## The Struggle Continues

## THE POOR PEOPLE'S CAMPAIGN RENEWS THE LONG-TERM FIGHT

"Everybody's got a right to live."
That was one refrain sung by several dozen demonstrators Monday afternoon in front of the Capitol gates, the latest in a series of nationally linked public actions organized by the Poor People's Campaign, reinvigorated by the Rev. William Barber from North Carolina. The campaign (www.poorpeoplescampaign. org) is in the midst of its initial 40-day organizing effort, hoping to build momentum over the next couple of years for a renewed national focus on poverty, inequality, and basic human rights.

This week's Austin action was largely educational - focused on "work and education," said Louis Malfaro, president of the state American Federation of Teachers, one

of the unions partnering in the campaign. "Our country has really gotten out of balance," Malfaro said - citing income inequality, school segregation, and the wealthy now explicitly proclaiming that they "don't want to pay for other people's education or health care."
"We're a nation that's losing its middle class," Malfaro said, and summarized a range of potential policy decisions that could address the decline: supporting child care, protecting schools from privatization, the "Fight for $\$ 15$ " - a livable wage for all workers. (Quite a few demonstrators, from around the state, were wearing Fight for \$15 T-shirts.)

Some of the national demonstrations have been marked by civil disobedience -

Barber was among nearly 150 people arrested in D.C. last month for blocking the Capitol. Monday's demo held no such plans, but during the previous week's protest at the Railroad Commission offices, activists blocked doors and seven people were arrested. One was PPC organizer Sema Hernandez, who said that under the themes of "ecological devastation" and health care, demonstrators were making the connection between the RRC's permitting of pollution and the consequent effects on public health.
"This is phase one of the campaign," Hernandez said Monday of the networking effort that will enter phase two next month. "We are building local chapters" - Austin, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, El Paso "under the principle of 'moral revival' that began in North Carolina. This will be a multi-year effort."

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## Raw Numbers

The Poor People's Campaign is a conscious effort to revive Martin Luther King Jr.'s similar effort in the late Sixties, a move that marked a shift away from civil rights agitation alone to broader targets of human rights, inequality, and lifting up those left behind in an otherwise prosperous America. The conventional narrative is that "war on poverty" programs failed; in fact, social welfare programs created in that period dramatically reduced the national poverty rate - but the struggle for equity continues. According to a PPC report prepared by the Institute for Policy Studies, about $47 \%$ of the people in Texas are living in poverty or are low-income roughly 12.8 million residents. That pattern has coincided with growing inequality from 1972 to 2012, the income in Texas for the top $1 \%$ grew by $149 \%$, while the income for the bottom $99 \%$ grew by only $2 \%$.
Last month, the U.N.'s Special Rapporteur on poverty and human rights, Philip Alston, issued his report on the U.S. to the U.N. Human Rights Council. His findings, about the self-defined wealthiest country in the world, were stark: "About 40 million live in poverty, 18.5 million in extreme poverty, and 5.3 million live in Third World conditions of absolute poverty."

## A Time for Solidarity

The U.N. report is worth a close read, but a few details are worth highlighting - in addition to the sheer scale of poverty in an otherwise wealthy nation, inequality is growing. "The United States," the report notes, "has the highest rate of income inequality among Western countries," a division recently exacerbated by the massive Trump administration tax cuts. "There is ... a dramatic contrast between the immense wealth of the few and the squalor and deprivation in which vast numbers of Americans exist."

Amid the recent Trumpist media spectacles of insulting U.S. allies, blowing up trade and weapons agreements, and embracing longtime enemies, the step-bystep building of the Poor People's Campaign might well seem too old-school and grassroots to have much effect on the national and world political stage - today's politics are all about cable-TV ranting and viral social media campaigns. On Monday watching 60 or so folks engage in public, lyrical solidarity - "before this campaign fails, we'll all go down to jail" - certainly had a quixotic aspect, a sense that perhaps the forces arrayed against social justice have finally amassed too much power and wealth to be eventually overcome.

Maybe so. But I would still bet that long after Donald Trump and his brand, and his enablers and sycophants, have scuttled off the media stage in disgrace, the name of Martin Luther King Jr. will continue to be honored around the world as a voice for peace and justice. In this next era of his continuing influence, may the new Poor People's Campaign carry his fight onward.

## CodeNEXT: Runnin' Scared

Only a week has passed since City Council started on CodeNEXT but a lot can happen in a week. Despite efforts to find consensus, it didn't take long for the Preserve vs. Densify divide to manifest. Mayor Steve Adler couldn't even ask "What is our income-restricted housing goal and what capacity is needed to reach that goal?" without getting two types of answers.

Austin's Strategic Housing Blueprint, adopted last year, stipulates that 135,000 homes, 60,000 of which are affordable units, are needed in the next 10 years. But several CMs, most vocally Leslie Pool and Alison Alter, were opposed to the idea that housing capacity should be two times the production goal of 135,000. Adler said he believes some CMs are "scared" of what such a statement means "down the road" - densifying the city's core. After more than an hour, all but Pool agreed: CodeNEXT should allow for overall housing production to reach 135,000 units, so capacity must be greater than 135,000.

## COMMISSIONERS AND DISSENTERS

Stephen Oliver presided over his final Planning Commission meeting on Tuesday night. He commended his colleagues for their hard work and ability to achieve compromise. He applauded commissioners for maintaining a diversity of opinions and said "it's not a mistake that we are comprised the way we are," a subtle reference to the recent uproar over the PC's makeup. He also recommended that the PC merge with the Zoning and Platting Commission to ease public confusion, noting the "range of opinions should be represented by one body."
In a surprising turn, commissioners voted 7-5 for Secretary James Shieh to succeed Oliver, besting Vice Chair Fayez Kazi. They'll elect a new secretary on June 26.

Meanwhile, the four ZAP commissioners who voted against that body's recommendation to terminate CodeNEXT released a minority report, expressing their disapproval of the recommendation, calling it "unwarranted, unproductive, and recalcitrant."
Commissioner Abigail Tatkow told me the point of the report is to let the community know that, despite ZAP's recommendation, "there was still support of the process."

## CODENEXT GOES TO COURT

A hearing date has been set for the land use petition case. Judge Orlinda Naranjo will hear legal arguments only on Wednesday, June 27, in the 419th Civil District Court. Fred Lewis, co-author of the referendum petition that seeks to put the rewrite to a public vote instead of trusting City Council with its fate, filed the lawsuit on June 1, and the city anticipated the suit following Council's $6-4$ vote to not put the item on the November ballot. Some council members believe the petition orders an illegal task; they argue Texas only allows two zoning issues to be put to public vote: whether a city should enact or remove zoning. Now a judge can decide.

Lewis and fellow plaintiff Bill Bunch will represent petition signers, while local law firm Scott, Douglass \& McConnico will represent the city.

## NAKED CITY



AN INDEPENDENT IN CD 25
"If we don't do something within a generation, it's over." That's the message borne by Martin Luecke, the latest potential entrant in the November Congressional campaign for District 25 - currently held by GOP incumbent Roger Williams, being challenged by Democrat Julie Oliver and Libertarian Desarae Lindsey. An Austin "handyman" (with previous careers in TV journalism and ambulance services), Luecke, 56 , says neither party is adequately responding to the global warming crisis - and that's why he's running as an independent in a "Campaign to Save Humanity."
"The number one priority is to make people aware of the real danger: planetary extinction." For a brief interview at Hank's Cafe in his Windsor Park neighborhood, Luecke came armed with a dozen books - Noam Chomsky to Elizabeth Kolbert - and pressed his argument that neither Republicans nor Democrats are responding adequately to the imminent climate crisis.

While Luecke's emphasis is most urgently on climate change - abandoning fossil fuels, building a renewable energy grid, and employing millions of people in renewables - he also advocates for major new infrastructure, universal health care, mass transit, and public financing of elections. On another front - in a letter to the Chronicle last year (Aug. 28), Luecke defended Alex Jones and his groundless conspiracy theories about both $9 / 11$ and the Sandy Hook school massacre; asked about it now, he described his letter as indefensible and "goofy."

Luecke is not yet an official candidate - he's working to gather 500 supporting signatures from people who did not vote in either primary in order to make the ballot. "Generally, at every other house I find people who didn't vote in the primary, and almost all of them are willing to sign for me," he said. To supplement his blockwalking, Luecke will hold a "Signature Campaign Party" on Sat., June 16, 3pm, at Knomad Bar (1213 Corona).

## SCHOLARS CALL ON SBOE TO

 REPAIR SINS OF PAST AND PRESENTAdvocates and scholars spent Tuesday, June 12 pleading with the Texas State Board of Education to correct their many racially insensitive and historically inaccurate mistakes. In 2010, the SBOE passed such ideological social studies curriculum standards, even a conservative think tank slapped them with a failing grade for giving students a "politicized distortion of history." (That's gotta sting.) In testimony, academics suggested the board reverse its claim that slavery was not the principal cause of the Civil War, and criticized the standards for glorifying Confederate leaders such as Stonewall Jackson. A final vote on changes to those standards is expected in November.
But that wasn't the scholars' only request on Tuesday. Following a rally outside, protesters spent three hours urging the SBOE to change the recently passed Mexican-American studies high school elective course back to its rightful name. In April, right-wing board member David Bradley switched the MAS course title to the watered down and academically inaccurate "Ethnic Studies: An Overview of Americans of Mexican Descent." (Bradley was noticeably absent from Tuesday's hearing.) Douglas Torres Edwards, who led the creation of the Houston MAS curriculum the statewide version is based on, said "changing the name of a people is going to be perceived by many as an indignity to their personhood because it implies that somehow being Mexican-American is a threat to the notion of being American." State Rep. Carol Alvarado, D-Houston, visited Austin to criticize the course name for not actually representing the field of Mexican-American studies. "This attempt to whitewash our Mexican heritage from a course that is centered on the study of our Mexican-American heritage is confusing and fruitless," she told the board.

On Wednesday, board member Georgina C. Pérez motioned to change the course to "Ethnic Studies: Mexican American Studies," a compromise between the original name and the new one. That even got the approval of Bradley, who seconded the amendment. Reflecting the continued dissatisfaction of some board members, Erika Beltran proposed scrapping "Ethnic Studies" from the title and reverting completely back to MAS, but that plan didn't fly with the majority, and in the end, the board unanimously voted for Pérez's name change - perhaps a sign of incremental progress in the right direction. The SBOE is expected to take a final vote this Friday.

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# City Cyclone 

COUNCIL'S WILD WEEK, IF THEY CAN GET THROUGH IT

Batten down the hatches. There's a tornado of activity coming to City Hall today. More than three hours into City Council's work session on Tuesday, members were still struggling to free themselves from a cyclical discussion about amendments to CodenEXT, and their implication on the city's housing goals. While it's not unusual for talk of the zoning rewrite to spark extensive (and conflicted) discussion, in Tuesday's case members left the scheduled discussion having accomplished very little; fortunately, they had one more briefing scheduled for Wednesday. See Sarah Marloff's report, p.8, for more from CodeNEXT central.

After those talks wrapped up on Tuesday (and following a lengthy executive session), members finally began work on their regular weekly dealings. Thursday's agenda includes a turbulent 113 Items, including a vote (on consent) to appoint Brian Manley as permanent chief of the Austin Police Department (see below) that'll likely pass unconstested, and a vote to restore much of the special pay items APD officers lost when the last meet-and-confer agreement expired.

Expect that to draw the ire of city activists. The Austin Justice Coalition sent out a civic engagement primer on Tuesday, urging members to oppose the measure and reminding that Council already temporarily extended the perks until the city's Labor Relations Office and Austin Police Association could come to an interim agreement, which the union promptly rejected. "Now," said the AJC, "they are going through Council to try and have these pay perks returned to them until a new contract is agreed, effectively killing the negotiation

power of the city and ensuring that any new deal must start with these stipends as-is."

Another measure supported by the AJC is Greg Casar's resolution directing the city manager to reduce the racial disparities in APD's discretionary arrests. Data from last year showed that black Austinites face discretionary arrests - meaning police could choose to ticket someone and then let them go, but ultimately choose to put the offending individual under arrest - at a significantly higher rate than white and Latino residents, and that black and Latino residents comprise $75 \%$ of APD arrests for driving with an invalid license, an outrageous number when one considers that those groups account for less than half of the city's population.

Elsewhere, there is a trio of Items (12, 19, 20) relating to the construction of temporary (and eventually, hopefully maybe permanent) fire stations to fill in the holes in the city's service map. Given the dramafilled state of the last couple of Council discussions on this topic, it's reasonable to wonder whether the elbows will get thrown again. There may also be discussion surrounding Item 16, which tweaks the AustinTravis County Emergency Medical Services regulations that deal with nonemergency medical transfer service providers. And expect Pio Renteria to raise a little hell on Item 10, a $\$ 309,448$ construction contract for intersection improvements at East Seventh and Chicon and Calles streets that wouldn't ordinarily be controversial if not for the fact that the contractor involved is Aaron Concrete Contractors LP, whose owner, Aaron Cabaza, made headlines at a Commissioners Court meeting last month when he used a racial slur to describe the

## "AUSTIN'S NEXT POLICE CHIEF"

By the time you read this, City Council will in all likelihood have voted to approve City Manager Spencer Cronk's appointment of Brian Manley to chief of the Austin Police Department, an inevitability since Cronk named the 28 -year APD veteran the lone finalist for the job in April, and frankly well before that if you read the clues that emanated from both City Hall and APD HQ. Manley has admirably handled interim responsibilities, navigating the department through the latter stages of the crime lab collapse, the breakdown in contract negotiations last December, and then the two-week terror brought on by the local bombings. It was after the latter that public sentiment for perma-Chief Manley reached a fever pitch ("Brian Manley's the Man?," March 23), capped off by a plead from Council Member Delia Garza (echoed publicly by Leslie Pool) for her colleagues to "put our full support" behind him.

That occurred last Friday: Cronk, via an 11-page memo (augmented by a seven-page


Mexican immigrants he likes to hire for his jobs. Renteria opposed the city entering into agreement with Cabaza's company last month, and we expect him to stick to his principles and oppose this one, too.

Getting through all that will leave the dais with just three more thorny discussions, on the creation of a new tourism commission; Ellen Troxclair's proposed extension of the homestead exemption from $8 \%$ to $10 \%$ (sounds nice on the surface, but is it actually a good thing?); and an updated anti-lobbying ordinance. Expect lots of questions about the makeup of this potential tourism commission, which could immediately butt heads with Visit Austin, the marketing wing of the Convention Center that's already responsible for promoting tourism within the city, and its board of directors, which may feel as if Council's proposed commission is moving in on its directorial territory.

This, of course, is all going on as Council
sprints (or maybe dribbles) its way toward a Major League Soccer-imposed deadline at the end of the month on what to do with McKalla Place, and whether it'll get turned into a soccer stadium or if mixed-use developments with affordable housing will win the day. There are currently way too many balls in play on that one, and Council isn't expected to take the issue up at a regular meeting until June 28. See Austin Sanders' "Group Stage," p.12, for more.

Exhausted yet? Here's a bit of respite: Item 21 called for Council to consider a resolution to renew City Manager Spencer Cronk's temporary $\$ 4,500$ per month housing allowance for another six months, through the end of February 2019. Cronk evidently had the same problems as many residents securing housing in Boomtown, Texas, but on Monday he wrote to the mayor and said that wouldn't be necessary. Maybe some nice council member had a granny flat to rent him. - Nina Hernandez
executive summary report of the monthlong community vetting process performed by GovHR USA), identified Manley as "an honest and trustworthy leader" with a "knowledge of Austin and policing" who could progress departmental efforts concerning safety, community policing and transparency, staffing, training, equity, and inclusion. Cronk noted that the vetting process did yield areas of concern, mostly by residents who questioned "whether or not [Manley] is able to bring about a cultural change in the department around areas of community policing, oversight and accountability," but the city manager chalked those concerns up to "the uncertainty of whether or not an internal candidate can be an effective change agent." (Oversight and accountability are in part matters to be addressed in the ongoing contract negotiations between the city and Austin Police Association. In May, Cronk said interim Police Monitor Farah Muscadin was "in the process of researching best practices regarding oversight across the country," and that he
didn't anticipate concluding negotiations with the APA until they hash out citizen oversight.)

Thursday's vote is a consent Item, meaning there won't be public comment - only a vote - and it's not clear how much opposition the topic would yield if there were discussions. The police union is in support of their longtime colleague; APA President Ken Casaday said the body is "proud" of Manley for the work he's done since taking over. And it's unlikely there'd be much opposition from the more prominent activist groups. Austin Justice Coalition co-founder Chas Moore stood behind Cronk and Manley at the press conference, and afterwards, offered tepid support. "I can live with it," he confided to Chronicle reporter Nina Hernandez.

Which brings the focus back to Council, a body that on decisions like this doesn't like to stir the pot. Garza and Pool have already shown their hand, and no colleague has yet indicated that they plan to hold things up. Which means APD should have some stability moving forward and Cronk can cross another "interim" position off his list.

# Texas Medical Board Defends Itself 

## RESPONDING TO COMPLAINTS, AGENCY RENEWS ATTACK ON CRITICS AND JUDGE

A brief recap: In September of 2017, Administrative Law Judge Hunter Burkhalter exonerated Dr. Robert Van Boven of charges of sexual "boundary violations" brought by the Texas Medical Board in response to complaints by two patients, and rejected a third complaint of unprofessional conduct. In December, rather than appealing that "Proposal for Decision" (i.e., ALJ's ruling) to a state district court, the TMB reluctantly confirmed it.

Since then, the TMB has persistently worked to undermine its own decision, insisting, for example, that the initial complaints against Van Boven remain on file with the National Practitioner Data Bank maintained by the U.S. Health and Human Services Administration. Then-interim Executive Director Scott Freshour also disputed Burkhalter's ruling with Burkhalter's supervisor, State Office of Administrative Hearings Chief ALJ Lesli G. Ginn. In late February, Ginn demanded Burkhalter's resignation (in lieu of termination), claiming bias in his decision - while insisting she was not responding to pressure from the TMB.

Last month, Van Boven's direct appeal to the NPDB was rejected, in a decision by NPDB Director John Loewenstein, who wrote that he does not have the authority to overrule the TMB (as the Texas licensing agency) in its decision to "revise" the filing rather than void or remove it. In a lengthy rejection of Van Boven's appeal, Loewenstein wrote that the agency "cannot substitute [its] judgment for that of the reporting agency" nor "conduct an independent review." Van Boven says he's considering his options, specifically whether he can legally force the TMB to expunge its NPDB filing.

## THE BURKHALTER TERMINATION

Meanwhile, Burkhalter's dismissal has inspired a letter campaign to Gov. Greg Abbott and state legislators, asking the governor to remove Ginn, whose two-year appointment expired in May. Thus far, the governor has taken no action either to remove Ginn or to confirm her reappointment. The latter would trigger a review by the Senate Committee on Nominations; committee members have been receiving letters from former SOAH personnel and others, most asking them to reject Ginn's renomination, should it come before them

Austin Sen. Kirk Watson is vice chair of Nominations, and documents reflect that he has been responding to those let ters with assurances that he is gathering information, while

Ginn, whose twoyear term expired in May. Until Gov. Greg Abbott acts to reappoint her, Ginn serves under a cloud of opposition from current and former SOAH staff.

## reiterating the Senate cannot act without first some action by

 the governor. In several replies sent May 10, Watson said that regardless of the governor's actions, he will "investigate this matter thoroughly." SOAH and the ALJs, he wrote, "must be confident they can rule based on the evidence and the law without fear of retaliation. And all of the agencies that work with SOAH must understand and respect that as well."The TMB has also responded to the letter campaign, with its own memo defending its actions while once again trying to relitigate the Van Boven case and reiterating its criticisms of Burkhalter's ruling. The memo, dated April 6, criticizes the Chronicle's coverage of the story (without actually naming us), calling the paper's reporting "one-sided" and "ignoring salient facts."
The memo, under Freshour's signature, repeats its version of the Van Boven case and attributes bias to Burkhalter, reiterating arguments that were rejected in the weeklong hearing of the charges against Van Boven held last May.

The memo also defends its complaint to Ginn, insisting that the action she took against Burkhalter was not prompted by the TMB complaint. "It appears the press and detractors of Chief Ginn have either not read TMB and Chief Ginn's letters or intentionally ignored them." (The Chronicle not only reported on the complaint, but posted the relevant documents: "Medical Board Loses a Case," March 16, and "Can't Convict the Defendant? Convict the Judge," May 4.)
Freshour insists that all he did was notify Ginn of Burkhalter's potential bias, and in his letter "did not ask Chief Ginn to take any action, but simply placed her on notice of certain concerns regarding an ALJ." That letter requested a meeting with Ginn and SOAH's general counsel, Cynthia Reyna, and no record of that meeting has been made available. Nevertheless, Freshour's memo renews his attack on Burkhalter for alleged bias, and accuses the judge of expressing opinions "offensive particularly to victims and women generally."

That is, in a memo responding to legislative concerns about arbitrary TMB and SOAH actions against an ALJ, Freshour takes the opportunity, once again, to relitigate his dismissed charges against Van Boven, and then to reiterate and amplify his complaints against the fired judge.

Burkhalter responded in detail to Freshour's charges in his own February letter to Ginn, a few days prior to his termination. As he put it, "The remedy for a party who feels a judge has erred is judicial appeal, not impugning a judge's character to his employer." In his memo, Freshour writes that rather than the TMB making its decision not to appeal on substantive legal grounds, "If TMB had decided to appeal there would have been accusations that such an appeal was frivolous and for delay."

## VAN BOVEN RESPONDS

This week, Van Boven composed a blistering and detailed response to the Freshour memo, also submitted to the Nominations Committee. He recounts the history of his years-long persecution by TMB, and describes the Freshour memo as containing "serious falsehoods or omissions that may serve to deflect from alleged improprieties by TMB Staff/Officials" and Ginn. He also requests of the legislators a "formal, independent investigation."

In sum, writes Van Boven, "The lack of active supervision of the TMB and SOAH leadership is problematic with fertile potential for abuse of power. ... the TMB and SOAH are Kafkaesque bureaucratic offices in need of accountability and oversight."

## DEATH WATCH: INTELLECTUALLY DISABLED OR MENTALLY ILL?

The Court of Criminal Appeals granted its first stay of execution of the year, and now Smith County man Clifton Williams will face a new hearing instead of lethal injection, which was scheduled for June 21. Williams was sentenced to death in 2006 for killing a 93 -year-old woman in a home robbery gone wrong. He's spent the last decade fighting his sentence to little reward, but on May 23, his attorneys filed an appeal contending Williams is "intellectually disabled" and therefore not subject to execution.

Atkins v. Virginia, a 2002 Supreme Court case, determined that executing people with intellectual disabilities qualifies as cruel punishment and violates the Eighth Amendment, but the CCA decision on Williams is the result of a more recent Supreme Court ruling
on Texas death row inmate Bobby Moore, who SCOTUS concluded was sentenced in part on outdated medical research on intellectual functioning. Indeed, Texas had been using material from 1992, as well as guidelines based in part on Lennie from John Steinbeck's Of Mice and Men - factors that advanced "lay stereotypes" and made Texas an "outlier" in comparison to other states' handling of similar cases.

Williams now awaits examination. His Atkins hearing won't take place until that occurs. He has a hearing in Smith County District Court on June 21, to appoint substitute counsel. Meanwhile, Moore's case appears to be headed down a different path. On June 6, the CCA upheld its ruling that he is competent enough for execution, and agreed to adopt
current medical standards going forward (the same ones that moved the needle the other way in Williams' case), but the judges believe even under the new framework, Moore "failed to demonstrate adaptive deficits sufficient to support a diagnosis of intellectual disability."

And a similar conversation continued last week in the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals, where Andre Thomas was granted, in part, a certificate of appealability to file a brief and have his recently denied appeal reviewed. In 2005, Thomas was sentenced for killing his ex-wife, her baby, and their young son. He spent the months leading up to the murders claiming to hear voices from God and cutting himself, and in the course of the murders cut out the hearts of the two children and stored the organs in his pocket, before trying to kill
himself. Later, in jail, he gouged out his right eye. Unsurprisingly, three psychologists concluded Thomas suffered from paranoid schizophrenia. Though his trial attorney argued he was too ill to be given the death penalty, an all-white jury disagreed. (Thomas is black; his ex-wife was white.) Three years later, he pulled out his other eye and ate it.
Unlike Williams and Moore, who used Atkins to further their appeals, Thomas is mentally ill - meaning he suffers from a disorder, as opposed to intellectual functioning and adaptive behavior limitations (i.e., intellectual disability). The 5th Circuit denied only one of Thomas' five COA issues: whether execution of the severely mentally ill violates the Eighth Amendment, stating "this issue is foreclosed under our precedent." Though the U.S. still allows mentally ill inmates to be executed, the 5th Circuit's approval might just force a Supreme Court decision.

THREE INTERESTS NOW VYING FOR MCKALLA PLACE

City Council held its first substantive discussion Tuesday on Precourt Sports Ventures' proposal to bring the Columbus Crew to Austin, revealing support among several members and continued skepticism from Leslie Pool and Alison Alter. Mayor Steve Adler and Pio Renteria are on the record supporting the move, and Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo shared her optimism for the deal, though she raised concerns about how often the city could use the site, the cost of public safety services during games, and what the city would lose in property tax revenue from owning the stadium.

Jimmy Flannigan expressed tentative support, noting McKalla had appeal because a pro sports facility "couldn't be built just anywhere." Adler and Greg Casar, Delia Garza (who left the session early), Ora Houston, and Ellen Troxclair (returning from maternity leave) refrained from comment. Ann Kitchen asked city staff and representatives of Brailsford \& Dunlavey, the firm responsible for the glowing economic analysis included in the city's June 1 assessment of McKalla, about the economic impact from alternative uses for the site.

Continuing efforts to slow the process, Pool referenced 17 concerns highlighted in an in-depth review of both PSV's proposal and the city report conducted by her staff. Many of the items revolved around clarifying who would be responsible for costs of improving surrounding infrastructure, site
remediation, and questions about how Brailsford \& Dunlavey conducted their economic impact study. Pool urged her colleagues to pump the brakes throughout their consideration of her objections, noting that "we don't have to look at this as our last chance ever" for an MLS team in Austin.
PSV's Austin-based consultant Mark Littlefield was encouraged by the session. He said there was still a long way to go, but that nothing at the meeting would be seen as a "poison pill" for his client. He said the next few days were critically important in motivating Council to add an agenda item regarding PSV's proposal to the June 28 meeting, the last before their July break. MLS has said they need to know by July 1 whether PSV can move its team to Austin.

Last week, two developers threatened to shake up the MLS2ATX effort by revealing their own development ideas for McKalla Place. Capella Capital Partners said they entered discussions with the city's Office of Real Estate Services in March 2016 to redevelop the site. Scott Moxham and Todd Dailey of Capella said Monday that former City Manager Marc Ott expressed enthusiasm for the potential deal and in September 2016 their firm undertook a "serious effort" to make their proposal a reality. The plan included office space, residential buildings with affordable units, publicly available green space, and about 6,000 parking spots, across multiple garages.


In preparing to release a request for proposal for the property, the city contracted consultancy firm Paul Hornsby \& Company to appraise McKalla Place. Hornsby's July 2016 draft report valued the site at $\$ 29.5$ million if purchased outright, or $\$ 1.9$ million for an annual ground lease. (Citing "competitive reasons," city staffers would not say what the property is valued at today.) The report also concluded that a mixed-use development was the "highest and best use" for the site - but that was before anyone broached the subject of a soccer team. As Tovo put it in a conversation Monday, "Affordable housing at McKalla would be of great value, but not every cityowned tract is appropriate for a stadium."
Ultimately, city staff in 2016 did not proceed with the RFP, but Pool hopes to change that with a resolution at the June 28 Council
meeting, expected to be co-sponsored by Houston, Troxclair, and Alter. It's unclear if Pool will get the votes necessary to open the RFP, but if so, another developer eyeing McKalla is ready to jump in on the bidding. Last Friday, Whitfield-Chen submitted a proposal to City Manager Spencer Cronk offering to buy the vacant lot outright for $\$ 22.5$ million, or to lease it for $\$ 2.2$ million per year. The offer committed to providing at least 500 "income accessible housing units," with at least $12 \%$ being 3 -bedroom or larger to accommodate families. WC partner John Chen said the development would include seven acres of public parkland and a space for public officials to teach children traffic safety.
Council is not expected to take any action at today's meeting, but the stage is set for a showdown on June 28 - Austin Sanders

## STRATFORD PLAN ON HOLD?

Parks and Recreation Department Acting Director Kimberly McNeeley didn't get what she wanted from the Environmental Commission last Wed., June 6. Rather than endorse her proposal to turn the patch of beaten grass northwest of Zilker Park - a clay-capped landfill the city tried to beautify at least to some extent before ultimately converting it into an ad hoc parking lot and staging area for events like the ACL Festival and Trail of Lights - into a more formal parking lot and staging area ("Zilker Park: Paved Paradise, or Vice Versa," June 1), the body balked, telling McNeeley they've got some questions they'd like answered. Those questions will go to Chuck Lesniak at the Watershed Protection Department. In the meantime, McNeeley said a determination for the Stratford Drive Redevelopment Project has "not yet been finalized," as she and her staff "continue to evaluate a range of options, among them the prospect of putting the project on hold." The topic was set for discussion at Planning Commission on June 12, but got pulled from its agenda. Based on last week's meeting, it appears it'll next come up at the Environmental Commission again on June 20.

roads, a more comprehensive school accountability system, and the empowerment of locally elected school boards. But much of the early conversation revealed a sense of despondency some on the board feel toward the Lege. District 1 Trustee Ted Gordon set the tone for the conversation by asking a question common among local officials working to enact progressive policies under the shadow of a conservative statehouse: "Will any of this make a difference?" Implicit in Gordon's question was the bleak reality of working under a state government increasingly intent on pre-empting local controls it disagrees with ideologically. Gordon continued to express his frustration with the relationship between AISD and the Lege, saying it was time "to call a spade a spade" by criticizing state leaders for their efforts to "punish" Austin schools.

District 3 Trustee Ann Teich acknowledged those frustrations, but said that in her experience, taking a confrontational approach toward state lawmakers only hardened their resistance to change. "While this may look like an exercise in futility, if we don't have some kind of position we can present to legislators, that's not a good place to be in either," Teich said. She pointed to progress the Lege has made in recent sessions on improving mental health training for Texas educators, as well as increased awareness at the Capitol and in the public of the unfairness of the "recapture" school financing system.
The board will continue working on the proposed list of priorities, and will vote on the final list in August. - A.S.

Just after 11pm on the night of this year's primary election, Dyana LimonMercado announced to a crowd of advisers and supporters gathered at the South Austin Third Base that local attorney Anne Wynne had just called to concede the race for chairperson of the Travis County Democratic Party
"I'm in shock," Limon-Mercado exclaimed "so I really don't have eloquent words prepared. I also wasn't planning to give a speech either way, because I was just going to be like, 'Fuck all this shit. I'm ready to go to bed."'

The race for the position, which is responsible for fundraising and ultimately getting Democrats elected into public offices throughout the county (and driving turnout for statewide races), had been particularly close. Early voting had her up by one percentage point. By the end of the night, she had increased that lead to two. The underdog planning to close the night by saying "fuck all this shit" ousted the onetime appointee of Ann Richards, who'd been recruited to run by some of the most influential members of the party.

Such support likely would have carried Wynne to victory in any other year. But the circumstances that led to this year's election were rather unprecedented, and Limon-Mercado ran a campaign that would ultimately reel in a consequential string of endorsements from those beyond the typical kingmakers.
"Truthfully, I could not have done this without Our Revolution," she told supporters, "without Young Democrats; without the Tejano Democrats; without my core group of volunteers. Without every single group of people who I think in this community have felt marginalized for a long time."

Then she said what had been on the mind of all those groups: "Even though the Democratic Party was our party, we didn't always have the voice and the representation we wanted. This campaign was won because of grassroots power, word of mouth."

## AN UNENVIABLE POSITION

The two dissimilar candidates didn't arrive at March 6 in a vacuum. The events that made their contest possible began to fall into place in September of 2015, when Jan Soifer resigned from the position to pursue a campaign for the 345th District Court. (She was elected the following year.) On the surface, Soifer was a successful party chair: In her two years, she amassed $\$ 1.1$ million in donations, and helped shepherd in a vice chair position and several full-time staffer positions, so that the party - which generally shrunk during off-election years - could benefit from constant staffing.

But when she resigned she acknowledged the challenge she had just faced: "When I decided to run for this position, I knew that it was a challenging, unpaid position, but I never guessed just how much work it would be. ... It certainly has demanded much more work than I expected - but it has been an honor to serve our party."

# Party of Some 

After years of infighting and


Soifer told me this summer that she doubts she would have been able to do the work she did had she been at a different point in her life. Her children were grown; she and her husband had a stable law practice. There were days when her party duties didn't end until late at night and only then could she begin on her day job's work.

And Soifer benefited from several moments that temporarily sparked the party during her brief tenure, including the Wendy Davis filibuster and a partnership with Battleground Texas. "There were
exciting things happening, and it was a year when people were really motivated to help," she said.

Shortly after Soifer announced her resignation, Vice Chair Vincent Harding beat out political operative Sylvia Camarillo in a special election. Though Camarillo vowed to challenge Harding again in the March primary, she eventually reneged, and Harding won a full term unopposed.

Harding wasn't a typical choice for party chair. The employment and ethics attorney had spent most of his time within the party

as secretary, a neutral position where he wasn't championing favored candidates, and he relished the freedom that accompanied that status. He is also black - only the second black man to be TCDP chair - and at 28 was the youngest person to ever hold the position. "I know that I stand on the shoulders of giants," he wrote in a statement announcing his ascension, "and I am committed to opening doors for those who will follow me."

## TROUBLE IN PARADISE

Those remarks marked the beginning of a tumultuous, three-year tenure marred by party infighting and discontent. Harding came into the role promising a reorientation of the party, and took seriously his job as an independent arbiter. But the ethics-above-politics mentality didn't jibe with party stalwarts, and helped exacerbate the growing tensions.
It was with that reputation Harding waded into the first test of his brief term, in January of 2016, during the primary campaign for district attorney. At the time, the favorite to succeed Rosemary Lehmberg was longtime Assistant D.A. Gary Cobb - in fact, for a while, he hadn't even drawn a challenger. But defense attorney Rick Reed eventually jumped into the race, and when he did so he alleged that Cobb's candidate application had both violated a number of state election codes and included signatures from several members of the TCDP staff (Reed believed party members should not endorse candidates in a primary), and that Harding failed to "properly review" the application.
Harding told Reed that the oversights wouldn't push Cobb's name off the ballot, and the situation eventually settled itself: The courts allowed Cobb's candidacy, and he was later defeated by Margaret Moore. (Reed withdrew on election day.)
The 3rd Court of Appeals sided with Harding in Reed's lawsuit, but it unearthed hard feelings that Cobb had been allowed to continue at all. Harding contends he was doing his best to navigate a difficult legal question on the fly and was concerned with keeping the seat in party hands.
"That was my honeymoon," he remembered wryly. "Having someone run against you and then getting sued."
Harding's troubles would not end there. Party insiders grew bitter about his handling of the 2016 coordinated campaign, particularly the Fourth Street space he'd rented as its headquarters, which earned criticism both for its location and lack of air conditioning. Some grew demoralized at what they perceived to be a lack of organization at the management level. Those party insiders complained that Harding had stopped listening to their suggestions, and worried his staff wasn't experienced enough to handle complex campaigns.

Harding drew further scorn last June when he declined to endorse a call for Rep. Dawnna Dukes' resignation from the state House. He justified his decision in a Statesman op-ed, citing an unwillingness

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PARTY OF SOME CONTINUED FROM P. 14 to take action against "a duly elected state representative on the spot without community notice or input." He also noted that the party had never asked a candidate to resign in such a manner, and hesitated to set that precedent with a representative like Dukes, a long-respected member of Central Texas' African-American commu nity. "Austin should rise to the occasion and show that diversity not only can unite a community but is the fuel to defeat bigotry," he wrote. "Let's move beyond internal disagreements and focus on serving the entire community."

Today Harding acknowledges: "Some of the decisions I made people did not agree with." But he believes he did his best to fulfill his campaign promises by raising ethical concerns when he saw them. And his tenure was not without its bright spots. Harding was successful in engaging with the party's grassroots wing, made progress on immigration, workers' rights, the battle with Uber and Lyft to maintain local rideshare regulations, and pushed the party to make bold statements on police brutality and oversight. He takes pride in the robust voter turnout in the 2016 general election, which topped $65 \%$ within the county

Still, by the spring of 2017, Harding decided he wouldn't run again. Though he'd raised about $\$ 1$ million, the same amount as Soifer, he began to struggle with fundraising the longer he went into his tenure.

Harding had told his closest confidants, but hoped to keep the news private until he wrapped up a couple of community initiatives. But the news leaked. And all of a sudden, in September 2017, weeks before he was ready to announce his decision, Harding was getting calls from people across the county who knew his plans and had already conferred with Rick Cofer rumored as the next consensus candidate Harding announced his resignation via email on Sept. 28. The next day, Cofer launched his own campaign.

## SIDESHOW POLITICS

Cofer immediately lined up an impressive array of supporters that included current and former City Council members, state elected officials, and a slew of Travis County bigwigs. He was a known quantity

within the party, a veteran of UT's University Democrats, and a former legislative staffer who'd worked as a prosecutor for both the county and district attorneys.

Cofer's ascent to the party chair was hailed as an inevitability. And it may have worked out that way, had news not begun to swirl that Cofer had been accused of multiple incidents of chauvinistic behavior during his time at the county attorney's office. Cofer withdrew his candidacy in late October, having been asked to leave by at least one ally within the Travis delegation: state Sen. Kirk Watson, a onetime party chair himself. "I certainly told him [to step aside]," Watson told me. "I felt like, based on what I was hearing, that he would not be able unite the party under the circumstances. And I didn't like what I was hearing."

Cofer announced his withdrawl in a statement that did not acknowledge any rumors, but instead appeared to attribute the decision to the fact that there were "several strong female candidates waiting on the sidelines.
"The very best thing I can do for our party is to step aside for incredible women leaders," he continued.

Party Secretary Bianca Garcia and former Central Health Board Member Rosie Mendoza were two of the names quickly

considered. But neither came forward to run. Instead, Precinct 428 Chair Mike Lewis announced he would step in. The Bernie Sanders supporter painted himself as an outsider and reformed Libertarian who had devoted himself to progressive politics in the wake of Trump's election, and sought to energize others within the county in that same vein.

But Lewis' campaign was even briefer than Cofer's; a website eventually tied to local political players at GNI Strategies revealed embarrassing Facebook posts Lewis had made in the past, when he was perhaps more Libertarian than progressive. Even more alarming was a crude post he'd made about the rape allegations brought upon Bill Cosby. He apologized for those remarks, and said his jour-
ney from conservative to progressive had been long and arduous.

But the damage had been done, and he announced he'd ditch the race just as the party elites were beginning to draft Wynne. In December, Lewis filed a complaint with the Texas Ethics Commission alleging that GNI's Jovita Pardo used an unregistered political committee to attack his candidacy on behalf of Wynne. Pardo later said her actions fell within state guidelines, and Wynne denied knowledge of the PAC.

HARDING FOR DISTRICT 1: OUTGOING PARTY CHAIR ENTERS CITY RACE

While Austin City Council races are nonpartisan, much of the same ideological jockeying occurs when it comes time to fill the dais. Leaders in District 1 , which is currently represented by outgoing Council Member Ora Houston, who announced on Wednesday that she won't seek re-election, spent much of the spring drafting outgoing Travis County Democratic Party Chair Vincent Harding to run. And on Wednesday, Harding announced that he plans to file for candidacy. He joins a crowded field of candidates, including Natasha Harper-Madison, Mariana Salazar, and Lewis Conway Jr.
"We are at a pivotal moment, 90 years from the 1928 plan, in the middle of a land development code rewrite," Harding said last week when he revealed his plans to me. "At a time where we are consistently one of the Top 10 places to live, we are also one of the most economically and racially

## segregated cities in the country and ... a third of our black and brown

 children are growing up in poverty."Harding declined to assess the district's current leadership, instead focusing talks on economic advancement and transportation. He said he'd support the long-discussed Capital Metro Green Line and workforce solutions to bring "middle skill" jobs (those that don't require a bachelor's degree) to the area. Harding believes his experience at City Hall (he was a member of the city's Board of Adjustment) and its inner workings will go a long way toward making those ideas a reality. "I believe I have the skill set to work with people on many different sides of the issue," he said. "At the same time, while being a coalition builder, I also have the courage to stand up and do what's right and take whatever heat."

more people than just Soifer, but she told me she believes it's important the job not be limited to attorneys with vast resources, which has been the case for as long as most can remember.
"As a working-class person in the community, also as a parent, as someone who's involved in the grassroots - if this position is inaccessible to me because of the time commitment, how many other people are we leaving out of the conversation?" she asked. "How much other talent are we leaving at the door?

Instead of talking about how demanding it is, and how people like me don't have the time to be involved, why don't we create a better system that allows us to be involved?"
94,491 people voted in the TCDP chair election in March: 45,864 for Wynne, 48,627 for Limon-Mercado. Neck and neck, the results made clear that the party was still divided.

## RECONCILIATION?

But there are at least signs the Travis County Dems are making strides toward unity. Travis County Democrats have, at least publicly, begun to make overtures of reconciliation. Watson told me he's enjoyed "getting to know the new chair," and said he's invited Limon-Mercado to participate
in his traditional Twitter town hall at the state convention this next weekend in Fort Worth. "We are developing what I consider to be a really good working relationship."

Watson isn't the only one embracing the "stronger together" theme in the wake of a tough election. Party insiders still sour about the results have been nudged privately by more moderate voices to embrace Limon-Mercado and the change she repre-

 signs the Travis County Dems are making strides toward unity. said he's "encouraged by the number of ideas that she has, and the fact that she is as ready to hit the ground running and get it done."That support is also showing in the party's fundraising efforts. U.S. Congressman Lloyd Doggett recently signed his name to an email recruiting new sustaining members, and in it he alludes to the need for unity.
"Following some hotly contested races this year, including the race for our County Chair, we need to come together to take on Trump and his Trumpettes," he wrote. "After meeting with Dyana, our new Chair, to discuss her plans for what our local party can achieve, I have written my own check as a sustaining member.
"We cannot let primary race differences divide us in November. Contributing now can help ensure the Democratic wave does not dissolve into a ripple."

Crystal Bird Caviel is hearing a lot of voices in her head these days. Most of them belong to former slaves African-Americans who lived long enough to be interviewed for a federal Works Progress Administration program in 1937 and have their experiences recorded so future generations could learn what slavery in this country was like directly from those who lived through it. Their voices survive not only in the Library of Congress' Slave Narrative Collection, but also in the play Juneteenth Chronicles, which is being given a staged reading by Spectrum Theatre Company this weekend. As Caviel is direct ing that reading, she's spent several weeks poring over that script, so much so that those former slaves have taken up residence in her head, repeating their stories again and again.

One voice that Caviel also hears, though does not belong to that ancestral group. It is, by contrast, the voice of someone who left this life just two months ago and someone Caviel knew well enough to consider a friend and colleague and mentor - even a "cousin." He was Dr. Billy F. Harden, a beloved educator and fixture in the theatre scene whose death, April 10, was deeply felt in many communities throughout Austin He was mourned at the Metropolitan AME Church, where he had been active in the music program for almost 50 years, including as director of music. He was mourned in area schools, where he'd been a teacher and administrator in Austin and Pflugerville, and a manager at the Extend-a-Care afterschool program for 17 years. And he was mourned in the theatre community, where over the past 35 years he had appeared in dozens of shows with ProArts Collective, Capitol City Playhouse, Live Oak Theatre, State Theatre Company, Zach Theatre Austin Playhouse, and Spectrum, which he had helped found in 2013 and served as executive director. It had been Harden's dream to bring Juneteenth Chronicles to the stage this year, but cancer prevented that. When he accepted that he couldn't be the one to see it and other company projects through, he sought out people who could.

One such person was Caviel. Harden did not have the long history with her that he had with, say, Spectrum co-founders Jacqui Cross, Carla Nickerson, and Janis Stinson - with whom he'd been treading the boards as far back as the Eighties. He'd met Caviel just two years ago, after seeing her in Austin Playhouse's Disgraced. Shortly after that, she made an unusual gift to the company: more than 40 "church lady" hats that belonged to Caviel's grandmother, who was being moved into a care facility. It proved a timely donation, as Spectrum was producing Crowns, a musical based on the tradition of AfricanAmerican women wearing elaborate Sunday-go-to-meeting hats. A few months later, Caviel

## Living Memory

With Juneteenth Chronicles, Crystal Bird Caviel honors ancestors who were slaves and the late Dr. Billy F. Harden

was cast in a Spectrum show, Spunk, so Caviel and Harden had the chance to work side-by-side. And something between them clicked - like they were family. They began working on a play reading series for the company and spoke as regularly as once a week.

After Harden's death, Abena Edwards, the local playwright who created Juneteenth Chronicles, chose to give Spectrum her play - but with a stipulation. According to Caviel, Edwards told the com pany, ""We've got to do this to honor [Billy's] memory, and I'll only let you have it if Bird can direct it.' I think she felt [Billy and I] were on the same page a lot of the time and that I knew his heart and that I have a passion for continuing the work and doing it justice."

Caviel was grateful for the opportunity, but allows that "it was really intimidating" taking on the show. "It's the actual words of our ancestors and elders and the people who lived through this. So I feel this great, great responsibility that their story be told. I've heard a lot of people say, 'We weren't alive back then, so it doesn't matter,' or 'Black folks need to get over it,' or 'I don't want to hear nothin' else about slavery,' or 'My family didn't own

slaves.' They're all just shucking responsibility or putting blinders on. My hope is that this show jars something loose or awakens something in people so that they can have respect for what these people went through. It's a crime against humanity that went on for a very long time, and it was way worse than people could imagine."

The horrors of slavery can be heard many times in the play, in incidents of appalling violence - the one most haunting for Caviel involves a 9 -month-old baby being whipped to death for crying. But the director was struck by how casually they're often related, how the former slaves "talk about something mat-ter-of-factly that is a horrendous, horrendous thing. 'Well, that's just the way it was. So-and-so got his foot cut off 'cause he tried to leave.' That they could talk about that kind of thing like it was commonplace. There are stories where people are working in a field, and former slaves come walking by, and they're like, 'Why are you still working? You free. You know that, right?' 'No, our masters will tell us when we're free.' 'Well, we got the word from them Yankees. We been free.' But they're like, 'Nope. Don't
even believe you. Massa and Missy are good people. They'll let us know when we's free.' Damn! Turns out Massa and Missy wanted us to finish the crop, to make sure everything got done before they informed us about emancipation. So selfish.
"I feel like the work is a metaphor that reflects the black experience as a whole tragedy and joy and all of these things at once. The whole show is like a roller coaster for me. 'I went down to the town and married so-and-so and we jumped over the broom and it was a good time.' And the next story is like, 'Missy gave me 500 lashes, and I laid across the log all day and I thought I was dead.' The stark contrast of the experience that could be your life is shocking."
The power of those experiences has made Caviel very conscious of who she casts. "You have to be able to tell a story, and it really is a skill that not everybody has," she says. Indeed, Caviel has faced challenges in finding the right match of performers to material that have left her feeling stressed or stuck. Then, she says, "I'll stop and try to think of what [Billy's] advice would be for me. He'd be like, 'Niece, just do the work. Move forward and let the work speak for itself.' I feel him and hear him in my head a lot. And it's about progress, about just keep going and move forward and move through it. Even on his literal deathbed, he was like, 'Let's get that goin'.' It took so much effort for him to get those words out of his mouth. He wasn't even looking at me, he was looking off into the distance, but I was talking to him about the reading series and trying to make sure he knew somebody was gonna keep it going. He's on my ancestor altar, so I pass his smiling face every day and think, 'I'm doing it.' Even if it's not perfect - and I'm gonna do the best I can - I know he's proud of me because he feels somebody's charging ahead, carrying the torch for him. I know it. And that gives me peace."
And when Caviel has followed her mentor's dictum to "just do the work," it's led her and her cast to amazing connections to their ancestors. "There's a special thing that happens in the room; it's like a magic is happening because you're plugged into this living memory. It's come alive in the room so many times. Reading the words of those people and having someone say, 'I know this name,' or 'I've heard this story,' or 'I think those are my people,' there's something really special about that. Oh, I have chills. It's an important opportunity for us to tell their stories so they can continue to live. My whole thing is: What is remembered lives. And that's why this is so important."

Missing the Point
Zach Theatre's Sunday in the Park With George is nearflawless in its execution but with little emotional reward

At open, we see a man painting. His model, Dot, is standing in the sun. She feels hot and stiff and she has eyestrain. The artist, however, is oblivious to her existence, beyond her relationship to his work. This is Georges Seurat, the post-impressionist French painter in the 1880s.

The scene is clever and quirky, and it sets the stage for Sunday in the

ating the same conditions of chaos and distraction, with the same response. The larger story illustrates the driving desire of a great artist to make something new and beautiPark With George (music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim, book by James Lapine). The first act tells the now-familiar story of the obsessive male artist who eventually chases away his female lover through neglect, favoring his work instead of real human connection. His deepest desire is to impose aesthetic order on chaos, represented by the characters of Seurat's painting A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte, who live out their desires, secrets, and betrayals all around him.

In the second act, we see Seurat's genetic and artistic descendants a century later, cre-

Zach Theatre's production is a curious case of near-flawless execution, with very little emotional reward. The music of Sunday in the Park is technically difficult, and the

As Seurat, Cecil Washington Jr . is remarkable, showing just how versatile and skilled a performer he is. bustles are a thing. Cliff Simon's set is smart and aids the production.

As a composer of musical theatre, Sondheim has attracted a devoted and passionate following for whom he can do no wrong. Acknowledging that, and the major awards that Sunday in the Park With George won in the Eighties and Nineties, this is still a flawed musical. The first act pretty much says it all, and the second fails to offer any additional profound resolution. Again, the performers deliver beautifully, and it's great to see the younger George (Washington) and the elderly Marie (Blackwood) exercise their comic timing and character work. In this production, however, the younger George's chal-
lenges don't engender much investment from the audience, and the elder George's story fits a now-familiar narrative pattern - and hey, the tortured male artist who treats his family like crap is a valid paradigm because look at all of them out there, right? Only, when Sunday in the Park is placed in that context, what leaps out from this production is the technical mastery of the music, not a unified comment on the artist or his process.

The problem with Zach's production is ultimately the same problem that the character George experiences in his personal life: In seeking to achieve technical and aesthetic mastery, he fails to live fully within the human experience.

The girl cups the baby bird in her hands, anxious eyes locked on it as she fears that life is ebbing from its tiny body. The girl had never heard that mama birds reject babies that had been touched by a human. She was just worried for it having fallen out of the nest; it looked so small and defenseless and alone on the ground. The girl had just wanted to help, but now her touch will cause it to die.

The vulnerability of small things is at the heart of Little Bird, the new drama by Austin playwright Nicole Oglesby. Like the avian creatures that inhabit East Texas' Piney Woods, girls like Willa, who touched the bird, and her bestie Peg live in a perilous place, where they are exposed to dangers they're ill-equipped to defend themselves against and where a touch can be deadly. Both have reached the unlucky age of 13 , when their minds are still attached to childhood but their bodies are growing out of it whether they want them to or not. And those bodies are attracting attention whether the girls want them to or not - attention from men who want to do more than look. The girls know a man's touch can be lethal: Another girl their age, Margot, went missing, and now her spirit haunts the bayou. Still, having a grownup's interest can make you feel grown yourself, which is a great temptation. So as Willa and Peg encounter various adult males whose solicitous nature seems to mask a prurient interest in them, the atmosphere of dread grows as thick as the hot, humid air of a swamp - a dread amplified by Oglesby's choice to have all the men played by a single actor identified in the program as portraying "The Hunter." In this place, girls are prey.
In such a setup, there's an inevitability to tragedy; you can anticipate the predator taking down its quarry as surely as you can that Chekhovian gun firing before the play's final curtain. But Little Bird has more going on in it than a long, tense wait for disaster. Ghosts exist, which allows characters who have been killed to stick around and work through
their earthly issues in the afterlife. Oglesby's exploration of spectral existence takes us to unexpected places and provides some of her play's most human moments: the blossoming of friendships between spirits, the liberation from fears that troubled one in life, the frustration with time passing, the exhaustion of watching the world from an unbreachable remove, the yearning to comfort a loved one and be remembered by them. The dead, we see, are no less vulnerable than the living.
"We were too little," "We were so little," say Willa and Peg late in the play as the two reflect together on the time when they were 13. It speaks to the strengths of Heartland Theatre Collective's premiere of Little Bird and the sensitivity of Marian Kansas' direction that the exchange bears the weight of close friendship and passed time. As Willa and Peg, Franny Harold and Kenzie Stewart, respectively, create the distinctive bond of friends who are opposites in personality and sensibility and yet enjoy each other, forming a complementary whole. Stewart is the more confident of the pair, still free of adolescent insecurities, chin up, eyes trained on the sky By contrast, Harold is all downcast gaze and furrowed brow, fretful and haunted (qualities also expressed beautifully by Christabel Lin's live violin playing). You sense how well Harold and Stewart fit together when you see either play a scene with any of Keith Adam Paxton's Hunter characters; his men are always trying to get something from a girl, and no matter how genial and considerate he sounds, his voice leaves an oily trail behind. Left to themselves, the girls are more inclined to give than take - this extends to Laney Neumann's Margot, an animated apparition in a tulle tutu - which makes one wish they could live in a place of their own, free of cruel, controlling men. Unfortunately, they reside in a dark wood infested by those who think it's their right to stalk and grab whatever they want, no matter how small or vulnerable.

In sharing the program of her company's June concert with other choreographers, Kathy Dunn Hamrick set aloft a tone of generosity. Along with two short works of her own, she presented creations by two of her company dancers, a work by New York-based Project 44 (which she'd previously brought to Austin for last years's Austin Dance Festival), and even a work by longtime lighting designer Stephen Pruitt. The concert's title, Company, seemed cheeky in its simplicity until its double meaning hit: Hamrick's company, with long-tenured dancers and a regular season schedule, defines, perhaps more than any other modern dance group in Austin, the term "dance company," but the company had invited company.

Hamrick's dances, the bookends of the program, were packed with vivid, human choreography and driven by a keen point of view. The first, the sextet "Ones and Twos," began in silence. After a few minutes, the first piercing, familiar notes of Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor came across as tongue-in-cheek, but as the piece progressed, the dancers, agile and adept, morphed into symbiosis with the music, fuguing and swirling as though tossed around by the air shooting through the organ's pipes. Despite this music's minor key, after the first threatening minutes, you might hear a sort of persevering, determined joy. In exquisite relationships with each other and the music, the dancers of "Ones and Twos" showed jubilance persevering along with the ever present sinister.

Next came Project 44, an all-male company, in director Gierre J. Godley's "John D." Who was John D.? Three lithe men

seemed to mourn, with backbends and pensive plaints, and to support each other with sensitive partnering in their shared trials, all to compositions of driving and pizzicato strings by Ezio Bosso and Milko Lazar. Godley's mission, according to a program note, is to thwart "preconceived notions about masculinity." It happened that I saw the performance on the day of Anthony Bourdain's death by suicide. As the dancers somersaulted and raised their hips in vulnerable bridges, circling the center stage mark as though it were a demon, I thought of

Bourdain and the vulnerabilities within us all that have nothing to do with masculinity or femininity.
The subsequent works were lighter. "Data," by KDHDC dancer Lisa Anne Kobdish, was a cute, clever daydream about robots learning to be human, with the cast of six jumpsuited dancers led by the charming Mariclaire Glaeser, her curious eyes peek ing up through her platinum blond bangs. "I'd Like to Solve the Puzzle," by company dancer Alyson Dolan in collaboration with dancer Jessica Boone, was more abstract, with Dolan and Boone in shiny gold rompers designed by Grace Grant - one with a V-front, the other with a V-back. To music by Drew Silverman, they obsessed over a gesture-focused movement series and fell in and out of sync. In "Oxford," by Pruitt in collaboration with dancers Cara Cook, Kobdish, and D. Poet Powell, the dancers' button-up shirts - sometimes buttoned correctly, sometimes not - were symbolic of social presentation and unease.

The final work on the program was the funniest. Hamrick's "Pièce de Résistance" put four of her female dancers in flowered frocks under sunny lights, serially and joyfully disobeying the amplified voice that told them to stand still, avoid touching, keep their feet on the floor, and so on. Whole essays might be written on the idea evoked by this sweet dance - that the body is a site of resistance, which makes it important to pay attention to what dance artists are doing. But the quartet launched into a fun, purposely awkward adagio to the "Méditation" from Thaïs, and no one felt like writing an essay anymore. "Don't do it," warned the voice several times, not specifying the final prohibited action. The dancers beamed at the audience, and two of them gave the other two giant smooches on their cheeks.

## Hello, Newman

## THIS SLOW-SMOKED BARBECUE IS DELICIOUS EVEN WITHOUT THE MEAT by Alisha McDarris

One Austin man stands tall in the fight for animals, environment, and vegans' right to partake in Texas' favorite meal. Blake Newman is hellbent on providing the local meat-free community with the best damn barbecue they've ever had, but this wasn't his original game plan.

Before he opened BBQ Revolution back in 2013, Newman's plan was to offer a varied menu that just happened to include a meatfree barbecue sandwich. He tossed the idea around with a friend at a bar one fateful eve and came to the abrupt conclusion that barbe cue sandwiches (or tacos, or burgers, or anything Austin had plenty of already) did not make for a novel food truck enterprise. But real vegan barbecue, prepared traditionally? Nobody else was doing that, and they still aren't. Sure, vegans can fill up on barbecue sandwiches at a few local restaurants and food trucks, including Beer Plant and Blue Cat Cafe - both big players in the Austin vegan food scene - but one barbecue-inspired sandwich is not what Newman had in mind.

The term barbecue isn't necessarily equivalent to meat; it's more about the process and resulting flavor. In the same way all of Austin's conventional barbecue joints painstakingly tend to their beef briskets and pork ribs, BBQ Revolution utilizes marinades, dry

rubs, and hours of smoking to attain those craveworthy layers of flavor expected to come out from a barbecue joint. He says, "Everything is done pretty much the same way you would do with meat."
While his focus medium is different from the offerings at Black's or Franklin, Newman is a legit pitmaster: Instead of bovine pectoral muscle, he smokes seitan brisket. Instead of pork ribs, he serves up flavorful slabs of savory tempeh ribs. In place of chopped beef, he offers the crowd-pleasing favorite soy curls. This plant-based barbecue is delicious, but, predictably, also meatless with a mission (because no self-respecting plant-based chef would pass up the opportunity to proselytize when asked): Newman believes that plant-based barbecue is not only animal-friendly, it's better for the environment and people's health, too. There is no cholesterol, no bones, no gristle. "It's good to the last bite, and you never have to spit anything out," Newman says.
As vegans across Austin are painfully aware, the popular trailer has been out of commission for some time now and fans were starting to get nervous that they'd seen the last of BBQ Revolution. Facebook posts and online reviews were pouring in from barbecue lovers begging for answers and pleading for


Newman to reopen soon. He'd closed up shop after a big Oktoberfest bash last year, with the intention of taking a breather and finding a new space. From sick pets to frozen trailer pipes, personal and professional setbacks cropped up over the last year. Permits took longer than anticipated, refrigerators had to be replaced, electricians were rescheduled. "I didn't plan on it being this long," he explains. "It took a lot out of me."
Finally, as of May 30, BBQ Revolution is back and better than ever, and it's already
proving to be well worth the wait. While Newman is only reopening the food truck for now, the plans for a brick-and-mortar restaurant across the parking lot are shaping up. He'll be sharing the space with White Mountain, the same folks that make the quality seitan Newman slow-smokes. He'll still serve up fan favorite sides like creamy mac \& cheese, Cajun corn, and potato salad, and has a few surprises in store (vegan McRib, anyone?). Bring your appetite. Newman will supply the Wet-Naps.

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## Old-School 'Cue

## Austin's barbecue culture is well-seasoned thanks to these pioneers

In the past decade, Texas barbecue culture reached peak popularity, but long before selfies and hashtags existed, barbecue was a simple, staple food with a long history in Central Texas. "Barbecue used to be poor-people food," says Matt Sullivan, the owner of House Park Bar-B-Que. "You'd buy a quantity of it in bulk for a good price and you could eat it for days and days. That's the whole philosophy of smoked meats - you'd smoke it to preserve it so it would last a long time."

In 1943, five years before Louie Mueller Barbecue (in Taylor) and Kreuz Market (in Lockhart) transitioned from meat markets to barbecue joints, House Park Bar-B-Que opened on West 12th Street. Three different families owned it before Sullivan's father Joe bought it in 1981 and ran it for 35 years before Sullivan took over the reins three years ago. "My dad bought it because it was important to him to keep a place like this around in Austin, and that's the exact same way I feel,"
says Sullivan, who grew up in Clarksville, assisting his father at the pits after school let out at Pease Elementary. "It's very important to keep a piece of Austin here, especially while it's changing so quickly."
While some of Austin's oldest barbecue joints - like Salt Lick, Stubb's, County Line, and PoK-e-Jo's - went on to expand into multiple locations, plenty of other popular family-run establishments closed their doors throughout the years. Just this winter, Austin bid farewell to Ruby's BBQ, a beloved campus-area restaurant and staple of the city's blues community.

These old-school joints may have laid the foundation for the spots currently drawing in barbecue bros by the droves, but the culture has changed plenty over the years. These days devotees line up early in the morning to get their hands on heaping piles of meat ranked best in the state. But Salt Lick, which began as a roadside pit in 1967 before building a restaurant big enough to

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fit 12, evolved into its current iteration in an effort to keep lines at bay.
"My father didn't like people waiting in line too long, so every time the wait became longer than an hour and a half, he would add a section onto the building," says Salt Lick's current owner Scott Roberts. "We've had eight different expansions, including adding another building. We are what we are today because my father was Hill Country friendly and didn't like people waiting in line."

When Iron Works BBQ opened Downtown in 1978, founder Charlotte Finch offered the standard trio of sides found at all Central Texas barbecue joints: beans, potato salad, and coleslaw. Now, points out her nephew and general manager Aaron Morris, they offer almost 10 different options. He also says meat preferences have changed considerably through the years.
"Fat used to be a very taboo thing, so we used to cook lean briskets and cut the fat off for the customers," says Morris. "Today, we use the USDA Prime briskets, which have a higher fat content, and more customers ask for the fatty end than lean."
"I was brought up when the fatty part of the brisket was for chopped beef only and now it is a delicacy," adds Joe Reese, one of the owners of Green Mesquite BBQ. "People used to get mad if they got even a speck of fat with their brisket. Public perception has really changed."

Though most of these foundational barbecue joints have stayed relevant by making these subtle alterations, House Park prides itself in serving food the same way since day one: using high-quality meat and not a sprinkle of seasoning - not even salt or pepper. Sullivan says their secret lies in the wellseasoned pit, and at 75 years old this year, it's one of the last remaining brick pits in town.
"A lot of people these days want to make cooking brisket a science project and it's just a simple thing - meat, smoke, and patience," says Sullivan. "In my opinion, if your meat needs a bunch of seasoning, you're not doing it right." However, he doesn't begrudge the current state of barbecue affairs one bit. "When people will wait in line like they will now and be willing to pay more than it would be to eat a steak, it's pretty incredible to me," he says with a laugh. "I'm not complaining about that!"

Though Iron Works also keeps things pretty traditional, Morris appreciates this wave of new-school barbecue. "The young people in Austin started putting creative energy into the food scene, including barbecue, and really taking things to another level," he says. "Some of it seems a little trendy and maybe overthought, but I think all in all it is pretty cool that so much attention has been placed on making our style of Central Texas barbecue."

Reese concurs that, with as many different styles as preferences out there, there's room for everyone in the business - and one unifying truth. "Everybody has different tastes, he says. "Some people like the camaraderie of waiting in line, some people like the downhome service. But the secret to good barbecue is getting it fresh. Nothing beats barbecue coming straight off the pit."


## Sam's Bar-B-Que Is Open, for Now

## E. 12TH STREET BARBECUE SPOT NEEDS SUPPORT TO STAY OPEN by Nina Hernandez

Despite concerns from longtime patrons, Sam's Bar-B-Que on E. 12th remains open for business. The news comes as a relief to many because this iconic spot has been serving the Eastside, and the rest of Austin, homestyle barbecue for more than six decades.

Still, current owner Brian Mays, who inherited the restaurant from his father, Dan, warned the Chronicle this week that while he is committed to keeping Sam's Bar-B-Que open, he's also fielding increasingly rich offers on the highly coveted 12th Street lot. In fact, Mays explains that developers recently offered him $\$ 3$ million so they could demolish it and put an apartment building topped with condos on the site.

The outside wall of the small white building features a painted bust of Martin Luther King Jr.; the inside houses the brick pit, seasoned for decades, where they slow-smoke meats from beef to mutton. Sam Campbell opened his eponymous
restaurant in 1957, and when he died in 1976, the Mays family took over, maintaining the focus on good food and good community ever since.

It's that very sense of community that keeps the doors of Sam's Bar-B-Que open. Mays says a major reason he turns down the offers is because people in the neighborhood plead with him to stay open. Sam's is a stalwart in a rapidly changing area where many beloved black-owned businesses have already closed. But with developers from Dallas to California regularly calling Mays, it's not much of a stretch to imagine another offer coming along in the near future. And next time, it might simply be one that's too good to pass up.
"I just turned down \$3 million for the community," Mays said. "I told them, 'I don't mind staying, but I turned down $\$ 3$ million. I need support now.' I'm going to be here, but y'all have got to support me now."


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# Something Sinister, Something Strange 

## C. Robert Cargill's journey from writing about film to making blockbusters

Every author has reasons for writing. Be it inner demons, obsessions, nightmares, contractual obligations, there's something that gets the pen moving, or the keyboard clacking. For C. Robert Cargill, it's the fear of standing still. "I don't like not working," he said. "I hate sitting around on my ass, waiting for a gig. So whenever I'm between jobs, whenever I've turned in a book and I'm waiting on an edit, I've got to write something."

The Austin writer's latest something is We Are Where the Nightmares Go and Other Stories, a collection of horror short stories published this week. Lurking within the anthology are small-town Armageddons, childhood terrors, and zombie dinosaurs - all carved from Cargill's brain in those rare moments of downtime between bigger projects. When his publishers at Harper Voyager approached him about what his next work would be, he looked at the stack of miniature tales and told them, "As it so happens, I have half a book, and I can write the other half."

But the theme also scratches a particular itch. "I wanted to focus on the horror," he said. The completed stories "were things that I wanted to get out there, and this will give me the inspiration to finish this half a story
that I've got, and write these other two stories that I wanted to write, and it'll force me to come up with a third story to fill it out, and it was a lot of fun to put the collection together." That drive to work has made Cargill a fixture in Austin's film and literary scenes for nearly two decades. Aside from his short story collection, he's two books deep into his modern urban fantasy series about Austin-dwelling mage Colby Stevens, and last year he published his first science-fiction novel, Sea of Rust. With his longtime friend and collaborator, director Scott Derrickson, he scripted Blumhouse's found footage inversion Sinister, and then added mysticism to Marvel with Doctor Strange. Before that, under noms de plume, he was one of the founding fathers of modern online film criticism at two of Austin's groundbreaking review websites. On the animated Spill.com, he was the often impassioned Carlyle; while at Ain't It Cool News, he was Massawyrm, his cartoon mascot a muscle-bound barbarian, slaying a vile snake like a cigar-chomping Conan. Even now, he still keeps his film critiquing skills
sharp with Junkfood Cinema, a retrospective podcast with fellow Spill veteran Brian Salisbury which they call a guilt-free celebration of film's forgotten corners.

Tall, bearded, somewhere between burly and gangly (comparing himself to the mus-cle-bound Massawyrm avatar, "there's a couple of bits of artwork where I'm a little more ripped than I was at the time"), his distinctive voice - constantly upbeat and enthusiastic, with a slight rasp - is part of the Cargill brand, and projects across even crowded rooms. But in person he's surprisingly low-key. Even though he's written blockbusters, he still lives in Austin, his wife took his author headshot, and his biggest self-indulgences are good Scotch, and the tabletop miniature game Warhammer 40K. Famously, on his one day off from shooting Doctor Strange in London, he took the train to the industrial city of Nottingham (not exactly a top tourism spot) to visit the Warhammer World museum. As they say, once a film nerd, always a film nerd.

Cargill's literary secret origin is equally far from red carpet glamour. A college dropout
("I had to choose between school and eating"), in the late Nineties he was working as the associate editor for the Sun Poetic Times "a pro-POC, pro-LGBT, literary magazine in San Antonio with 500 circulation. We literally would print up this magazine ourselves, and then we would drop them at libraries and bookstores around town to be sold for $\$ 3$ apiece." He was working on his own novels, and even had an agent, but nothing was clicking. "I was heartbroken. I was 24 years old, and my career is already destroyed."

As for film reviewing, "I just kind of fell into it." Anghus Houvouras of GuerillaFilm.com was desperately looking for someone to write a review of Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon, and asked on the AICN boards if anyone had seen it. Not only had Cargill seen it, but due to a ticketing screwup at a preview screening, he'd seen it twice. "He said, 'Will you write the review?' and I said yes, and it got 50,000 hits on the first day he put it up, which in the year 2000 was insane."
Enter Eric Vespe, aka Quint of Ain't It Cool News, who convinced Cargill to take on the site's recently created and vacated Indie Indie column. "People really liked my reviews, and I shot up through the ranks really quickly. [Then] one thing led to another, and I just kind of ended [up] falling into The Reel Deal, the cable access show here in Austin, and me and Korey Coleman were sitting drinking one night, and started spitballing the idea of an animated version of that, and that became Spill.com, and then that got purchased by a company that owned Hollywood.com, and they needed writers, and then Film.com started reaching out to second- and third-tier writers at a bunch of big sites, and they poached me, and the next thing you know I'm able to quit my day job as a video store clerk, and was able to be a film critic full time."
According to Cargill, this was "the golden age" of the internet, and online critics achieved a celebrity status equaling the big syndicated names, the Eberts and Siskels and Shalits and Kaels. In 2001, "being at Ain't It Cool News was like being at Rolling Stone in the Sixties. Everyone wanted to be the front page." All the time, he tried to keep a realistic view of what his job was: "Not to be right, but to make you think," he said. "Too many critics think their taste is their currency, and their taste is worthless. Everyone's taste is worthless. ... I didn't believe in myself enough to be pretentious. I just saw myself as somebody who loved movies, and could see the way that story worked."
What seems more amazing is that the film blog explosion was so centered around Austin, away from the big media and studio attention. Yet for Cargill, that was exactly why those sites became so influential. "We were ungettable," he said. "When you were a critic in New York or L.A., all you had to do was be invited out to some of the events, and everyone could meet you, and everyone could offer you things. 'Would you like to interview so-and-so? Hey, why don't you come down to the set next week and take a

gander?" In those pre-smartphone days, studios and big media outlets thought the internet was a cute diversion; meanwhile, sites like AICN and Spill were building up massive fan bases, and were doing so with an authentic voice. When the studios finally realized what was happening online, "It became kissing the ring, so a few people bent over backwards to see [AICN founder Harry Knowles], and then everybody thought they had to."

Of course, that era now has an asterisk next to it, after Knowles and former Birth. Movies. Death. editor Devin Faraci were both accused of sexual harassment and assault. This hit home for Cargill: While both were peers, and he owed his first break to Knowles, the allegations against both were made, in some cases, by women Cargill knew, some of them even friends. So while there's empathy for his fallen peers, sympathy is in shorter supply. "You guys were playing a game of musical chairs in which you didn't think you were ever going to get caught or punished for that. The music stopped, and you were the ones without a chair. You know what? I'm very sorry that your life sucks, but maybe you shouldn't have said that to my friend. Maybe you shouldn't have done that to my friend."

But by the time those allegations were made two years ago, Cargill was long gone from film criticism. It was actually 2007 when he started transitioning from writing about film to writing films, because he saw the writing on the wall. He said, "Everybody thought there was money in the industry, but I knew the industry was going to tank. Businesses were going to get bought up and consolidated.'

While he acquired the nickname Cargill Little (because he kept warning everyone the sky was falling), turns out he was right. A decade later, most of those sites he wrote for - Spill, Film, Hollywood, even Guerilla Film - are gone, and rather than trying to jump to more traditional media as a critic, he used two key components of his time online to springboard back into storytelling. First, he realized that in writing about films, "I was becoming what is called a diagnostician. ... Every time I interviewed a filmmaker, I was learning from them. I was asking them questions I wanted to know about filmmaking." Second, he reached out to a director he knew, Scott Derrickson, to give him notes on a manuscript, and the rest is cinematic history.

If Sinister was the duo's calling card, it was 2016's Doctor Strange that really made their reputation. At the time, it was massive
news when it was announced, mid-production, that Cargill had been working with Derrickson for months on the project (in a sign of the rare close working relationship between the two, Cargill was actually on set in London - unusual in an industry where writers are often pariahs). Describing their working relationship, Cargill jokingly refers to himself as "the brilliant guy that works with the other brilliant guy." Even though much of his film work involves Hollywood studios, Cargill's managed to stay in Austin, and either calls or Skypes in to meetings. When face-to-face time is required, "[Scott's] there, and he's giving the pitch, and then someone asks a question, and Scott goes, 'Cargill?' and then I give an answer." Not that his physical absence is a real issue. "Even people in L.A. go, 'It's a three-hour drive; can we just Skype it?""

For his first two major projects, Cargill had the good fortune to work with two of the most important producers of the modern era. Sinister was one of the first post-Paranormal Activity films for Jason Blum's now unstoppable Blumhouse shingle, while Doctor Strange proved that Marvel Cinematic Universe supremo Kevin Feige knew audiences were open to more than just smash-andbash superhero action. Cargill put their real successes down to talent spotting. Blum took filmmakers who had been misused and spat out by the bigger studios, and let them run free with a budget so small it would be basically impossible to take a loss. As for Feige, he did that within a mega-franchise. "The big thing that Kevin has realized is, let the filmmaker be the filmmaker. He let James Gunn be James Gunn, and he got Guardians of the Galaxy. He let Scott Derrickson be Scott Derrickson, and he got Doctor Strange. He let Taika Waititi be Taika Waititi, and he got Thor: Ragnarok. He let Ryan Coogler be Ryan Coogler, and he got Black Panther."

While Cargill's critical career set him up for Hollywood, of course the day came when he crossed paths with a filmmaker with less fond memories of Massawyrm. "I managed to get seven years into my career without having that moment," he said, and it happened one night over sushi, when a producer he was pitching to brought up an old, less than positive review. After what he called "the most unreal three hours of my life," the producer made it clear that Massawyrm's legacy, and Cargill's future, were separate. "[He said,] 'Go home, roll around, get a terrible night's sleep, wake up tomorrow morning and know that we're starting over fresh, and we're going to make a movie together."



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# Everyone's Favorite Neighborhood 

How Mister Rogers made us better people in Won't You Be My Neighbor?

There are certain figures in our pop culture firmament that many of us couldn't bear to have fall to Earth. I'd put Fred Rogers, America's cardigan-wearing co-parent for close to 40 years, at the top of that list. Allow me then to reassure you - and this constitutes (I guess?) a spoiler - nothing revealed in this loving portrait of the creator and star of children's show Mister Rogers' Neighborhood will sully his reputation. Indeed, you're liable to come away with an even greater appreciation of him.

What you won't come away with is a traditional cradle-to-grave education on the life and times of Fred Rogers (We're fully three-quarters of the way through before Rogers' smirking sister brings up his childhood nickname, "Fat Freddy.") Instead, documentarian Morgan Neville, an Oscar winner for 2014's lively 20 Feet From Stardom and a lock for another nomination here, pulls together biography, psychology, and cultural history to probe Rogers' mission to teach kids how to be moral, compassionate, confident citizens of the world.

I remember the show as all gentleness and sock puppets, the original slow TV - a not inaccurate, but certainly incomplete
assessment. Using archival footage, Won't You Be My Neighbor? reminds us of the show's progressive approach to broaching difficult subjects with kids, from national tragedies (RFK's assassination, the Challenger disaster) to divorce and racial equality Rogers, an ordained minister, didn't change minds from behind a pulpit or a protest sign He did it with quietly radical acts like splashing his feet around in the same wading pool

(1)as his black co-star, François Clemmons, at a time when segregated pools were still commonplace in the South.
Won't You Be My Neighbor? presents Rogers as a complex, fallible,

$\star \star \star \star$ often very funny human who had self-doubts like anybody else, beautifully expressed in a series of animated interstitials (by Ariel Costa and Rodrigo Miguel Rangel) that use Rogers' doppelgän ger, Daniel Tiger. Neville's film isn't making a case for canonization. But it is a call to action. Poignantly recalling that time of life when we were first learning how to be our best selves, the film unstridently reminds us that the work doesn't stop once we grow up and out of the neighborhood.

Where is the line between fact and fiction in documentary cinema? For many moviegoers, documentaries are synonymous with truth, a re-creation of historical events using primary documents and firsthand accounts. Like any piece of storytelling, though, documentaries involve choices. Subjects recount their version of the truth, editors shape the story by what they choose to omit, and performers decide how sympathetic (or unsympathetic) their characters should be. Based on the strengths of American Animals, this tension between fact and fiction is something writer-director Bart Layton (also responsible for the equally slippery The Imposter) understands on a very instinctive level.

Blurring the border between documentary and high-stakes crime drama, American Animals offers a unique take on the Transy Book Heist, the 2004 robbery of several rare books from the Transylvania University campus in Lexington, Ky. Spencer (Keoghan) is an art student suffering an existential crisis; as talented as he may be, he feels that he has lived too pampered a life to create anything of any real value. Warren (American Horror Story's Peters), a childhood friend, suffers from a similar type of middle-class ennui. When the two men learn that Spencer's college houses an expensive collection of rare books, they decide to try a little experiment. What would happen if two normal college kids decided to try their hand at professional theft? Could they actually pull it off?

The performances and pacing make for a snappy enough heist film, but those who sit down blindly may be surprised to find a second element at play. Layton, a longtime documentary filmmaker, has chosen to include direct interviews with Spencer Reinhard, Warren Lipka, and other key figures in the heist. This gives Layton a chance to play with both fictional and nonfictional elements

in his film. Details in the narrative change based on who is doing the telling; the rea Spencer and Warren are also occasionally inserted into the fictional narrative, and as a result, American Animals is as much an exercise in objective truth - or the lack thereof - as it is the retelling of a single series of events.

None of which lessens the film's overal impact. In the hands of a lesser filmmaker this approach might have felt like a mar keting gimmick, something meant to allow American Animals to stand out amidst an ocean of festival films and true-crime adapta tions. In the hands of Layton, these two storytelling modes are hopelessly intertwined. His script uses both approaches to hammer home the trauma experienced and inflicted by Spencer and Warren's crew. When fact and fiction are united in a prolonged explo ration of post-heist guilt, American Animals offers a truly poignant look at what it costs us to cross an invisible line between right and wrong.

Making his directorial debut in this adaptation of popular Australian author Tim Winton's eighth novel, actor Simon Baker (best known as television's The Mentalist) treats Winton's spare prose in Breath like a sacred text, in keeping with the author's revered literary status in his native country. It's one of the few narration-dependent films in recent years in which the words don't get in the way of the story.

Set in a western Australian coastal village during an unspecified time in the Seventies, the movie is narrated by a grownup Bruce "Pikelet" Pike (played as a teen by Coulter) looking back on his boyhood friendship with the daredevil Loonie (Spence) and the mentorship offered by the quietly charismatic Sando (Baker), a former professional surfer who teaches his two eager students how to ride the swells and experience "the hand of God." The film's aquatic scenes (superbly filmed by water cinematographer Rick Rifici) are both exhilarating and humbling; you get the rush of excitement the boys feel while riding the gigantic waves that Sando affectionately calls "Old Smoky." But the narrative takes an unexpected shift after Sando and Loonie abruptly leave town to pursue the Indonesian surf, leaving an abandoned Pikelet to deal with Sando's emotionally and physically scarred wife Eva (Debicki), a woman drowning in her own sadness. As odd as it may initially seem, The Endless Summer becomes Summer of '42, and Breath reveals itself to be the coming-of-age story it's been all along.

Baker paces the film similarly to reading a book. There's a leisurely pleasure in the way he allows things to unfold, although a couple of unanswered questions stick in the craw. (For example, is a fatal road involving a car
and a cattle truck that Pikelet encounters on his way home from school the reckless handiwork of Loonie?) And while the titular "breath" leitmotif plays nicely in terms of a trembling Pikelet's hyperventilation as he paddles offshore to catch the big breakers for the first time, the literary device gets weird when erotic asphyxiation is introduced into the storyline as another form of thrillseeking, addictive behavior (a case of too much faithfulness to a source being a tricky thing). But even then, newcomer Coulter grounds the movie in a sincere and wide-eyed clearheadedness that gives Breath its oxygen. Even when Pikelet is confounded by a world of untrustworthy adults, you instinctively know the kid will be all right. By the end, you'll swear you've seen him mature before your very eyes.

In the 14 years since Pixar's The Incredibles debuted, consumer intake of the heroic adventures of mask- and cape-clad saviors has grown exponentially. It's even leading some cinemagoers to suffer from "Superhero Fatigue," an existential disorder whose side effects may include, but aren't limited to: a numbness in the visual cortex due to overexposure of depictions of CGI destruction, a tendency for the mind to suddenly go blank when friends and family are discussing plot minutiae and costume designs, and sudden narcolepsy. The first film was released four years prior to Marvel's Iron Man and could be seen as the precursor to the subsequent onslaught. And while The Incredibles is one of the more highly regarded films in the Pixar stable, this sequel stands adeptly by its side while avoiding most of the aforementioned exhaustion.

Incredibles 2 picks up the action immediately following the events ending the original film. The Parr family - Mr. Incredible (Nelson), Elastigirl (Hunter), Violet (Vowell), and Dash (Milner) - thwart the Underminer (Pixar good-luck-charm Ratzenberger) from robbing a

bank, but the collateral damage to the infrastructure of New Urbrem sends them fleeing into hiding again. Enter Winston Deavor (Odenkirk), a tycoon whose mission is to see the return of superheroes to public life and service. He launches a campaign using Elastigirl in PR stunts designed to ingratiate her in the public eye. That leaves the paterfamilias as a stay-at-home dad, coping with the domestic duties and the increasingly erratic emergence of their young baby Jack-Jack's mutant powers (they are legion). Eventually, the main nemesis appears, a brainwashing mastermind called Screenslaver, and the family must work together to save the day again.

Pixar has nary an inferior product in its filmography (sorry, except those Cars films and their assorted spin-offs), and the studio has become the gold standard for big-budget computer animated entertainment. The themes of Pixar's output generally adhere to a loose template that goes something like:

In order to achieve a goal, you need your friends and family to do so, and the relationships you have with those people/toys/various manifestations of your own psyche, etc. are the glue that bind humanity together. In the Incredibles films, some critics have noted that the premise of a society that tries to stifle extraordinary people falls right in line with Ayn Rand's Objectivist philosophy, but I have a hard time believing that writer/director Brad Bird and co. are trying to indoctrinate the wee ones, intentional or not (I guess we'll leave that to Zack Snyder, who wants to adapt Rand's The Fountainhead. Good luck!).
The action sequences are breathtaking, and the character-driven humor is, as per usual, top notch. Returning characters make an appearance, new ones are introduced, and everyone gets a moment to shine, although little Jack-Jack steals the entire movie with his emotionally uncontrollable chaos. If there is a gripe here, it's that this

## AUSTIN'S NEWEST COMIC AND FILM CONVENTION LEAPS INTO ACTION by Moisés Chiullán

This weekend, Greater Austin Comic Con kicks off its first installment out in Cedar Park. Headlined by Doug Jones (star of the Oscar-winning The Shape of Water), and featuring comics legends and local rising stars, it promises to be a weekend of panels, live drawing demonstrations, a costume contest, and even a superhero-themed car show. Co-founder Vo Nguyen sat down with the Chronicle to talk about not only the attractions, but why he wanted to start this new convention in Austin.

Austin Chronicle: How long have you been on the Texas convention scene?
Vo Nguyen: As an artist, l've been doing shows for about 26 years. My first one was the Dallas Fantasy Faire, when I was in high school. AC: Austin already has the much-beloved indie comicsfocused Staple!, as well as a Wizard World "celebrity con" each fall. Why did you want to start a show of your own, and how does it fit alongside those cons?
VN: I set up a Facebook group called Rate That Comic Con because I found so many Texas promoters were setting up comic cons that weren't doing right by the artists or the fans. Years ago, there was one con in particular that I helped out with here in Austin that had an incredible guest list, but the promotion of the event didn't get the word out to the local community, and no one was there It was a ghost town. That looks bad on the promoter, but it also looks bad on Austin. I
got tired of it. A bad con like that gives the city a bad name with anyone who was a guest, and people talk.

I grew up here, and now I feel like I have the skill set, having helped run a

Shakespeare had his comedies, his tragedies, and his historical works. And then there were the problem plays, this weird melding of laughs and nightmares that never seemed to know exactly what they wanted to be (more than one director has silently cursed that the real problem is working out how to produce these awkward hybrids).

The same can probably be said for Pom Poko (to give it its full title, Heisei Tanuki Gassen Ponpoko, translated only slightly less opaquely as Heisei-era Raccoon Dog War Ponpoko), one of the most obtuse creations in the Studio Ghibli archive by director Isao Takahata. It was wedged in between two of his most charming family stories (1991's
wistful Only Yesterday and 1999's giggly comedy My Neighbors the Yamadas), and it was definitely a change of pace. It was arguably his attempt to stake a fresh claim on the fantastical ground that his Ghibli co-founder Hayao Miyazaki had mastered (after all, Takahata was arguably there first, with the groundbreaking The Great Adventure of Horus, Prince of the Sun). To be blunt, he doesn't pull it off. But Pom Poko is so delightfully weird, and jam-packed with oddities, that it's never dull, even if it is sometimes a little too disturbing for its own good.

The tanuki of the full title are Japanese raccoon dogs (just dubbed raccoons here), a woodland creature that looks like a wolverine, but has the distracted amiability of a hedgehog. In Japanese folklore, they are pleasantnatured shape-shifters who are too easily distracted to be a menace to the human world. But when a massive postwar development outside of Tokyo threatens to destroy their ancestral home, the tanuki of Tama Hills must use their magicks to protect the trees.

If Pom Poko proves one thing, it's how incredibly delicate the balance was that Miyazaki so often struck. One instant, Takahata has his cartoonish little creatures partying and pratfalling; the next they're roadkill. There's a double-digit-size core cast, and if it wasn't for a narration (provided in the U.S. dub by LaMarche, one of a coterie of Futurama alums here) then the vast web of subplots, many of which unravel, would
be impenetrable. It's no surprise that it took almost a quarter-century for a U.S. theatrical release, and that's not even taking into account the tanuki's legendarily huge testicles. Here hand-drawn in all their glory, the dubbed script may call them a "pouch," but no one's being fooled.

There's a visual whiplash that reflects the narrative discord. One moment the tanuki have the cuddly edges of classic anthropomorphic Disney; the next, the visceral nature-red-in-tooth-and-claw accuracy of Watership Down; suddenly, they have the rubbery bounce of kids' favorite Doraemon.

Children, it is said, are resilient creatures able to survive physical and emotional difficulties while retaining few, if any, permanent scars. Although that's generally true, it shouldn't imply that a child's experience of difficulties is free of pain, confusion, and suffering. Even if the discomfort doesn't metas tasize into a lifelong fixture, the discomfort is a present-day irritation for the child who is experiencing it. This is the territory explored in the Spanish film Summer 1993, which shows how a young girl integrates into the family of her aunt and uncle after her own mother's death has left her orphaned.

The feature film debut of Carla Simón is a semiautobiographical work which presents a child's conflicted attitudes about the death of her parents and absorption into a new family unit. Frida (Artigas) is about 6 years old when her mother dies; her father had passed sometime earlier. As the movie opens, Frida
is playing with friends in the street in her hometown of Barcelona while fireworks explode overhead. Indoors, her relatives bustle around the apartment she shared with her mother, emptying its contents and packing up the rest. Frida can hear them in hushed tones talking about her mom and herself, but is not really able to truly comprehend the words' import. Soon she is whisked off to the Catalan countryside to live with he mother's brother Esteve (Verdaguer) and his wife Marga (Cusí), and their daughter Anna (Robles), who appears to be about 3. The city girl finds a lot to like in the natural setting, as well as having a little sister to play with. Her aunt and uncle are warm and loving, and her grandparents and other relatives come to visit often. Yet Frida cannot resist "acting out" on occasion, testing her new family's love and limits.

Most damaging is Frida's lack of solid information. Although the word AIDS is never uttered, it's clear to viewers that this is what killed Frida's parents. The regular blood tests administered to Frida make her aware that there is something to worry about, even if she's not clear what that is. When Frida falls down and scrapes her knee in a playground, other mothers hustle their children away from her bloody knee in a wordless panic that was all too common during the early years of the AIDS epidemic. Another day when Marga stays home from work because she feels ill, Frida worries, and Marga's explanation that it's just her period while tossing out a blooddampened sanitary napkin doesn't offer Frida the comfort she seeks. Neither do the prayers her grandmother makes Frida promise to recite nightly. The religious words are a meaningless jumble, but a Madonna shrine that Frida finds carved into a tree offers some mystical solace.

Summer 1993 reveals itself to us as if it were a scrapbook of memories tumbling forth. Some are clearer than others, yet the movie retains a subjective, childlike point of view. Essential to the film's success is the authenticity of the two young girls. Both are amazing naturals, most of the time behaving as if they are totally unaware that there is a camera present. Simón never milks her story for sentimentality or emotional extremes, and even though Marga and Esteve are also shown facing challenges integrating Frida

into their family, Simón's focus remains on Frida, who has fewer resources with which to deal with the situation. The outlines of the story leave a lot for the viewer to color in, and there are instances in which Simón takes this tendency too far. Winner of the Best First Feature Award at the 2017 Berlin International Film Festival, along with numerous other awards, Summer 1993 is like look ing at someone else's family photo album, seeing some points where the images might have ceased altogether but knowing that, once more, a young girl's resilience has shaped her adversity into art.

We don't stop playing because we grow old; we grow old because we stop playing. If that quote wasn't so wordy, it could easily be on the poster for Tag, a hilariously silly comedy based on an absurd true story.

In 2013, The Wall Street Journal ran a story about a group of school friends who have been playing the same game of tag for 23 years. Every February, they go to extreme measures to make sure the other guy is it. Tag the movie is just that with an all-star cast.

No one is too far out of their comedic wheelhouse. Helms is Hoagie, the nebbish nice guy, married to the overly competitive Anna (Fisher, continuing her untouchable run of off-kilter love interests); Buress is Sable, a walking inner monologue, deadpanning halfformed but incisive thoughts; Hamm is Bob, the slightly sleazy but charmingly ruffled businessman; and Johnson is Chilli, the lovable
burnout. Together, they're fun, but it's when Renner enters the picture as, well, basically Hawkeye (A-ha! So THAT's where he was during Avengers: Infinity War!) that Tag goes berserk to uproarious levels.
After a decade of directing sitcoms, sketch comedy, and stand-up specials, first-time narrative feature director Tomsic appreciates tag the game is rollicking, laughing, running idiocy. So Tag the movie is a kinetic delight, with every game an overblown action sequence. But when Renner's Jerry gets involved, he slows down to bullet time, as he dissects how each of his idiot friends is going to play right into his hands. He so outclasses his buddies that Tomsic can throw in a sequence that is a picture- and note-perfect Predator spoof, and it actually works. He's the grand master, not beyond inviting Chilli and Bob's mutual teen crush Cheryl (Jones) to his wedding to disrupt their plans.

Much of its success depends on Tag, unlike so many recent comedies (looking at you, Life of the Party) not having a mean-spirited word in its entire script. Sure, the guys pull some pretty low tricks on each other, but they are all covered in detail and legal under the games' extensive amended rules. Moreover, even when there's a couple of dirty tricks played, they really don't count because, all the way through, there's a real feeling that they are friends. There's such an easy bonhomie between the core four, with Jerry being just the right amount of outsider, that pantsing and butt-punching or the odd bit of home invasion is perfectly fine.

What's even more charming is that some of the sequences are based on real tags from the actual game. Stick around through the credits to see the actual players, and spot the differences (first, there's actually 10 of them, and second, none of them look like Jeremy Renner). But most importantly, see the similiarity: it's goofy, harmless fun between a bunch of pals that grew up but never grew apart.

## ADRIFT

Adrift is a shipwreck movie that is drawn from the true experience of Tami Oldham (Woodley), who in 1983 survived 41 days adrift in the Pacific after the yacht she was sailing with her fiancé Richard Sharp (Claifin) was pummeled into floating kindling by Hurricane Raymond, a quickly intensifying and unpredictable storm whose peak quinds reached 145 mph . Adrift is also a handy one-word description to sum up the film's tenor: unsure of whether the sea epic intends to be a love story or an action vehicle. It's a maritime adventure that's akin to Titanic's mix of love and salt-water sprays. Woodley, who appears in nearly every frame, reaffirms her stature as one of the best actors of her generation. Adrift is, at its best, an exciting, exclusively female-enacted adventure story, and it's always a pleasure to be able to focus on a heroine's feats rather than her mere physical presence. His grief is compounded by the arrival of pregnant parishioner Mary (Seyfried), whose husband Michael (Ettinger) can discern no point in bringing another life into what he views as a dying world. First Reformed hums disquietingly along at Schrader's own clockwork pace which, like Hawke's mesmerizing performance, is austere, stoic, and ultimately self-destructive. Hotel Artemis feels like a throwback to an earlier, more stripped-down era of action movies in which a ood idea was a sufficient platform on which to drape fine acting and creative execution. And if you're going to canonize someone, you might as well do it while they're still alive and can enjoy it. By threading together the audio from past speeches, testimony from her 1993 confirmation hearings, and sit-down interviews with the subject herself, the filmmakers cleverly give the impression of Ginsburg narrating her own story. Yet his entirely admiring doc is an incomplete one: Ginsburg's contributions are substantial, but this peppy portrait feels a little lightweight next to her stature. (05/04/2018)

## THE SEAGULL

At one point in Russian playwright Anton Chekhov's The Seagull, fatalistically romantic ingénue Nina tells struggling writer Konstantin "But nothing happens in your plays!" It's a criticism Chekhov's detractors have long lobbed at his oeuvre, and The Seagull is no exception. There, he plops you right into the middle of a daisy-chain drama of unrequited love amongst an ensemble of mostly unhappy characters at an idyllic estate outside Moscow. The effort behind this adaptation is unquestionably sincere, but the parts are ultimately better than the whole. Director Mayer appears overwhelmed by the subtextual dialogue assigned to the diverse array of lovesick characters, Stoll as the passively manipulative Boris, and Moss' amazing turn as the vodka-swilling, snuff-snorting Masha are standouts, but in the end, the play's the thing, and Mayer can't fully master it. ## Jump on It

For many, summer remains synonymous with relaxation. Not for Charles "Nook" Byrd. The rapper and promoter turns up his hustle in the dog days to stage, often against great financial and logistical odds, a weekly concert program for Austin's underserved urban youth

Since its 1997 inception, Jump on It has occupied various Eastside parks, football fields, vacant lots, and nightclubs. There's also been long stretches where it didn't happen at all. This year, the series moves to the largest and most visible setting it's ever inhabited: Travis County Expo Center. Jump on It kicks off Wednesday, June 20, with "Hardaway" rapper Derez De'Shon and H-town fixture Trae tha Truth, then continues on hump days throughout the summer. All-ages and free before 6:30pm, it's $\$ 5$ after that.
"We have big ideas on how we want to grow and the Expo Center can finally accommodate that," offers Nook's wife Breanna Byrd, who handles administration for the concert series and its associated community programming, which includes financial literacy classes and free lunches for youngsters.

The move affords Jump on It more acreage, later sound curfews, a second KAZI stage featuring old-school sounds, and better carnival rides, but it also represents a move away from the predominantly African-American central Eastside where a 16-year-old Nook launched the program.
"The older blacks were raised on the Eastside, but when they grew up and got jobs, they moved up to Pflugerville and Round Rock," points out the Eastside native, whose grandfather operated a historic black club on 11th Street called the Corner Grill. "They raised their kids totally separate from the Eastside, so when you're trying to promote something there, the adults know about it, but the teens don't."

Nook now considers the Colony Park/
Lakeside neighborhood, near the Expo Center, Austin's most dense black community. This week he'll be going door-to-door in that hood, along with kids from the city's Summer


## MATTHEW STEINKE'S DELIRIUMS


"Deliriums," showing throughout June and July at the Northern-Southern Gallery, is an art installation combining robotics, sculpture, found sounds, and music to mimic the essence of personality disorders. The presentation consists of three instrument concepts, each representing the "monster manual's" defined categories. Consider a wall of red and white circuitry that hammers drums, shakes pill-bottle maracas, and vibrates a sitar. Then there's a bugle that honks and whirls around. Finally, a large, wooden slide flute powered by a CPAP blower whistles fearfully.

All are reacting to the emotional content coming from a one-hour loop of found dialogue. Last Saturday's bustling premiere felt like a group therapy session of dinging, droning, honking, and whistling that recontextualizes our species' emotional experiences. Northern-Southern Director Phillip Niemeyer stood in awe of Steinke's creation:
"He's created something robotic that's talking about who we are as people."
ghts activist, who passed away in 2005 financed the entire first season on IOUs, then stubbornly convinced the city to fund the program. Once funding became inconsistent, Nook occasionally charged \$5, which felt like pulling teeth.
"Jump on It's always been synonymous with 'free,' so people think the city's paying for it and they shouldn't have to donate, but that's a misconception," explains the promot er. "My budget last year was \$166,000. The city only gave us \$15,000."

The summer institution's scattered 11-year history has been, at times, extraordinary, chal lenging, and - above all - nomadic. Around the turn of the millennium the event was drawing thousands to the Rosewood Park area on the backs of marquee acts, including Juvenile, Z-Ro, Mike Jones, and MC Ren, alongside local talent. By 2003, contention with the city over money and paperwork led to it being held in Spiro's Nightclub, then an undeveloped field on Springdale in 2004.
Frustrated with municipal bureaucracy, Nook spent the next decade focusing on one off events, then brought Jump on It to postgentrification 12th Street at Downs Field in 2015 to underwhelming attendance. Givens Park in 2016 saw big crowds once more, but the following year was snake bit by freak rainstorms and a new fence enclosure that diminished audiences and created tension.
"Black people and fences don't mix," states Nook bluntly.

Thus, producing Jump on It never proved easy, yet always important. Nook continues giving local teens something to look forward to during the summer, but there's also significant cultural implications associated with its perseverance. If an event centered around hip-hop - which, like the blues, is ingrained in the Eastside's DNA - can't endure, it becomes further evidence of declining black entertainment in Austin.
"We rarely have programs we feel we can champion and hold on to. They're either tem porary or too good to be true," states Nook. "Jump on It is different. It's for us and it's lasted though years, but we deserve to have somewhere that's solid."

Musicians go through some shit while making a record sometimes: health issues, personal upheavals, natural disasters. Mike Scheidt, leader of Oregon doom trio Yob, contracted acute diverticulitis during the writing process for the band's new album, Our Raw Heart.
"I had two surgeries, almost died a couple times in the process, got [a staph infection] and shingles, and had an ileostomy bag for three weeks," he explains by phone from his home in Eugene. "I didn't know if I was gonna be able to sing again, or if we were gonna be a band again. I didn't know if I was gonna live long enough to show my bandmates the stuff I was working on."

As the album's tolling rawness attests, Scheidt persevered.
"As each stage passed and I was eventually able to show my bandmates the music and to start building my voice back up, we realized we had a group of songs we felt strongly about. Rehearsing and recording them, and having a new album all in the same year ... it was quite a journey."
An odyssey that continues, as Yob hits the highway. Meanwhile, Scheidt's determined that Our Raw Heart not be defined by his troubles.
"I'm trying to be careful and not have it be like the Sickness Album, you know?" he says. "It's definitely more the Survivl, Triumph \& Moving Forward album."

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## BELL WITCH

Bass and drums doom metal duo Bell Witch deals in loss and bereavement. That trajectory took on a particular potency when founding member Adrian Guerra left the band in 2015 and died unexpectedly the following year. Penned by bassist and singer Dylan Desmond and new drummer/vocalist Jesse Shreibman, Bell Witch's third LP Mirror Reaper presents a monolithic, 83 -minute memoriam to their former bandmate.
The duo phoned in from their respective homes, just a block apart, in Tacoma, Wash.
"After Adrian died, it put a lot more pressure on things," says Desmond. "My old friend had a legacy in the project, so we came to the conclusion that we had to make it even better. That was the best way to honor [Adrian's] memory."
"Dylan and I lived together at the time, and after that happened, we didn't talk about the band for almost a month," recalls Shreibman. "It was different versions of mourning or planning. After his funeral, we hit the ground running."
A single track, Mirror Reaper divides into two reflecting movements. At the halfway point, a cataclysmic bridge between life and death, Guerra's voice enters, lifted from unused past recordings. Throughout, Shreibman's Hammond B-3 organ entangles in the sonic headspace.
"We're trying to make music that's hard to listen to," offers Shreibman. "We're not trying to make accessible pop music for the average person to find on their Spotify mix."
"The piece ties together when someone listens to it all the way through," adds Desmond. "You watch a whole movie to figure out the ending. We wrote this with the idea that there was a conclusion to wrap everything up."

## AGORAPHOBIC NOSEBLEED <br> Saturday 16, Barracuda, 11pm

Agoraphobic Nosebleed has never played Austin. The East Coast grindcore project sprung from the cranium of bedroom-metal-Beethoven Scott Hull in 1994 and existed as a fascinating genre staple for two decades before staging its first proper concert at Maryland Deathfest 2015.
"Scott finally found a way, technologically, to have the drums come across live the way he wanted them to," explains covocalist Richard Johnson.

Hull, known for his fretwork in Pig Destroyer and Anal Cunt, orchestrates ANb's often inhumanly fast and complex drum parts via computer. Johnson reveals the breakthrough as having each drum sound on a separate channel, and a PA onstage to push the results.
"Playing shows opens up a whole new element for the band," says Johnson, who screams alongside Jay Randall and Kat Katz. Encapsulated by 2003's Altered States of America, which came on a 3 -inch CD with 100 songs, ANb involves ridiculous tempos, micro lengths, and confounding themes. 2016's Arc EP thrived longer songs, doomier tones, and truly visceral emotion.
"It's just extremely personal," Johnson said of the latter, written and sung entirely by Katz. "She dug really deep."

The former says Saturday's set list at Barracuda samples all the group's recordings. He hopes it's an up-close-and-personal affair.
"For Kat and I, it's all about connecting with the audience," he says. "At the Housecore Horror Festival [in Satan-Tonio in 2015] there was a barrier and we couldn't see the audience. So I don't know if we reached them, which is what we always want to do."

## PRIMITIVE MAN

 Sunday 17, Lost Well, 8:30pmLast November at the Lost Well, Primitive Man stole the show out from under headliners Bell Witch by sheer brute force. The Denver trio's wall of doom, channeled through bearlike frontman Ethan McCarthy, shook the walls and rattled the cages of those that exited the metal cave singing the praises of Primitive Man.
"We always have a nice time in Austin," emails McCarthy simply. "It was a good show."
2013 debut LP Scorn flays the foundation of the group on the opening title track, 12 seismic minutes ranging from glacial to funereal. Cushioning the singer's ursine larynx expulsion, his guitar sounds like the flight deck of an aircraft carrier, and Joe Linden shatters cymbals into shrapnel at every turn. Monstrous 2015 EP Home Is Where the Hatred Is and last year's full-length Caustic, all on Philly foundry Relapse Records, also blacken white noise into cataclysmic death.
"Scorn was probably our breakout album, but Caustic has been the most well-received," writes McCarthy. "Lots of 'I didn't like your earlier material as much' talk. But, I have to believe that the constant touring over a six-year span is what really put us in the minds of people who like heavy music."
Counterbalance to such apocalyptic weight is a warren of other aural interests for the group leader: True crime podcasts, the detective jazz of Germany's Bohren und der Club of Gore, Salt Lake City pop troupe Choir Boy, techno-gaze L.A. diva Camella Lobo, Aussie punks HTRK, and rappers Maxo Kream, Curren\$y, and Project Pat. Even so, heavy is as heavy does.
"Always been influenced by bands like Crowbar, Neurosis, Disembowelment, Evoken, Corrupted, etc.," concludes McCarthy. "They informed us through auditory osmosis that it is an absolute must to be as crushing, honest, and heartfelt as you can."

## ACID KING sunday 7, Lost well, 9 :3opm

Stoner metal band Acid King famously took its moniker from a killer's quote: "Nobody messes with the acid king."

Founder and frontwoman Lori Joseph read the words by psy-
chedelic fanatic Ricky Kasso in a true crime novel and related to his love of hallucinogens. The band's 1994 debut EP features a photograph of Kasso on its cover.
"I read that book in the early Nineties, and always loved that line," she says.
Raised in Chicago, the singer moved to San Francisco in her early 20s and joined the all-girl Gross National Product. She put an ad in the local paper for fellow lovers of Monster Magnet and Kyuss, which led her to initial bassist Peter Lucas.
"I met the original drummer, Joey [Osbourne], at a party. I was at a friend's house and yelled out, 'Who plays drums?""
Following 2005's punishingly heavy Acid King III, the group took a decadelong hiatus due to personnel changes. 2015's fourth offering, Middle of Nowhere, Center of Everywhere, upheld the endeavor's raw, gritty sound. The bandleader, who began Acid King as a spare time pursuit to her career as a video producer, plans on keeping the threesome at that level with Rafa Martinez on bass and drummer Bil Bowman.
"We've all been lucky enough to have careers that allow us the flexibility to tour. I've never been the person to desire being a full-time musician," admits the boss lady. "Since we don't tour that much though, for Austin Terror Fest we just want to have fun, play, and look for Evel Knievel out there." - Clara Wang

## WAYFARER

World's Blood (Profound Lore) Denver black metal quartet Wayfarer injects some Southwestern into its shriek ' $n$ '
 shred, loping rhythms and sweeping guitar lines from an Italian cowboy soundtrack accompanying the usual blast beats and doomthrash. Indecipherable as anything Norwegian, the lyrics address Native American history, a fittingly violent and tragic subject for USBM. "The Crows Ahead Cry War" encapsulates Wayfarer: melodic, brutal, melancholic, and savage in equal measure. From Kay Odyssey's shimmery psych to experimental Austin rock veterans ST 37 or raucous new outfit Endless Sewer, Drummer Babes' six-band bill featuring female-identifying drummers traverses a spectrum of genres. Spotlighting local women holding down the rhythm section, the showcase serves as a platform for female representation still often ove looked in the homegrown scene. Kay Odyssey drummer Vajaja (née Virginia) Valejo credits her own twentysomething years as a percussionist to witnessing other women kick ass behind a drum kit after she first moved to Austin in 1990.
"Fuckin' Teresa Taylor of Butthole
Surfers!" she exclaims. "I worked with her at School for the Blind and she was just a total inspiration to me. Terri Lord is also a queen. They put the bug in me. I was like, "Fuck yeah, I wanna do that."
The Alice native became immersed in the state capital's early-Nineties under-
ground scene, living with a bunch of musician friends on North Lamar and going on to form punk bands like Splendorkünt, Vibrolux, and Unhung Heroes. She notes that seeing women playing drums proved rare back then, and there's been an upswing in the past several years. Still, Valejo wants more, and thinks events like Drummer Babes can help with empowerment.
"Hell yes," she asserts. "I hate to separate men from women drummers, 'cause I hate it when people come up to me with, 'Oh man, you're so good for a girl. Having said that, I also think we do need to be held up 'cause we're so underappreciated, man.
"There are some amazing, badass female drummers here in Austin, and everywhere," Valejo continues. "Karen Carpenter is one of my idols and so underrated and so overlooked as a drummer, in my opinion. We're reclaiming our shit, saying, 'Fuck you, women all the way.'

## THE COMMON LAW <br> by Luke Ellis and Caroline Young

## Is Sports Betting in Texas Now Legal?

I read that a recent ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court makes sports betting legal. Is that true? Does it mean that I can bet legally in Texas?
The Supreme Court recently issued its decision in Mur phy v. National Collegiate Athletic Association. In Murphy, the state of New Jersey sought to legalize sports gambling at casinos and horse racing tracks; however, a federal law, the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act (PAS $\mathrm{PA})$, generally made it unlawful for a state to "authorize" sports gambling schemes. New Jersey challenged the constitutionality of PASPA.
The U.S. Supreme Court struck down PASPA. The ma jority opinion, delivered by Justice Alito, held that PASPA was invalid because it infringed upon state sovereignty
and the state's ability to exercise its lawmaking powe While the Murphy opinion does not legalize sports bet ting in the U.S., the decision does give states the power to legalize and regulate sports betting as each state deems appropriate. States all over the country are now working to legalize and implement their own regulations and safeguards on sports betting

But you may not want to cancel your trip to Las Vega in anticipation of betting in Austin as it doesn't look like Texas will allow sports betting anytime soon. Gov. Greg Abbott and other state leaders have shown resistance to expanding gambling in the state. According to Texas news reports, neither Gov. Abbott nor Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick have said much about the recent Murphy decision, which could signal they are in no rush to implement changes regarding sports betting in Texas. And even if Texas politicians generally approve sports betting, it will take time before Texas is able to implement legalized sports betting channels.
