**Buchanania obovata** is a small to medium sized understorey tree in woodlands native to northern Australia. Common names include **green plum** and **wild mango**.

Leaves are smooth, thick, leathery, broadly oblong, 5–25 centimetres (2.0–9.8 in) long and 1.5–10 centimetres (0.59–3.94 in) wide. Flowers are small, cream-coloured and 0.5 centimetres (0.20 in) across. The fruit is smooth, fleshy, lens-shaped, 1–1.7 centimetres (0.39–0.67 in) long.

The species was formally described in 1883 based on plant material collected from Escape Cliffs in the Northern Territory by C. Hull.

#### Uses

The fruit is traditionally eaten by Aborigines. The plant also has traditional medicinal uses.
