

# Angophora subvelutina (Broad-leaved Apple)

## Description

The rough bark of this medium sized tree can resemble the majestic *A. floribunda*, with its gnarled branches.

## Flower and Foliage

Small creamy white flowers in bundles from spring to summer. Dense non-droopy, large pointed, light green velvety evergreen leaves.

## Maintenance

Will tolerate a light frost. To prune, remove dead wood.

## Occurs

Found on heavy alluvial soils that are poorly drained, along the Hawkesbury River. Also found on clay soils.

## Uses

It was originally used as an indicator plant for good crop and pasture land. Good tree for acreage or shade tree. Attracts a variety of native fauna. Yellow-Bellied Glider favours it as a sap feeder tree.

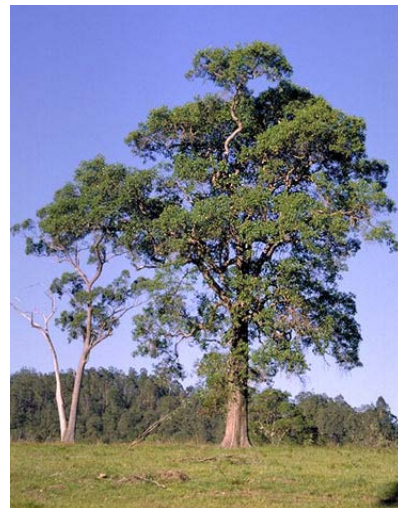
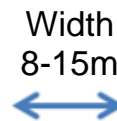
