected an honorary trustee of USC in 2000. She received an honorary degree from USC in 1998 and USC's highest honor, the Presidential Medallion, in 2006. She was also the recipient of the Alumni Association's highest honor, and the Dean's Medallion for the USC College of Letters, Arts and Sciences.

She was a Presidential Associate, a member of the Board of Councilors of the USC College of Letters, Arts and Sciences, a life member of Town and Gown, and a member of the San Diego Trojan League. In 2005 she was inducted into the USC Athletic Hall of Fame and received its Spirit Award. In 2006 she received the USC Track and Field Heritage Award.

Katherine Loker's steadfast support of higher education extended beyond the University of Southern California. She served on the Committee of University Resources at Harvard and received the Harvard

Medal in 1995 and an honorary degree in 2000. She also served as a life member of the Advisory Board of California State University, Dominguez Hills, where she received an honorary degree in 1999; a trustee and foundation member of the California Science Center of Los Angeles; a foundation executive board member of the Nixon Presidential Library in Yorba Linda; and a founding member of the Los Angeles Music Center. She was an active supporter of the Donald P. Loker Cancer Treatment Center at the California Hospital Medical Center, Los Angeles.

Loker Award Established

For years the Trojans have honored the top male track and field athlete with the Cromwell Award and in 2012 the Loker Award has been established to honor USC's most outstanding female athlete. The award is being created to pay tribute to Katherine B. Loker, longtime USC track and field supporter who passed away in 2008.

USC's Cromwell Field and Loker Stadium both underwent significant renovations over the winter break in preparation for the 2013 track and field season. Both the track and the infield were replaced and the exterior of Loker Stadium received a facelift.

USC installed a brand new Bynon BSS 2000 track, the same kind used at Hayward Field in Oregon, the site of the 2012 Olympic Trials and home to the 2014 NCAA Championships. In addition, a new all-weather Field Turf Revolution was installed in the infield of the track.

Also, the exterior of Loker Stadium, the fences and signs were repainted and the water fountains replaced. The landscaping was upgraded and new jumping pits and runways were added. In addition, new fiber was brought into the venue to provide an upgraded sight for broadcasts with the conference championships being televised by the Pac-12 Network.

The last time USC hosted the conference meet before 2013 was in 2003.

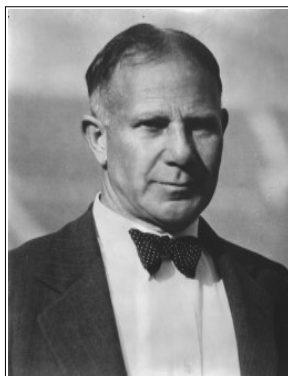
The Story of USC's Unmatched Track & Field History

USC is well known as one of the most successful athletic programs in the history of the NCAA, with 133 men's and women's national championships. The Trojans have won far more NCAA team and individual titles combined than any other university. However, the most dominant force in USC's slate of athletic programs is not the baseball team (12 College World Series titles) or the football squad (nine national championships) but the men's track and field program, with an unprecedented 28 NCAA titles (2 indoor), including nine straight from 1935-43. The Trojan women have now joined the men's program with national titles in 2001, 2018 and 2021. Quincy Watts took over leadership of USC's program in June of 2021 and the success is expected to continue to grow.

Trojan athletes have dominated the track and field scene for decades. From the exploits of sprinter Charlie Paddock and thrower Clarence "Bud" Houser in the 1920s and 1930s, sprinter Mel Patton in the 1940s, thrower Parry O'Brien in the 1950s, sprinter Lennox Miller and pole vaulter Bob Seagren in the 1960s, sprinter Quincy Watts in the 1980s, to four-time NCAA hammer champion Balazs Kiss (only the fifth collegian to win four in a row) in the 1990s and World Champion hurdler Felix Sanchez in the 2000s, USC is synonymous with track and field excellence.

THE CROMWELL YEARS: 1909-1948

The roots of Troy's preeminence date back to 1926, when coach Dean Cromwell brought the first NCAA track and field cham-

pionship to USC. Cromwell, who led the Trojans from 1909-48, also served as head coach of the football team for five seasons.

However, the foundation he laid was not on the gridiron but the cinderpaths. Cromwell's track squads won 12 NCAA championships and featured 34 NCAA individual champions. In addition, Cromwell was unanimously selected as headcoach of the victorious 1948 U.S. Olympic team, a group which featured five Trojans (Mel Patton, Bob Chambers, Roland Sink, Wilbur Thopson and Cliff Bourland). In fact, Patton, Thomson and Bourland brought home gold medals in their respective events from London, the Olympic site.

From 1935-43, USC experienced a streak of unequalled track and field success. No other university has come close to matching Troy's string of nine consecutive NCAA championships, all under Cromwell's watchful eye. Nicknamed the "Maker of Champions," he fashioned Trojan athletes into a powerhouse. At the 1936 Olympics in

Berlin, USC trackmen scored enough points (37 1/2) to have finished among the top five in the world. Cromwell's influence extended far beyond the USC campus to the corners of the world. He personally tutored champions in every Olympic Games from 1912 to 1948, and upon his retirement in 1949, "The Dean" remained involved as a regular figure in various Southland sporting events until his death in 1962.

TWO JESSES, NINE NATIONAL TITLES: 1949-1961

Jess Hill and Jess Mortensen, both integral parts of USC's proud athletic heritage, carried the track and field torch after Cromwell's retirement. Both men are still considered among the finest all-around athletes in USC history, and their accomplishments did not end after their playing days were over.

Hill, who lettered in three sports at USC (football, baseball and track), served as head coach of Troy's track and field program in 1949 and 1950, leading the Trojans to an undefeated season and national championship in both seasons. From 1951-56, Hill coached the football team, and in 1957, he began his tenure as USC athletic director, a position he held until 1972.

Mortensen's reign at USC also began as an undergraduate. The talented athlete lettered in track, basketball and football, winning the NCAA javelin title as a junior. After a 14-year coaching stint at Riverside Junior College, he returned to become coach of the Trojan track and field team in 1951, leading Troy to seven NCAA championships in his 11-year tenure. Mortensen's Trojan teams never lost a dual meet, going 79-0 between 1951 and 1961. He developed some of Troy's best-known trackmen, including Parry O'Brien and Max Truex. Sadly, "Mort" died suddenly at the age of 54 from complications caused by a blood clot. Hill, his longtime friend and teammate, stepped in as interim head coach for the 1962 season, and a new chapter in Trojan track and field history was about to begin.

THE WOLFE YEARS: 1963-1984

The prospect of succeeding three consecutive coaching legends would be a difficult task for anyone, but Vern Wolfe answered the challenge.

During his 22 years at the helm of the Trojan track and field program, USC captured five outdoor NCAA championships, including back-to-back titles in 1967 and 1968. A pole vaulter for Cromwell's Trojan teams, Wolfe also won indoor titles in 1967 and 1972. At the time of his retirement in 1984, he was the third-winningest coach in U.S. track history, all despite reductions in scholarships and the lack of a top-flight on-campus facility.

Wolfe, who competed in senior events as a pole vaulter, attacked all problems with a straight-ahead approach. He continued to win throughout his career and towards the end oversaw the modernization of Cromwell Field, USC's track facility which served as a training site for the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. And so, after 21 years on the job, Wolfe retired and gave way to Ernie Bullard.

BULLARD AND BUSH: 1985-94

Another in the line of former Trojan athletes to become head coaches at USC, Ernie Bullard came to Troy from San Jose State, where he helped build the Spartans into a national contender. It didn't take long for Bullard to continue Troy's winning ways, recruiting athletes like sprinter Quincy Watts, a two-time gold medalist at the 1992 Olympic Games.

Jim Bush was the man picked to replace longtime friend Bullard in 1991. After all, who better to rebuild the USC program than the man who guided UCLA to five national championships?

Bush helped stabilize the program and recruited some of Troy's stars, like Balazs Kiss of Hungary, the 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1996 NCAA champion in the hammer throw. Consequently, he helped lay the foundation for the latest in the distinguished line of Trojan head track coaches: Ron Alice.

RON ALLICE: 1995-2013

Ron Alice, who prior to the 1995 season was named the Director of Track and Field for USC's combined men's and women's program, was no stranger to success. He distinguished himself at every level of competition, all in the Southland, and is well-known not only as a master builder, but a man who can keep a

program at the highest level year after year.

Alice came to Troy with impeccable credentials: 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach (Calif.) City College, where his 1980 squad was called "the best junior college team in history" by Track & Field News. During his tenure at Long Beach C.C., his teams lost just one dual meet.

He quickly went to work, guiding the USC men's team to a fourth-place finish at the 1995 NCAA Outdoor Championships. In 1996, his Women of Troy won their first-ever Pac-10 title. In 1997, he led the Trojan men's team to its first Pac-10 title since 1977 and a third-place showing at the 1997 NCAAs. In 1999, the men won their second Pac-10 title in three years. At the NCAAs, the women finished third and the men fifth (as a combined men's and women's program, this was the best finish in school history). In 2000, the men finished seventh--their seventh consecutive top 10 finish--while the women placed second--their highest finish ever. In 2001, Alice guided the Women of Troy to their first-ever NCAA team championship. In 2003, he led the men's team to a third-place finish, with three Trojans winning NCAA titles.

Alice's troops continued the winning ways, being the only school in the country to have both the men's and women's programs finish in the top 10 from 2005-07. In fact, four times between 2005-09 USC accomplished that feat with the only blemish being an 11th place finish by the women's team in 2008.

The Trojans also dominated at the Regional and conference level with the men's team capturing four regional titles and the women's team tying for one seven seasons, while the men earned one more Pac-10 title in 2006.

Alice retired after guiding the USC men's team to a fifth-place finish and the women's team to a 21st-place finish at the 2013 NCAA Championships. Bryshon Nellum in the 400m and Reggie Wyatt in the 400m IH both won individual titles. Alice guided the USC men's teams to a top 10 finish 14 times and the women's team to a top 10 finish 11 times.

Alice had a career dual meet record of 218-50-1 at five schools, and coached more than 286 first-team All-Americans, 32 individual NCAA champions, 54 Olympians, four world record holders and 7 American record holders.

CARYL SMITH GILBERT: 2013-2021

Caryl Smith Gilbert took over the program on June 17, 2013 and led the men's team to a

fourth-place tie and the women to a 16th-place tie at the 2014 NCAA Championships in her first season. She also guided both teams to a second-place finish at the Pac-12 Championships. Throw in the women's indoor MPSF conference title and it is easy to see that the program was in good hands for future success.

In her second season USC's men placed 5th and the women 7th at the NCAAs, as well as the women capturing the MPSF indoor title again. The teams both took second one again at the conference meet. They also combined to set four USC outdoor records and set four Trojan freshman outdoor marks. Despite a slew of injuries, the USC women tied for 9th and the men were 12th at the 2016 NCAA Championships and Randall Cunningham won the NCAA high jump title. Four more USC outdoor records were established and Smith Gilbert guided the men to the MPSF indoor team title. In 2017 USC's men and women placed second at the Pac-12 Championships and the women finished third at NCAAs, their highest finish since 2006 and their 43 points were the team's most since 2002. 2018 was a banner year for the Trojans as the women's team captured the NCAA title in dramatic fashion in the meet's final race - the 4x400m - edging Georgia by one point. The men's team placed fourth, but along the way set three collegiate records - Michael Norman in the 400m, Rai Benjamin in the 400m H and the pair along with Ricky Morgan Jr. and Zach Shinnick in the 4x400m relay. The women's team also captured its first conference crown since 1996. The men's and women's team won MPSF indoor conference team titles and swept the USC-UCLA Dual Meet. Indoors the men took second and the women seventh at the 2018 NCAA Indoor Championships.

In 2019 the women won their second consecutive Pac-12 title and finished runner-up at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. Annelus in the 200m, Terry in the 200m & the 4x100m relay set school records at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The men's team placed fifth at the Pac-12 Championships, 17th indoors and 37th outdoors. Ayden Owens set the school record in the decathlon. The 2020 season had great promise but was cancelled due to COVID-19. Before things were shutdown, the USC women's team was taking a No.2 ranking and the men a No. 11 ranking to the NCAA Indoor Championships. USC didn't let the shutdown slow the momentum as the women won its third national title in 2021, led by Anna Cockrell's hurdles double and the men placed fifth behind the first men's 800m title in school history set by Isaiah Jewett.

Longtime decorated assistant, school record-holder and Olympic hero Quincy Watts took over the reigns to the program on June 17, 2021 and the future of the program couldn't be any brighter.

Right, in the spring of 1966, USC assistant track coach Willie Wilson was found to have terminal cancer. USC's two-mile relay of John Link, Dennis Carr, Bruce Bess and Dave Buck vowed to give him something special to remember and ran 7:14.4 to set a world record at the Los Angeles Coliseum on May 13, 1966.

WOMEN OF TROY CROSS COUNTRY

THE 2022 SEASON

The USC women's cross country program continued to make big strides under second-year leader Jebreh Harris. The freshman and sophomore-laden roster achieved some good things, before being derailed at the end of the season by injuries.

Freshmen Lucy Westlake and Ashlee Gallegos led the way for the Trojans, with Westlake leading USC in three of its meets and Gallegos being the top Trojan runner in the other meet.

USC opened the season at the Mark Covert 5K Classic on Sept. 3 and finished third, tied for USC's best result at a meet since winning the 2016 Peperine Invitational. Westlake finished 11th and Gallegos 15th. Westlake came back to lead USC at the UC Riverside Invitational on Sept. 17, running 22:02.09 in her first 6K race, moving up 11 positions over the final third of the race. Westlake sat out the Bronco Invitational on Oct. 15, but the fellow freshman Gallegos led the Trojans with a time of 22:24.4 in her first 6K cross country race.

The Trojans hosted the 2022 Pac-12 Cross Country Championships at the Ag Ops Course in Riverside, Calif on Oct. 28, USC's first time hosting since 2009. The Trojans had a limited roster due to injuries, but the good news was that its top three finishers Westlake, Gallegos and Vienna Gao were not even on the team a season ago. The Trojans decided not to send a team to the West Regional, but seem to have developed a solid foundation upon which to build on.

The team also excelled in the classroom once again with the squad earning USTFCCCA All-Academic honors in the fall. The team sports a cumulative team grade-point average of 3.40. Additionally, Issabelle Cairns, Maya Lacamp, Mihajla Milovanovic and Giovanna Pisano were named to the Pac-12 Conference's 2022 Fall Academic Honor Roll.

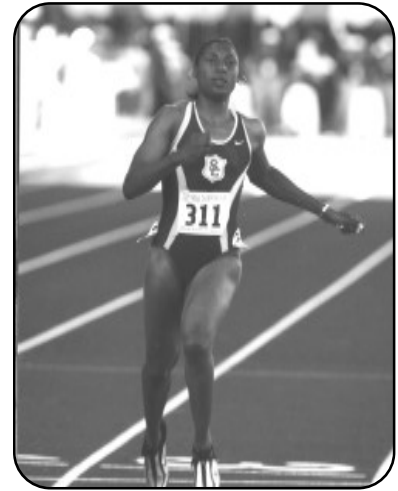

KATHERINE B. LOKER STADIUM

Home of USC Track and Field



Katherine B. Loker Stadium was made possible by a generous donation from Katherine B. Loker. The 3,000-seat stadium opened in the 2001 season and was dedicated on May 5 during that year's USC-UCLA dual meet. The track and stadium underwent renovations in 2020 prior to the Trojans hosting the 2021 Pac-12 Championships. The facility includes track offices, locker rooms, an athlete lounge and meeting rooms. Loker Stadium also hosted the 2003 Pac-10 Championships, the first time a conference meet had ever been held on the USC campus, and the 2013 Pac-10 Championships.

In 2016, Nia Ali became USC's first medalist in the women's 100m HH in Olympic competition. Ali had a time of 12.59 in the final. The sweep for USA was the first ever by one country in the event and just the seventh ever in any Summer Olympic event. In 2016, Dalilah Muhammad destroyed the field en route to the 400m IH gold medal with a time of 53.13, .42 seconds faster than the silver medalist, despite the second through sixth place finishers all running PRs. Muhammad became the first-ever USA woman to win the event at the Olympics and the second Trojan to medal as Natasha Danvers-Smith won the bronze medal at the 2008 Olympics in Great Britain.
