THE PEOPLE OF KANSAS have evidently seen the fallacy of political argument upon which they have been fed during the last few years and as a result have placed the state again in the republican column, giving to it a majority of 100,000 votes against a democratic majority of 13,000 last year.

HEREAFTER the silver value will be maintained at a level without reference to the fluctuations in the price of the metal which they are made, as in the case in all countries having a limited silver coinage with a gold standard. This is the first result of their steps in the direction of the adoption of the gold standard.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY has occasion for gratification in the fact that the first year of his administration is signified by the export of more than 100,000,000 of American tin-plate, whose manufacture in the United States was brought about by the high protection given to that industry by the law bearing his name and framed under his management.

THE NEW tariff law, which began its work in the face of the extremely adverse conditions resulting from the enormous importations just prior to its enactment, shows Treasury receipts at \$10,029,414 in the first month, \$21,038,088 in the second month, \$24,291,415 in the third month, and \$25,000,000 in the fourth month, thus returning the promises of its friends that it would, as business approached normal conditions, increase its earnings until it would supply ample revenues.

AMERICAN securities formerly held abroad are being returned to the United States in large quantities, thus reducing the actual imports of money which would otherwise occur as a result of our large exportations. This fact is especially interesting, as the United States is rapidly becoming independent of the financing of the old world, and there will be from this time forward a great reduction in the amount of money sent abroad in the way of interest. The country at large is becoming more independent of the world and reducing its indebtedness to others.
